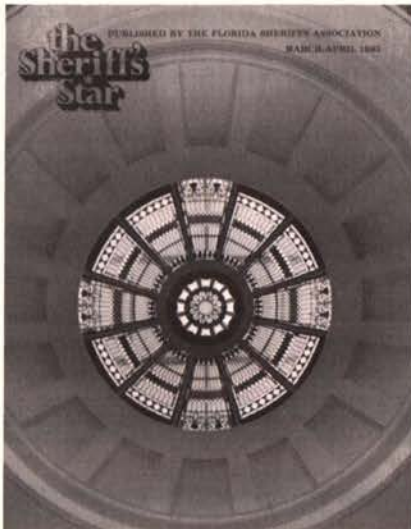

When Florida's remodeled capitol was dedicated in 1902, visitors were able to admire a colorful glass dome in the center of the building, directly under the cupola, but by 1911 or 1912 the glass dome was gone.

Now it's back and a highlight of the restored building.

Leaking water apparently forced the removal of the original glass structure. In later years historians would read how architect Frank Pierce Milburn had included a glass subdome in his 1902 remake of the capitol, but the materials and design appeared to be lost.

When restoration of the old capitol began in 1977, all interior walls added since 1902 were removed to return the building to its original configuration.

As workmen were taking apart one of these walls, they came across an important find. Along with several old whiskey bottles and a spittoon, they found 103 pounds of colored glass.

With this new found treasure, members of the restoration team set about trying to reconstruct what the original glass dome must have looked like. After investing hundreds of hours of painstaking work, the team had a design which is thought to recreate the original.

The design was sent to the Louisville Art Glass Company for production of the present art glass dome which contains 16 kinds of glass and 2,500 different pieces.

During the day the dome is illuminated by sunlight entering windows above the structure and at night artificial lighting is used.

The cover picture was taken from directly below the glass dome which is approximately 136 feet above the main floor of the restored capitol.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As President of the Florida Sheriff's Association, my goal for 1983 will be to inform our readers about serious problems within Florida's jail and court systems. The most difficult problem will be to find a solution. This is a quest I will share with you by offering my opinions and soliciting your help.

Jail overcrowding has only become a recognized problem in the last ten years or so. Unfortunately, the housing of criminals was not, and is still not, granted sufficient financial priority by our elected representatives of county, state, and federal government. Consequently a crisis has developed.

Many county jails are under orders from the Florida Department of Corrections to reduce the inmate population and increase the number of officers responsible for supervising the inmates. In many cases, complying with these orders will mean building additional jails as well as hiring more correctional officers. Both will require taxpayers money and action by county commissions.

These problems on the state and county levels are further aggravated by the fact that the Florida Department of Corrections and several county jails are under federal court orders to reduce the prison and jail populations and/or hire more officers.

In response to these orders, the Department of Corrections has been attempting to find sites for new prisons in various counties. In most cases, the county commissions in those counties have opposed the building of prisons in their areas.

Due to federal court orders and state regulations, building costs for jails are about four times higher than costs for other structures. State regulations, plus the unavailability of building sites and money have kept our prison system below requirements. As a partial solution, the Department of Corrections has utilized several methods to release criminals prior to the court imposed date.

Over the years, committees appointed by the Governor and other officials to study prison overcrowding have looked with favor upon this type of solution. Most of their recommendations have

been to release criminals faster and use alternative (and supposedly cheaper) ways to punish. The result of this is more criminals on the streets.

One such committee seems to be in favor of adopting a recommendation offered by Louie Wainwright, Secretary of the Department of Corrections, to give gain time (reduced sentences for good behavior) to criminals convicted of capital crimes who are serving the 25-year mandatory portion of their "life" sentences.

Mr. Wainwright has said that this class of criminal is difficult to handle in prison because they have no hope of parole or other release before they complete the mandatory 25 years.

What he failed to point out was that these hard to handle prisoners have already been given one big break. They faced the electric chair before they were given the break of a "life" sentence. To apply gain time to the 25-year mandatory portion of their sentence could reduce their prison stay to as little as 13 or 14 years.

