People who wear badges are tough, and sometimes their job requires them to be rough. But they also have a compassionate side that remained pretty well hidden until 1957 when the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch was established as a home for neglected, unsupervised and troubled youngsters.

The success of this venture led to the founding of the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa, Youth Ranch and Youth Camp—a far-flung network of child care facilities operated by the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund and sponsored by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Currently the Youth Fund is making preparations to establish another youth ranch and another youth camp. The horizons envisioned by the Sheriffs who founded the Boys Ranch 27 years ago are getting wider and wider. Thousands of youngsters and families have already been helped. Thousands more will be guided toward a brighter future in the years to come.

So, now the secret is out. Those serious, no-nonsense, sometimes severe-looking people with badges are actually just "old softies" underneath. They've gotta lotta heart, obviously, and we are celebrating that happy revelation with a symbolic picture.

The man in uniform is Lee Mullins, a former resident of the Boys Ranch who is now employed by the Columbia County Sheriff's Department.

The youngsters are Shelly Cowger and Jeff Dotson, who are currently living at the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch.

Together they represent the new image of law enforcement, and the brighter future that awaits many unfortunate boys and girls.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Sheriffs are not an endangered species. On the contrary, their stature is increasing in the field of law enforcement, their professionalism is becoming more evident, and they are having a greater impact on major criminal justice issues with each passing year.

I saw evidence of this recently when I went to Washington, D.C., with a delegation of Florida Sheriffs to attend a National Sheriffs Association Symposium on Criminal Justice Issues.

Nine Sheriffs from Florida joined with almost 200 Sheriffs from other states throughout the nation to identify major criminal justice problems, and to make members of Congress aware of these problems.

It was an impressive experience to see this large group of law enforcement leaders, who are spearheading the day to day fight against crime, mingling in a Capitol Hill reception with an almost equal number of Congressmen, U.S. Senators, and ranking congressional staff members representing 40 states.

This was no mere social affair. The Sheriffs had done their homework in advance. Through a National Sheriffs Association survey they had identified four key criminal justice issues, and this enabled them to use their congressional contacts — before, during and after the reception — to good advantage.

When all the handshaking and conversation were over, none of the lawmakers could have been unaware that Sheriffs — the first line of defense in local law enforcement — are deeply concerned about:

(1) Crowded conditions in county jails (The rub here being that although federal intervention in the operation of county jails has mandated changes, no federal funds have been provided at the county level to allow these changes to be made.)

(2) Diminished Financial Aid (Sheriffs pointed out that federal assistance funding in the criminal justice and highway safety areas has diminished, and funds presently allocated to the states rarely get to the county level.)

(3) Narcotics Control (Current federal funding and programs are focused at the national level. More funds and other resources should be made available for narcotics control at the county and intra-state levels.)

(4) Capital Punishment Obstructions (The concern here was in regard to the legal maneuvers that obstruct capital punishment and render it inneffective as a crime deterrent.)

These and other concerns were also discussed in a Criminal Justice Symposium the following day. In addition to Sheriffs, the participants included officials from the FBI, Justice Department, and other federal agencies; as well as judges, attorneys, and a varied representation of criminal justice practitioners.

After the symposium, I returned to Florida with a feeling that I had participated in a worthwhile project that will produce future benefits for Florida and the nation.

Fortunately, the symposium was not a one shot deal. It is expected to become an annual event that will enable the professional input of Sheriffs to have a far-reaching impact.

I was impressed by the initial symposium, and I intend to do everything possible to encourage a vigorous follow-up. As president of the Florida Sheriffs Association, I will urge my fellow Sheriffs to keep the momentum going, so that the criminal justice system on all levels of government will have the benefit of their experience and expertise.



He never wore a badge, made an arrest, broke up a barroom brawl or won a landslide election, but in a way he was one of the greatest Sheriffs of them all.



Sheriff, and walked like a Sheriff, and even threw his weight around like a Sheriff. Some of his best friends were Sheriffs, and from hanging around with them he learned to think like a Sheriff.

He had the mirth and girth of a classic Sheriff, also

Because he was having too much fun becoming a successful lawyer, banker and lobbyist, Jack Madigan never succumbed to the Lorelei lure of a political career - and what a break that was for law enforcement in general and the Florida Sheriffs Association in particular.

GOVERNOR

GOVERNOR BOB GRAHAM (D)

Bob Graham, the 38th Governor of the State of Florida, was born in Coral Gables on November 9, 1936, and was educated in Dade County public schools, graduating from Miami Senior High School. He received his B.A. degree from the University of Florida in 1959 and his law degree from Harvard Law School in 1962.

In February 1959, Bob Graham married Adele Khoury of Miami Springs. They have four teenage daughters.

