

It's the Old Doll Game With a Serious Aim

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff John Polk is a big, brawny fellow — a man's man in the John Wayne tradition, and not at all the sort of fellow who would ordinarily be interested in dolls.

And yet, some ladies from the Elks Club Auxiliary gave him three rag dolls a few months ago, and he not only accepted them without losing his temper, he actually seemed pleased!

It turned out that the Sheriff was putting together quite a doll collection. He already had four dolls that were being used for a serious purpose: to clarify testimony given by child victims in sexual abuse cases.

Underneath their clothes these dolls were anatomically complete, with male and female genitals. Some represented adults. Others represented children. Sheriff Polk turned them over to Vicki Morris, his Director of Victim Services, and she has found them very effective in child abuse investigations and in court trials.

Vicki explained that questioning small children about sexual abuse incidents can be very difficult because their terminology for various body parts is unique and unconventional.

"So," said Vicki, "in order to know exactly what a

child is talking about we start out with different parts of the doll and point to them and say 'what do you call this?'

"We go over the whole doll, from head to toe, pointing to the foot, thumb, nose and so forth. We undress the doll as we go, and once we understand the child's vocabulary, we can get the child to describe the crime incident in his own terms.

"What you do is say to the child, 'Well, with the dolls can you show me what happened?' Usually they are pretty graphic about it. They can show you exactly what happened. Things they would not describe on a real person, or by pointing to themselves, they will show you with the dolls."

Using the dolls with child victims has another benefit, Vicki explained. When youngsters are being questioned by strangers they are likely to become frightened, and holding the dolls gives them a sense of security. It makes them more cooperative.

The Indomitable Dom Still Gives a Damn!

RIVIERA BEACH — In August, 1974, The Sheriff's Star printed an article about Dom Colangelo, an honorary member of the Florida Sheriffs Association who "gives a damn about his fellow man."

Dom had made a career of saving lives and rendering first aid to fishermen, swimmers, boaters, sunbathers and just plain loafers at the bridge on the Blue Heron Causeway.

He had also helped to rehabilitate a young man who had assisted in a rescue and later went to prison on burglary charges.

We devoted a full page to Dom in 1974 because we were proud of him. Recently we were given further cause to think he's quite a guy. We learned that he has been involved in additional life saving exploits. and the Palm Beach County Commissioners have erected a water fountain in his honor near the Blue Heron Causeway bridge. On the fountain is a bronze plaque praising Dom for saving eight persons' lives.

Dom has a long history of public service, both in Westchester County, New York, where he spends his summers, and in Palm Beach County, Florida, where he spends the rest of the year.

Fire departments and law enforcement agencies. including the Palm Beach County Sheriff's department, have honored him with special badges.

Known locally as "The Harmonica Man," he has also been praised for giving concerts at charity benefits, nursing homes, schools and service clubs.

Dom is 66 now and disabled in both legs as the result of a childhood bone disease, but he continues to hang around the Blue Heron Causeway bridge

Although the dolls are immobile, immodest and inarticulate members of Sheriff Polk's staff, he has made them available to all law enforcement agencies in Seminole County, including municipal police departments and the State Attorney's office.

The response, both inside and outside the Sheriff's Department, has been enthusiastic, and it is obvious that the dolls have done no damage to the Sheriff's manly image. Instead, it appears that they have enhanced his reputation as a progressive lawman who comes up with innovative solutions to law enforcement problems.



Lost – a Leader Who Got Things Done

SEBRING— "He let his quiet life reach out in honest statements, tender compassion, and clear examples, and he became a leader through sweat and tears and work and honesty and sacrifices," said the Rev. Joe D. Benson during funeral rites for Highlands County Sheriff Broward Coker.

Standing above a flag-draped casket, the Rev. Mr. Benson added that the former Sheriff's life and principles influenced the lives of untold hundreds wherever he lived and worked.

