President's Message:

Let's tell them we're serious!

At times it may look to the public as though we are playing games with criminals. We are all aware that some criminals slide through loopholes in the criminal justice system; some are let off with light sentences; and some use technicalities to avoid the consequences of their criminal acts.

These things happen, but not because we are playing games. They happen because the criminal justice system is big and complex and subject to human error and weaknesses.

The truth of the matter is that the criminal justice system has never been more serious about fighting crime, and the evidence is all around us.


For instance, a new emphasis is being placed upon the rights of victims and witnesses. Victim Advocacy Programs are being implemented all over Florida to make victims aware they have a right to be free from intimidation, to receive financial compensation under certain circumstances, and to be guided through the complexities of the court system.

This will create a better break for victims and witnesses, and also some serious problems for lawbreakers who are on trial. I have seen evidence that courts are less likely to concede to the accused in bond hearings, trials and other proceedings, if the victims are present and aware of their rights. Bringing victims "into the picture" is a positive step — and just one of many.

The guidelines currently being used in Florida's courts to give uniformity to sentences handed down by judges are also a step in the right direction. I'll have to admit I have had some misgivings about them — particularly when it seemed to me that they were resulting in shorter sentences, and this was putting into crowded county jails serious offenders who should have gone to state prisons.

However, the purpose behind the guidelines, which is to end disparity in sentences, is clearly commendable, and, if some of their present deficiencies are eliminated, the public will soon become aware that the criminal justice system is not engaged in a game of trivial pursuit.

Some folks felt that Sheriffs were just fooling

around on the fringes of the crime problem when they began putting uniformed deputy sheriffs in public schools as resource officers, and the skeptics couldn't have been more wrong.

These resource officers are not disciplinarians waiting around to pounce on kids who break the law. They do prevent vandalism and other criminal acts on school property, but they also serve as friendly counselors, teach youngsters how the criminal justice system works, and create a friendly image for law enforcement.

The good work they are doing now will pay handsome dividends years hence, by making citizens more knowledgeable about the criminal justice system. I don't think I am exaggerating when I predict that it will also help to create a new era of respect for law enforcement — a renaissance of good citizenship.

Old-timers tell me that law enforcement used to be a very lonely profession. The officers had a job to do, and there was very little cheering or helping from the sidelines.

What a difference now! Citizens are volunteering all over the place and showing their willingness to get involved. Neighborhood Watch programs are making life miserable for petty thieves, vandals and their ilk. Ordinary citizens are giving extraordinary help to law enforcement agencies by calling in crime-solving tips





to "Crime Stopper" programs. Thousands of non-paid volunteers are joining auxiliary units to give valuable help to full-time paid officers.

And, believe me, citizen involvement is no Mickey Mouse deal. A Sheriff in a large county reported recently that the services he received from auxiliary units in 1984 would have drained at least \$1 million out of his budget if he had been paying salaries to the volunteers.

Florida's citizens are really serious about getting involved. Many who volunteer for reserve and auxiliary duty provide their own uniforms and equipment. All are required to devote many hours to professional training.

In a very positive way these volunteers are symbolic of the mood that seems to be pervading law enforcement at the present time. Instead of accepting crime as a cancer that cannot be cured, citizens and criminal justice practitioners are really getting serious about remedies.

Some even share my feeling that, if the present mood continues, our crime problems can be reduced substantially. I believe that such an outcome is entirely possible, and, just in case the criminal element isn't aware of what's going on, I am persuaded the time has come to send out a message. Let's give them a clear warning. Let's tell them we're serious!

Historical Highlight - "I believe if you give respect, you'll get respect. You can never lose compassion for people. If you lose it, just pack your shoes and head home." These were among the parting thoughts of Hillsborough County Sheriff Malcolm Beard in 1978 when he hung up his badge and began a career in the Florida Legislature. He is presently a State Senator.




Commemorating 75 years of progress

We've come a long way, and this 75th Anniversary Issue of The Sheriff's Star is a salute to the many outstanding people who have made it happen.

Our cover . . .

... symbolizes the Sheriffs Association's 75 years of progress by combining a "flivver" like the ones Sheriffs were using in 1910 with a modern patrol car and a helicopter. Volusia County Sheriff Edwin H. Duff II, pictured in the foreground, is also a symbol of progress because of his 43-year career as an FBI agent and Sheriff, but that's not the reason he's on the cover. Sheriff Duff happens to be just one year younger than the Sheriffs Association, and he is the oldest Sheriff now in office in Florida.

Seventy-Five — and Very Much Alive!

Sheriffs Association has progressed far beyond the modest aim of its founders

The Florida Sheriffs Association was founded in 1910 "to the end that Sheriffs of Florida may be brought into closer touch with each other for their mutual benefit."

Seventy-five years later this modest objective — which was spelled out in the preamble to the Association's original constitution — has been totally eclipsed. The Association has outgrown its original goals dramatically, and is currently engaged in a broad spectrum of law enforcement, crime prevention and child care activities that the original founders could not possibly have envisioned.