As a legislator, Graham was an aggressive advocate of improved education for Florida's children. He authored and steered passage of a bill requiring testing for competency and progress in public schools, as well as numerous other laws aimed at improving the state's educational system. In addition, Graham authored or helped write many of the state's current environmental laws. As chairman of the Senate Health and Rehabilitative Services Committee, he also focused strong attention on the needs of the elderly and providing community health services.

Bob Graham was inaugurated to his first term as Governor in January, 1979. He was re-elected to the position in November of 1982.

During his first term as Governor, Graham established a clear reputation as a crime fighter and strong supporter of law enforcement.

Graham has been vocal and active in his fight against drug trafficking in Florida. He supported and signed into law bills that mandate a minimum 15-year prison sentence for drug smugglers. He traveled to Columbia in an effort to find ways to cut off the drug trade at its source and he has repeatedly called for a greater federal role in fighting drug smuggling. Governor Graham is a supporter of capital punishment and has signed many death warrants since taking office.

Accomplishments of the Graham Administration have been far-reaching in the areas of economic development, education, human services and the environment.

Governor Graham believes in a personal style of governing. He has carried over into his term as Governor the election campaign practice of doing different "workdays" throughout the state. These jobs include stints as policeman, railroad engineer, construction worker, sponge fisherman, factory worker, social worker, busboy, teacher and newsman.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

WAYNE MIXSON

Tallahassee's Capitol complex is familiar territory to Wayne Mixson, a Jackson County farmer who was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1978 and reelected in 1982.

Before he became Governor Bob Graham's running mate in the 1978 election campaign, he served 12 years in the Florida Legislature. For six of those years he was Chairman of the House Agriculture and General



Legislation Committee. During his tenure in the House, he also served on the Appropriations and Rules committees. A variety of groups across the State have honored him for his service to Florida in the Legislature.

Outside the Legislature his public service has included appointments to the Governor's Council on Housing Goals, the Governor's Commission on Property Rights, and the Florida Migrant Labor Commission.

Lieutenant Governor Mixson holds the historical distinction of being the first person ever reelected to serve in that office. In addition, his duties in the Graham Administration include being Secretary of the Florida Department of Commerce and chief economic development spokesman for Florida. In this capacity he has participated in successful trips to

Guatemala, Ecuador, Great Britain, Argentina, Korea, Japan, West Germany, the Republic of China, and sites throughout the United States. He is also liaison between local officials and citizens and their government in Tallahassee.

In his years as Lieutenant Governor, Mr. Mixson has won an international reputation as a leader in economic and business affairs. Among other honors he has been asked to join the Executive Committee of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors as chairman of the Economic Development Committee.

The Lieutenant Governor was born in New Brockton, Alabama, on June 16, 1922, and became a resident of Florida in 1941. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from the University of Florida, where he was graduated with honors. He also attended Columbia University and the University of Pennsylvania.

He is married to the former Margie Grace, of Graceville, and operates a working farm between Marianna and Graceville.





About the Legislative Branch

The Legislature is the law-making branch of Florida's government. It is composed of the Senate and House of Representatives and it meets annually in the Capitol, in Tallahassee, for 60 days. In addition to these regular sessions, the Legislature can also be called into extraordinary or special sessions.

Senators serve four-year terms which are staggered so that half of the members are elected every two years. Representatives serve two-year terms.

A man or woman running as a candidate for election to the Legislature need not possess any legal qualifications beyond those required of any voter — except that the candidate must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of Florida at least two years prior to election.

Responding to U.S. Supreme Court decisions requiring "one man, one vote," the Florida Legislature in 1972 adopted a population-based reapportionment plan that created 120 House seats and 40 Senate seats.

In 1982 the Legislature reapportioned itself again, using the 1980 decennial census. The 120 House seats and 40 Senate seats were retained. However, the realignment created greater representation for minorities.





So - Why Rob a Bank?

Convicted Federal drug law violators received prison terms half as long as convicted bank robbers and served nearly two years less time in prison than the bank robbers, according to a bulletin released by the Bureau of Justice Statistics.

The study of 1979 data shows that drug offenders received an average sentence of 54 months, while bank robbers were sentenced to an average of 122 months. Average time served was 41 months for drug violators and 67 months for bank robbers, said the bulletin, "Federal Drug Law Violators."