"He was not a man who fought for rank or position," said Benson. "He earned it.

"The story of rags to riches was the story of his life. Starting at the bottom and earning his way to the top.

"His rags were not from lack of education or laziness, but from the sacrifices he made in depression years that others might have what they needed. "His riches were not so much in bank accounts or stocks or bonds or investments in real estate, but in the lives of the young people of this nation, and especially of this state, and for all those around him.

"If we could suddenly visualize all the people Broward Coker has helped in their need... what a stark realization it would be. He left this place better than he found it.

"An American flag drapes his casket today and speaks of his loyalty," said Benson. "He served in World War II, and he defended that flag every day that he lived.

"All the adjectives of the English language, every person here and elsewhere speaking what they may want to say, could never say all that needs to be said," Benson declared.

"When all the good that is said about Broward Coker has died away, and all the records that bear his name are packed in dust, what he lived for will live on."

Coker, who was 75, died November 4, 1982, at his home near Sebring, and funeral services were held at Sebring's First Baptist Church on November 7.

He began his long law enforcement career in 1933 as a deputy sheriff in the Highlands County Sheriff's Department. In 1942 he enlisted in the U.S. Army and served in Europe with the 814th Tank Destroyer Battalion.

After he was discharged from the Army in 1945 as a Master Sergeant, he returned to his job as a deputy sheriff. He was elected Sheriff of Highlands County in 1948, and continued in that position for 20 years.

During his tenure as Sheriff he served as President of the Florida Sheriffs Association, as a Trustee of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, and as a member of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau's Adminis-

trative Board. He was one of the founders of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch in 1957, and remained one of its active supporters throughout his life. A few days before he died he was making arrangements by phone to donate to the Boys Ranch a rare collection of history books valued at over \$4,000.

After Coker retired from the Sheriff's Office at the beginning of 1969, he accepted an assignment to organize a crime fighting unit within the Florida Department of Agriculture to curb thefts on farms and ranches. He ran this bureau for several years before becoming fully retired and moving to a rural homesite south of Sebring.

The Rev. Mr. Benson summed up this long and useful life by saying that Broward Coker was "a leader who got things done... who invested in the lives of all that he met."

Final Rites Held for Former Sheriff Hendry

NAPLES—E.A. "Doug" Hendry, former Sheriff of Collier County, went to his final rest here December 8, in a flag-draped coffin attended by a smartly uniformed honor guard from the Collier County Sheriff's Department.

A large crowd dominated by representatives of local, state and federal law enforcement agencies attended the final rites, which were held in the Earl Hodges Funeral Home Chapel.

Former associates from the Collier County Sheriff's department, including Sheriff Aubrey Rogers, served as pallbearers.

Hendry died here December 5, at the age of 58. A native of Fort Myers, he served as a policeman in Fort Myers and Naples, and as a Collier County deputy sheriff prior to 1956 when he was elected to the first of five consecutive four-year terms as Sheriff of Collier County.

He was a graduate of the FBI National



Academy; a past president of the Florida Chapter of FBI Academy Associates; a U.S. Army veteran; and a past member of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Board of Trustees.

Encore for Sheriff Wille

Palm Beach County Sheriff Richard Wille has been reelected chairman and president of the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc., (CALEA) a national organization.

Serving with him will be Director of Public Safety John Ball, Royal Oak, Michigan, secretary; and Chief of Detectives Gilbert M. Branche, Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, treasurer.

CALEA was formed in 1979 by The International Association of Chiefs of Police, The National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, The National Sheriffs' Association, and The Police Executive Research Forum.

Its objective is to set measurable standards for law enforcement agencies and implement them through a voluntary accreditation program.

Dobeck Views with Disdain Forays Over Rough Terrain

VERO BEACH - No terrain is too tough for Indian River County Sheriff Tim Dobeck and his deputies.