But then, law enforcement has also changed dramatically in the past 75 years, and the evolution of the Sheriffs Association has merely kept pace with these changes.

In the early days of Florida's statehood, the pillory, the branding iron, the whip, the hangman's noose, and the post to which culprit's ears were nailed were accepted as instruments of justice ordered by the courts and administered by Sheriffs.

Conditions were somewhat less primitive when the Sheriffs Association was chartered in 1910, but crime fighting was still in the "horse and buggy" era, and only a few patrol cars were in use.

As late as 1928, Sheriffs were still depending on the badge, the gun, and the Model A Ford as the basic tools of their trade. There were times when they had to resort to riding horseback to penetrate almost inaccessible locations in rural areas.

In the 1930s Sheriffs were considering the possibility of a statewide communications system. They were also talking about setting up "crime control stations" equipped with submachine guns, gas pistols, sawed-off shotguns and high-powered rifles. These outposts were to constitute a "line of defense" across the entire state to bottle up fleeing fugitives.

Available records fail to show whether or not this "line of defense" ever materialized, but at least we have evidence that Sheriffs were in the forefront of efforts to modernize law enforcement.

These efforts were slow-paced between 1910 and 1930, and so was the progress of the Sheriffs Association. Historical sources show that the Association faltered after 1910 and became inactive about 1915. It was revived and reorganized in 1928, and has

remained active since that time.

During the 1930s and 40s the Association was involved in strengthening Florida's criminal laws, improving law enforcement communications, and opposing efforts to establish a state police force.

Now, as a result of the groundwork laid in that era, Florida is nearing the end of the 20th century without the stigma of a state police, and the power and prestige of Sheriffs are still essentially intact.

The emphasis and primary thrust of law enforcement has remained at the local level in the hands of elected officials, and state agencies have continued to play a vital role in specialized areas such as enforcement of traffic, conservation and beverage laws.

Working together through their Association, Sheriffs sponsored creation of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau as the state's first statewide crime fighting agency in 1955, and they were actively involved in running it until legislative action in 1967 and 1969 caused it to evolve into the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) under control of the Governor and cabinet.

Patterned after England's famous Scotland Yard, the Bureau was created to assist local law enforcement agencies by providing a crime laboratory, trained specialists, top-notch investigators, centralized crime files and professional training.

Bureau agents — following the Scotland Yard tradi-

tion — did not get involved in crime investigations unless requested to do so by the Sheriff in charge.

Today, FDLE agents do their job without waiting for an invitation, and their agency offers a broader spectrum of technical services than the Bureau was ever able to achieve. The FDLE presents a much more prominent profile than the Bureau did, and it has been praised for its effectiveness. Nevertheless, the fact remains that it owes its founding to the progressive impulses of Sheriffs.

Creating the Sheriffs Bureau was an important accomplishment, but it was only one of many achievements credited to the Sheriffs Association during a notable surge of progress that began in 1955, and is still continuing in 1985.

In this era Sheriffs worked together as a team to:

- ★ Put deputies into uniforms and standardize patrol car markings;
- ★ Develop a budget-salary system of operating their departments in order to abolish the antiquated fee system and its evils;
- ★ Create a statewide radio and teletype communications network;
- * Establish the Florida Law Enforcement Academy as a training center for all levels of law enforcement, from rookie to "top brass";

- ★ Provide college scholarships for outstanding students from the Florida School for Boys, a state institution for young lawbreakers;
- ★ And sponsor a 1967 law that established professional standards for law enforcement officers.

In 1957, the Sheriffs Association founded the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, a home for needy and neglected youngsters supported entirely by voluntary contributions. This unique project served as a model for Sheriffs in numerous other states, and it has been expanded into a statewide network of child care facilities operated by the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund.

Linked together in this network are the Boys Ranch, Girls Villa, Youth Ranch and Youth Camp; and plans are being developed for future expansion.

Clearly, the history of the Florida Sheriffs Association is a pageant of progress featuring dedicated men of vision who pioneered many advancements in their chosen profession.

And, there is no doubt that future historians who research Florida's forward march in the field of law enforcement will be hard pressed to find any worthwhile venture that was not launched or actively supported by Sheriffs.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

Sheriffs Association didn't begin to hit its stride as a leader until the 1950s

Although it was founded in 1910, the Florida Sheriffs Association did not begin to hit its full stride as a leader in law enforcement until the 1950s. During the Association's first 40 years Sheriffs held annual conventions, struggled to maintain their image as "the first line of defense in local self-government," lobbied for improvement of criminal laws, and opposed sporadic efforts to create a state police; but, most of the time they seemed to be just sort of "jogging in place."

TH ANNIVERSARY

The major turning point came in 1953 when a group of newly-elected "young turks" teamed up with some progressive old-timers to shake the organization out of its lethargy. That was the beginning of a phenomenal march of progress — one that is still continuing today.