"Almost 64 percent of drug law offenders in 1979 were involved with some level of selling, distributing, or dispensing controlled substances; 14 percent were involved with manufacturing, 11 percent with possession, 6 percent with importation, and 5 percent with other offenses, such as prescription violations," according to the bulletin which, for the first time, integrated Federal data from the Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys, the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts and the Bureau of Prisons. The Federal Bureau of Investigation also contributed to the data base

Sheriffs Pick "Shoot-em-Down" Targets for the coming year

TALLAHASSEE — Sheriffs were in a "shoot-emdown" mood when they came here January 21-24 to attend the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Picking out targets for the months ahead, they voted to oppose "Proposition One," a proposed constitutional amendment that would roll back government revenues in Florida to the 1980 level, and put a limit on future revenue increases.

They also agreed to turn thumbs down on a number of proposed laws that are expected to be considered by the Florida Legislature during its 1984 session.

These would:

— Amend the present Contraband Forfeiture Act so that revenue from drug case forfeitures, which are presently going into trust funds for the benefit of law enforcement, would be diverted or restricted.

 Legalize lotteries at the state and local levels, and allow all charitable, non-profit organizations to conduct games of chance.

— Prohibit employers from requiring employees to take polygraph tests.

Not all 1984 legislative proposals received a negative vote. The Sheriffs agreed to support proposed laws that would:

- Remove mentally ill patients from county jails within 24 hours after they are ruled mentally incompetent.
 - Prohibit totally opaque windows in automobiles.
- Make aggravated child abuse resulting in death the equivalent of first degree murder.
- Remove from the present statute a requirement that law enforcement officers, correctional officers and firefighters must be "unlawfully and intentionally" killed in the line of duty to qualify for certain death benefits.

Governor Bob Graham dropped by to thank the Sheriffs for voting to oppose Proposition One. "It's bad," he said, "and it's particularly gonna be bad for law enforcement.


"We have not reached the point where we can declare a victory over crime in Florida," he added, "but we are headed in the right direction and we do not need to take any backward steps, which Proposition One would be."

Leon County Commissioner Lee Vause, who is currently President of the State Association of County Commissioners, also addressed the conference as an opponent of Proposition One. If it passes, he said, it will probably eliminate some government waste, but it will also eliminate many of the good things that are being done by local and state governments.

It will hurt the war on crime, he declared, and hamper Florida's ability to cope with growth.

During business sessions Wakulla County Sheriff David Harvey was chosen to serve as President of the Sheriffs Association for 1984.

Elected to serve with him were: Hillsborough County Sheriff Walter C. Heinrich, Vice President; Alachua County Sheriff L.J. "Lu" Hindery, Treasurer; Pasco County Sheriff John Short, Secretary; Lafayette County Sheriff Bobby McCray, Chaplain; and DeSoto County Sheriff R.A. "Bob" Thomas, Sergeant-at-Arms. Named to the Association's Board of Directors were: Sheriffs Vince Seely, Escambia County; Dolph Reddish, Bradford County; R.W. "Ronnie" Dougherty, Nassau; Dale Carson, Jacksonville; R.T. 

Over a span of three decades beginning in 1953, he became one of the principal movers and shapers (sic) responsible for ushering in a "golden age" of professional law enforcement, and for thoroughly modernizing the office of Sheriff.

That's saying a lot, but it's true, and it all began in the basement of Florida's old Capitol. The way the late Broward Coker used to tell it, the Florida Sheriffs Association needed an attorney back in 1953, and Coker, who was then Sheriff of Highlands County, was checking around Tallahassee to see who was available.

His search led him to the Capitol basement where he encountered Madigan, a young World War II Navy veteran who had not been out of law school very long. Madigan was in a converted broom closet, working as a fledgling Assistant Attorney General, and it didn't take Coker long to sign him up. Coker must have somehow sensed the dichotomy between Madigan's meagre salary and his abiding love of good food and the good life.

In any event, Madigan emerged from the Capitol basement, opened a private law practice, and took on the Florida Sheriffs Association as one of his first clients. It was a marriage of convenience that blossomed into a 30-year affair — and not at all by chance.

The timing was so providential, it seemed thoroughly uncanny. Surely the phase of the moon, the Zodiac and Madigan's bio-rythmic cycles must have been perfectly in sync, because he couldn't have picked a better time to get involved.

A revolution of sorts was brewing inside the Sheriffs Association. Recently-elected "young turks" (Ed Blackburn, John Spottswood, Snag Thompson, Broward Coker and Don McLeod, to name a few) had grabbed control of the Association, and the thing they needed most was a man in the Jeffersonian mold to give shape and substance to their yearnings for change and progress.

Madigan filled that need. During the next 30 years he played a major role in the march of events that thoroughly professionalized the Office of Sheriff.

One of his first chores for the Sheriffs Association was drafting the law that took Sheriffs off the antiquated fee system, with its potential for corruption, and put them on a modern budget-salary system. He not only drafted an appropriate bill for the legislature, but also helped to work out the strategy that got it passed.