When they go out in the "boonies" on a search and seizure mission they have a choice of using boats, four-wheel-drive vehicles, a swamp buggy, an airplane or air boats. A three-wheel All Terrain Cycle (ATC) is also on stand-by at Dean's motorcycle dealership, and will be made available to the Sheriff on short notice.

"With the ATC we will be able to cover areas which would be difficult to reach with a four-wheel-drive vehicle or an airboat," said Dobeck. "This vehicle will definitely increase our flexibility and mobility."

Four deputies have been trained in motorcycle riding and are capable of handling the ATC. Dobeck said it will be used in beach patrol situations such as when marijuana bales wash up, or in the event it is necessary to traverse beaches and densely wooded areas.

Drug busts are helping the Sheriff to expand his

fleet of special purpose vehicles without putting a heavy burden on taxpayers.

"We expect to continue to seize vehicles, boats and planes that are used to import illegal drugs," said Dobeck, "and as our special fund grows we will be able to save the taxpayers' money by letting the dopers actually pay for special equipment to fight the drug problem."

The Sheriff's Department currently has seven four-wheel-drive vehicles which can be used in disasters, searches and special investigations. Also available from citrus growers and cattlemen are three airboats, a light airplane and a swamp buggy.

"With this kind of community support," said Dobeck, "we will be able to utilize high quality specialized equipment without major cost to taxpayers."


TAMPA— Late at night a burglar alarm goes off in a department store. Deputy sheriffs burn rubber hurrying to the scene. A rear door has been forced open. An armed man is believed to be hiding inside the darkened building.

The deputies could draw their guns, turn on their flashlights, and enter the building in a foolhardy display of bravado. But, there is a better and safer way.

In Hillsborough County the deputies are likely to stand outside and announce that attack dogs will be set loose in the store unless the burglar surrenders.

If he's in there, the burglar, whether armed or not, usually surrenders rather than face the 90 pounds of angry muscle and fur.

"Anyone that's not scared of one of these dogs is not in his right mind," said Sgt. Fred Wheeler, team leader of Sheriff Walter Heinrich's K-9 team. "The psychological effect of the dogs is very good, and that's three-fourths of the battle."



Wheeler said he has witnessed "bad guys" who would fight and shoot it out with any number of deputies, but who act "like lambs" as soon as a K-9 team arrives on the scene.

"You can't outsmart the dog. You can't outtalk the dog," he said. "They respond on instinct and reflex, and suspects know this."

Wheeler said many times suspects may have forced deputies into shoot-outs, but bloodshed was averted simply by using the K-9 teams.

The Sheriff's Office currently uses nine German Shepherds, two Dobermans and a Rottwheiler. Each dog is assigned to a deputy and the dog becomes the deputy's full-time partner, living and working with the deputy.

"Not everyone wants to work with the K-9 teams," Wheeler said. "It's hard work and often times it's dangerous." He said that every time the K-9s are called in it's to deal with an "in progress" crime, one where there has been or could be violence. "We're often in a one-to-one situation," he added.

We have a patrol or two on during the day shift," said Wheeler, "but most of them are out at night. That's when most of the bad guys are out."

Wheeler said that since April (six months prior to the printing of this article) the Sheriff's Office has used the dog teams over 500 times, and has apprehended over 60 suspects. He said over 600 suspects have been apprehended by the dogs since the K-9 unit was formed in the mid-1960s. Out of all those arrests, only one suspect was seriously injured by a dog. "The man was caught but he wasn't ready to give up," said Wheeler. "He tried to fight the dog. It was a bad idea."

Dogs begin training when they are about 1½ years old, and go to a K-9 "boot camp" for three months. After that their skills are honed in training exercises held twice monthly. Training includes tracking, apprehension (attack), and sniffing for drugs and explosives.

The dogs learn to obey 75 to 80 voice and hand commands. They also become very protective of their human "partners." The first night Wheeler had his

dog "Mickey" at home, the dog would not let Mrs. Wheeler go in the bedroom.