Mr. Wainwright's proposal astounds me. He is a state employee. Another state employee was murdered (*continued on page 3*)

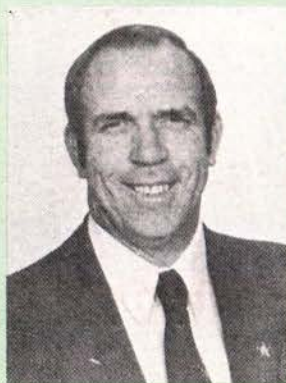

by one of those 25-year criminals. That employee was a Florida Highway Patrol trooper who left behind a wife and child. The murderer was on a work release program from the Department of Corrections and was driving a stolen car when he shot the trooper.

Releasing dangerous criminals earlier is not an acceptable solution to the problem of overcrowded jails and prisons. No way!

Criminals are furnished food, clothing, medical services, legal services, educational opportunities, and the right to sue the government which pays their expenses.

Victims — mainly voters like you and me — suffer the loss of family members, pay their own medical bills, lose wages, pay higher rates for theft and medical insurance, and are required to cope with the frustrations of our overloaded criminal justice system as their

cases drag on. Few, if any, of the victim's costs are covered by the government.

Those of us who are appalled at the present state of affairs have a choice:

1. We can do nothing and let the murderers, rapists, and thieves remain in our communities;

2. Or, we can use our voices and votes to obtain the needed jails and prisons. We can demand changes in unreasonable government regulations so that the cost of building jails and prisons can be reduced. We can keep criminals segregated from those of us who want to live in peace.

I am persuaded that if we write and talk to our county commissioners and state and federal representatives, improvements will be forthcoming.

GOVERNOR

GOVERNOR BOB GRAHAM

Bob Graham, the 38th Governor of the State of Florida, was born in Coral Gables on November 9, 1936, and was educated in Dade County public schools, graduating from Miami Senior High School. He received his B.A. degree from the University of Florida in 1959 and his law degree from Harvard Law School in 1962.

In February 1959, Bob Graham married Adele Khoury of Miami Springs. They have four teenage daughters.

As a legislator, Graham was an aggressive advocate of improved education for Florida's children. He authored and steered passage of a bill requiring testing for competency and progress in public schools, as well as numerous other laws aimed at improving the state's educational system. In addition, Graham authored or helped write almost all of the state's current environmental laws. As chairman of the Senate Health and Rehabilitative Services Committee, he also focused strong attention on the needs of the elderly and providing community health services.

Bob Graham was inaugurated to his first term as Governor in January, 1979. He was reelected to the position in November of 1982.

During his first term as Governor, Graham established a clear reputation as a crime fighter and strong supporter of law enforcement.

During his first term, state criminal justice spending has increased by nearly \$217 million, funding for prosecutors, public defenders and other elements of the system has doubled since 1979, and the enforcement manpower of the Florida Highway Patrol has expanded by 41 percent.

Graham has been vocal and active in his fight against drug trafficking in Florida. He supported and signed into law bills that mandate a minimum 15-year prison sentence for drug smugglers. He has traveled to Columbia in an effort to find ways to cut off the drug trade at its source and he has repeatedly called for a greater federal role in fighting drug smuggling. Early in 1982, the Reagan Administration responded by appointing a task force and providing resources that have been credited with reducing drug trade in the state.

Governor Graham is a supporter of capital punishment and has signed 45 death warrants since taking office.

Accomplishments of the Graham Administration have been far-reaching in the areas of economic development, education, human services and the environment.



Governor Graham believes in a personal style of governing. He has carried over into his term as Governor the election campaign practice of doing different "workdays" throughout the state. These jobs include stints as policeman, railroad engineer, construction worker, sponge fisherman, factory worker, social worker, busboy, teacher and newsman.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

WAYNE MIXSON

Tallahassee's Capitol complex is familiar territory to Wayne Mixson, a Jackson County farmer who was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1978 and reelected in 1982.

Before he became Governor Bob Graham's running mate in the 1978 election campaign, he served 12 years in the Florida Legislature. For six of those years he was Chairman of the House Agriculture and General Legislation Committee. During his tenure in the House, he also served on the Appropriations and Rules committees. A variety of groups across the State have honored him for his service to Florida in the Legislature.

Outside the Legislature his public service has included appointments to the Governor's Council on Housing Goals, the Governor's Commission on Property Rights, and the Florida Migrant Labor Commission.