This was only the first in a series of progressive moves in which Madigan played a major role. He helped to establish the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, which later evolved into the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. He had a hand in setting up the Florida Law Enforcement Academy and the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

When Sheriffs agreed that there should be professional standards for Florida's law enforcement officers, he helped to get a suitable law passed.

He was equally adept at getting good laws passed and bad ones killed. He also had a touch of genius when it came to getting state, municipal and county law enforcement agencies to work together for common goals. In the legislative arena he was a power to be reckoned with, and yet he managed to endow the craft of lobbying with a mantle of respect and integrity.

When Jack Madigan died suddenly on February 8, 1984, at the age of 64, law enforcement lost a good friend, a stout champion, and an able defender. Some said his passing marked the end of an era. Perhaps it did, but it did not mark the end of the things he believed in... the things he worked for. The advancements he helped to bring about are certain to remain alive and flourishing for many years to come.

JACKSONVILLE — A large crowd of friends and former associates gathered here January 11, for a luncheon celebrating the 89th birthday of former Duval County Sheriff Rex Sweat, and to honor Sweat as one of law enforcement's pioneers.

Dale Carson, the present Jacksonville Sheriff, served as master of ceremonies, and reminded the audience that Sweat was responsible for many advancements during his 24 years as Sheriff, from 1933 to 1957.

These included, said Carson, Florida's first schoolboy patrol, the first use of polygraph (lie detector) equipment, and the first short wave radio system for communicating with patrol cars.

Carson said Sweat was one of the first Sheriffs to place strong emphasis on professionalism by sending his men to the FBI National Academy, and by establishing in-service training for his officers.

"During all those turbulent years of the twenties and thirties," said Carson, "organized crime was moving into a lot of places in Florida, but, thanks to Rex, it never got a foothold here in Jacksonville and Duval County."

After reminding the audience that Sweat was a past president of the Florida Peace Officers Association, the Florida Sheriffs Association, and the National Sheriffs Association, Carson brought up a statement Sweat had made to his deputies when he first became Sheriff.

"He just insisted that they practice the golden rule and treat other people like they would want to be treated themselves," said Carson. "I think we can use

that today in law enforcement as well as they could back then."

Sweat received a number of gifts, including a Florida Sheriffs Association belt buckle presented to him by Carson. A television set and a clothing store gift certificate which had been purchased by friends, were presented by Neptune Beach Mayor Ish Brant, who was identified as the originator of the birthday party idea.

Former Florida Governor Haydon Burns praised Sweat for his outstanding law enforcement career. Jacksonville Mayor Jake M. Godbold, who was unable to attend, sent Sweat a resolution declaring January 11 "Rex Sweat Day."

Messages of congratulations were received from Governor Bob Graham, and Congressmen Charles E. Bennett and William V. Chappell, Jr.

"This," said Sweat, "is one of the finest things that has ever happened to me."

A heavy halo of history hangs over the badges Sheriffs and deputies wear as a symbol of their authority.

The word itself was brought to England by the Norman Conquerors and went through a long evolution from bage to

bagge to badge.


During the age of chivalry, the banners that knights and their men at arms carried into battle to identify friend from foe were called badges. Symbols from the family coat of arms were displayed on these banners. Later the same symbols were displayed on the tunics of soldiers. It was an inexpensive way of putting one's men into uniform.

Yeomen Warders, those famous "Beefeaters" constantly assaulted by tourists' cameras at the Tower of London, still wear the royal badge (a crowned rose, thistle and shamrock).

Badges flourished between the 14th and 16th centuries as emblems of allegiance to various members of the aristocracy. Later their use broadened and it became customary to make them of metal.

Around 1600 that famous word-dropper, William Shakespeare, was seasoning his sonnets and plays with the word in question. So was his contemporary, Spanish novelist Miguel de Cervantes. Shakespeare called sweet mercy "nobility's badge." Cervantes injected "badge of honor" into his prose.

The five-pointed star is wellgrounded in antiquity as an appropriate badge symbol. It appeared on the Earl of Oxford's coat-of-arms, and in those days was called a molet.



Lingual corruption caused molet to evolve into mullet, but, happily, it soon dropped into obscurity. (Imagine a Sheriff saying to his deputy; "Go shine up your mullet, Murphy!")

George Washington's family coat-of-arms was adorned with five-pointed stars, and also — appropriately — with stripes.

One school of trivia collecting claims that English policemen were called "cops" because of the copper badges they wore. In the 19th century some U.S. policemen wore copper, some wore tin, and some wore engraved silver badges. Today silver and gold-plated badges are "in;" tin and copper are "out."

The present design of the star badge worn by Florida's Sheriffs is of recent origin. A law passed some 30 years ago made it official.