"I came home the next morning," said Wheeler, "and my wife said, 'You have to do something about that dog.' "

Under Wheeler's tutelage Mickey soon learned when to protect and when to practice good law enforcement public relations. Wheeler said he often visits elementary schools and feels confident enough to turn Mickey loose in a crowded playground.

"He loves kids," Wheeler said, as he petted his 92-pound partner.

"Mickey" Was Outstanding In National Competition

TAMPA—Sgt. Fred Wheeler, from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department, and his K-9 partner "Mickey" placed third in the overall combined category during the U.S. Police K-9 Association National Field Trials, which were held in Newark, Ohio.

"Mickey" was one of 74 dogs required to demonstrate their obedience, agility, search skills and criminal apprehension ability, in the overall combined category. He ranked first in agility, second in search and ninth in criminal apprehension. He also took third place in team competition.

"This is the highest national achievement won by the Hillsborough County K-9 team," said Sheriff Walter C. Heinrich," and I am extremely proud of Sergeant Wheeler, Mickey and the entire squad." Sergeant Fred Wheeler and "Mickey" with medals and trophies won in national competition.

Communications Equipment Updated by Explorer Post

Prior to receiving the new unit, the Sheriff was using an older model that had been donated by the Sertoma Club. This older unit has been donated to the Hillsborough County Emergency Medical Servi-

ces Explorer Post, and it will be used by the Medical Services agency to receive emergency requests from handicapped persons who cannot use a conventional telephone.

The telecommunications printer in the Sheriff's Department is linked by phone lines with telecommunications devices in the homes of deaf and speechimpaired persons. These handicapped persons can communicate with the Sheriff's Department by tapping out messages on a keyboard. Deputies in the Sheriff's Communications Bureau can respond in similar manner.

Providing emergency communications equipment for the handicapped is a project fostered by law enforcement Explorer Posts throughout Florida.





Senior Citizens don't leave home without it

MADISON — Search a senior citizen in this rural area of North Florida, and what are you likely to find?

A driver's license?

Nope.

An American Express card?

Nope.

A Peavy card?

Yep.

Nine out of ten times, if you look in a senior citizen's wallet, you will discover an identification card with an embossed gold star and the signature of Madison County Sheriff Joe Peavy. Old folks just don't leave home without their Peavy cards.

The Sheriff started issuing ID cards about two years ago after Mrs. Ila Willis, Executive Director of Madison County's Senior Citizens' Advisory Council, pointed out the need.

She said the elderly — especially those who no longer had driver's licenses — had difficulty identifying themselves when they wanted to cash a check, apply for credit, or qualify for a senior citizen discount.

The Sheriff began with a modest printing of 500 cards, then had to order a second printing. Now he's thinking about a third printing.

Anyone who lives in Madison County and is over 59 can get a Peavy card free of charge. The names of all card holders are kept on file at the Madison County Senior Citizen's Center.

Peavy signs each card and certifies that the card holder is a Madison County resident who is entitled to all the rights and privileges due senior citizens. Each card contains the holder's signature, address, birth date, social security number, and physical data such as height, weight and color of hair and eyes.

Banks, grocery stores, motels, airlines, drug stores and other business establishments are accepting the cards willingly.

Senior citizens are enthusiastic. So is Mrs. Willis, who fills out the cards before the Sheriff signs and plasticizes them. "The cards have been most helpful for us," she said. "They enable us to get information such as birth date and Social Security number that senior citizens might otherwise be reluctant to give out."

Peavy has not hesitated to recommend the identification card idea to his fellow Sheriffs, and he doesn't worry about the cards being misused or abused.

He recalls only one bad experience: A drifter obtained a Peavy card by giving false information and used it to cash a forged check. Shortly thereafter he ended up in the county jail (the "Peavy Hilton" as it is referred to in a local newspaper) where he lost his liberty and also his identification card.