Lieutenant Governor Mixson holds the historical distinction of being the first person ever reelected to serve in that office. In addition, his duties in the Graham Administration include being Secretary of the Florida Department of Commerce and chief economic development spokesman for Florida. In this capacity he has participated in successful trips to



Guatemala, Ecuador, Great Britain, Argentina, Korea, Japan, West Germany, the Republic of China, and sites throughout the United States. He is also liaison between local officials and citizens and their government in Tallahassee.

In his years as Lieutenant Governor, Mr. Mixson has won an international reputation as a leader in economic and business affairs. Among other honors he has been asked to join the Executive Committee of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors as chairman of the Economic Development Committee.

The Lieutenant Governor was born in New Brockton, Alabama, on June 6, 1922, and became a resident of Florida in 1941. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from the University of Florida, where he was graduated with honors. He also attended Columbia University and the University of Pennsylvania.

He is married to the former Margie Grace, of Graceville, and operates a working farm between Marianna and Graceville.

About the Legislative Branch

The Legislature is the law-making branch of Florida's government. It is composed of the Senate and House of Representatives and it meets annually in the Capitol, in Tallahassee, for 60 days. In addition to these regular sessions, the Legislature can also be called into extraordinary or special sessions.

Senators serve four-year terms which are staggered so that half of the members are elected every two years. Representatives serve two-year terms.

A man or woman running as a candidate for election to the Legislature need not possess any legal qualifications beyond

those required of any voter — except that the candidate must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of Florida at least two years prior to election.

Responding to U. S. Supreme Court decisions requiring "one man, one vote," the Florida Legislature in 1972 adopted a population-based reapportionment plan that created 120 House seats and 40 Senate seats.

In 1982 the Legislature reapportioned itself again, using the 1980 decennial census. The 120 House seats and 40 Senate seats were retained. However, the realignment created greater representation for minorities.

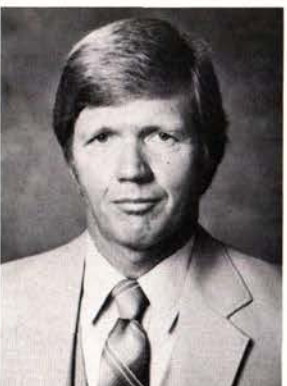

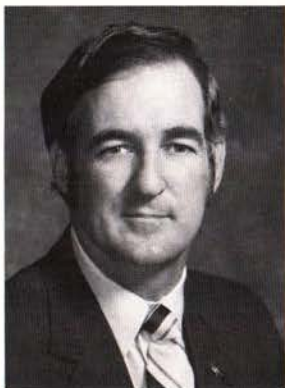

What's Cookin'?

Jail Problems Were On Front Burner at Sheriffs' Mid-Winter Conference



WINTER HAVEN — County jail problems received top billing on the agenda when the Florida Sheriffs Association held its annual Mid-Winter Conference at Cypress Gardens, January 23-26.

Seeking to modify state regulations that they claim have created artificial overcrowding problems in jails, Sheriffs conferred with officials from the Department of Corrections, the Governor's Office, the Attorney General's Office and the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Sheriffs took the position that a Department of Corrections (DOC) "factoring" formula requires too much space per prisoner, and is preventing them from housing the number of prisoners their jails were designed to hold.

Reduction of population limits in Florida jails ranged from 19 to 70 percent when the "factoring" formula was put into effect in 1981.

Since then, many Sheriffs have been under heavy pressure to reduce jail populations, but they insist that much of the so-called overcrowding would be alleviated if the state would just be more reasonable in its space-per-prisoner requirements.

Florida's requirement of 63 square feet per prisoner is the second highest in the nation, according to a Sheriffs Association survey.



Sheriffs Preview "Porta-Pokey"

WINTER HAVEN — Sheriffs attending the annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association got a preview of portable jail cells that can be "factory built," transported to jail sites anywhere in the state, and assembled like building blocks. Some clown called the new concept a "porta-pokey," but Sheriffs gave it serious scrutiny.

These one-man, two-man and four-man cells are being produced as a joint effort by Watson & Company, a Tampa firm of architects, engineers and planners; and Florida Mining and Materials Corp., a firm that operates prestressed/precast concrete

plants at six Florida locations.

Spokesmen for the two firms assured Sheriffs that the precast concrete modular cells would help them reduce the cost per inmate; the cost of maintenance; the time required to construct a new jail; and the possibility of escape and vandalism.

They said the cells can be assembled in several floor plans, can be stacked several tiers high, and, with minor changes in hardware and fixtures, can be used to house maximum, medium and minimum security inmates.

After DOC officials said they were willing to re-evaluate the factoring process, Sheriffs focused on another jail problem: sharply rising medical costs for prisoners. Current law requires counties to pay these costs for all prisoners taken into custody, even though some may have been arrested by city or state enforcement officers.

The Sheriffs Association described this as "inequitable and financially devastating."

Cited as typical examples were two cases in which suspects were injured while being arrested by city police officers. They were taken to hospitals, and, although Sheriffs were not involved in the arrests or the injuries, they were dunned for medical bills totaling almost \$56,000.

As a remedy for this situation, Sheriffs voted to sponsor, in the 1983 session of the Florida Legislature, a bill that would require the agency making an arrest to be responsible for paying the arrestee's medical bills, if the bills resulted from illnesses or injuries that developed prior to an arrest, or during the course of an arrest.

The arresting agency would be authorized to seek reimbursement for such medical costs from the arrestee, or from any insurance companies providing health insurance coverage for the arrestee.

Sheriffs also agreed to support bills that would:

(1) Free law enforcement officers from the necessity of investigating and reporting minor traffic accidents, so their time can be spent more productively. (The "fender benders" would be reported on appropriate forms by the drivers involved.)

(2) Allow deputies to receive dual certification as law enforcement officers and correctional officers. (At present an officer must be de-registered and re-registered every time he is reassigned from law enforcement duties to jail duties, or vice versa.)

(3) Give all certified law enforcement and correctional officers authority to administer oaths in connection with their duties.

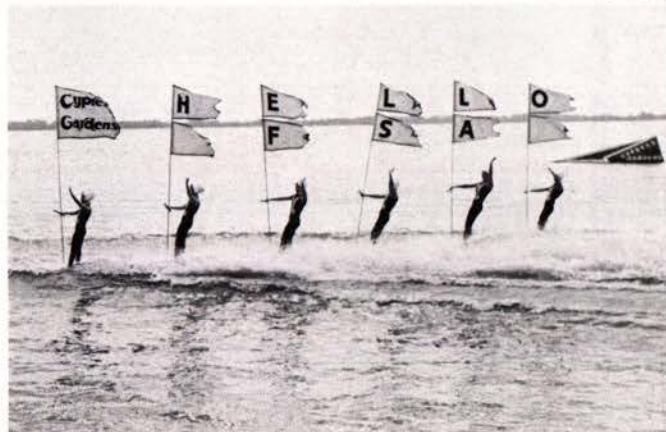
(4) Streamline the inventory procedures for firearms confiscated by Sheriffs.

(5) Limit or eliminate pre-trial discovery depositions in criminal cases in order to stop the present inordinate waste of law enforcement manpower.

(6) Authorize law enforcement agencies to use seized contraband as "stage props" in undercover situations.

The Association also voted to oppose:

1. Any legislation that would change substantially the present law which authorizes law enforcement agencies to put the proceeds from the sale of forfeited contraband into trust funds to finance law enforcement operations. (Sheriffs agreed that the

authorization to establish such trust funds should be limited to agencies whose primary objectives are investigating and enforcing criminal laws.)

2. Any reduction in the 25-year mandatory minimum sentences required by law in capital cases, or any attempt to grant "gain time" (reduction of sentences for good behavior) to inmates serving 25-year mandatory sentences.

3. Any legislation that would allow judges to sentence inmates to county jails for more than one year.

Florida Sheriffs Youth Camp

Camping can be an indoor, as well as outdoor, learning experience as in the case of these youngsters who explored leathercraft under the guidance of a skilled counselor at one of the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund's Summer Camp sessions last year. This year, 500 boys and girls will participate in the Summer Camp Program at the Florida Sheriffs Youth Camp, near Deland. "Lawmen are Your Friends" is the theme of the youth camp, and it is more than just a slogan. Deputy sheriffs and other members of Sheriffs' Departments' throughout the state will be actively involved in counseling roles and in pro-

viding demonstrations for the campers of various aspects of law enforcement. The newly acquired camp, with its 132 acres of forest and lake, a large swimming pool, and numerous other facilities designed for camping, will provide an ideal environment for a variety of educational and recreational experiences. The Summer Camping Program will operate during the months of June through August with five sessions of ten days each. During the remainder of the year, the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund will operate a Wilderness Program at the camp for selected youngsters who require special help.