Not long after the "young turks" were sworn in, they were successful in getting their cohorts to agree on standardizing badges, deputies' uniforms and patrol car markings. This was the first in a long succession of progressive moves, and here are others that followed:

1955

* Responding to a request from the Florida Sheriffs Association, the Florida Legislature created the Florida Sheriffs Bureau to assist and coordinate Florida's law enforcement agencies. The concept was broad and ambitious, but the new agency got off to a shaky start. It began with five employees headed by Director Don McLeod, a former Marion County Sheriff, and meagre funds borrowed from various other state agencies.

1957

★ The Sheriffs Bureau received its first appropriation of funds from the Florida Legislature. It was small, only \$534,495, but enough to guarantee survival and increase the staff of investigators from four to eight.

★ The Sheriffs Association founded the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch as a home for needy and neglected youngsters, and selected a building site on the

Suwannee River, near Live Oak.

★ The Sheriffs Association launched a unique project to provide college scholarships for outstanding students from the Florida School for Boys, a state institution for young lawbreakers.

★ The By-laws were changed to permit private citizens to become honorary members of the Sheriffs Association. Their dues of \$10 a year helped to finance the Boys Ranch and scholarship programs.

★ The Sheriff's Star, a monthly publication, was started in March, 1957. At that time the Sheriffs Association was also publishing The Florida Sheriff, an annual yearbook dating back to the 1930s. Later on, the yearbook became a special edition of The Sheriff's Star.

★ Sheriffs began phasing out the antiquated fee system of compensation that paid them various sums for official duties such as making arrests, transporting prisoners and serving court papers. By the end of 1957 there were 48 counties operating under a new budget-salary system designed by the Sheriffs Association and implemented by the Florida Legislature. Salaries ranged from \$6,000 per year in the smallest counties, to \$12,000 in large counties.

1958

* Groundbreaking ceremony held for first building at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

* The Sheriffs Bureau marked its third anniversary with a staff of 36 people, a small crime lab, and Florida's first centralized, statewide criminal identification system. The Bureau was also coordinating a statewide communications network utilizing teletype and radio equipment.


1959


- ★ The first youngsters were enrolled at the Boys Ranch.
- * By this time the fee system of financing Sheriff's Departments was completely phased out, and all departments were operating under the new budget-salary system

1960

★ A survey revealed that Sheriffs constituted "Florida's largest and most potent coordinated crime-fighting force," with 1,280 deputies and 815 patrol cars. Municipal police departments had approximately 4,000 officers and 2,000 cars, but lacked the close coordination available to Sheriffs through the Sheriffs Bureau and the Sheriffs' com-

munications network. The only other force of any size operating on a statewide coordinated basis at this time was the Florida Highway Patrol, a traffic law enforcement agency with 400 men and 400 patrol cars.

★ The Florida Sheriffs Bureau played a major role in helping to solve the sensational murder of Circuit Judge and Mrs. C. E. Chillingworth, who vanished from their oceanfront home near West Palm Beach, on June 15, 1955. One of the most intensive and sustained manhunts in Florida's history revealed that the Chillingworths had been weighted with chains and drowned in the Atlantic Ocean. The culprits arrested and convicted in the case included a city judge.

1961

★ The death of W. R. (Bill) England on August 6, 1961, ended an era in which Sheriffs made giant strides to professionalize their departments. After retiring from the State Auditor's Office in 1949, England worked as a consultant for the Sheriffs Association to improve Sheriffs' bookkeeping, civil process procedures, and other aspects of their operations. He also had a hand in producing the original Florida Sheriffs Manual, a handbook of standard operating procedures that is still being distributed and updated by the Sheriffs Association.

1962

★ The Sheriffs Association, with Jack Madigan as its attorney and lobbyist, was becoming increasingly effective in its efforts to improve Florida's laws and initiate legislative action aimed at modernizing law enforcement.

★ The hiring of Harry K. Weaver, former federal court probation officer, as administrator of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, marked the beginning of phenomenal growth and success. With Weaver in charge, the initial child care venture of the Sheriffs Association eventually expanded into a statewide network of facilities providing help for both boys and girls. Today Weaver is the President of the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund, the agency that operates the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, Girls Villa, Youth Ranch and Youth Camp. Plans are currently being developed for an additional youth ranch and youth camp.

*Sheriffs, working together through their Association, founded the Florida Law Enforcement Academy, Florida's first statewide training facility for city, county, state and federal law enforcement officers. A building site was chosen near the Tallahassee Airport, and arrangements were made for Florida Sheriffs Bureau staff members to run the Academy.

1964

★ The Academy was completed early in 1964, and the first class of 33 city, county and state law enforcement officers was enrolled on February 9, 1964. Dedication rites featuring addresses by Governor Farris Bryant and cabinet members were held on February 12, 1964. Florida Sheriffs Bureau Special Agent Berwin Williams was appointed Director of Training.

* A testimonial banquet in Jacksonville, February 6, 1964, honored banker John P. Hall for his 36 years of distinguished service as Sheriff of Clay County—an all-time record for Florida. From 1929 to 1965 he was actively involved in every major Sheriffs Association project. During that span of years his fellow-Sheriffs elected him to numerous offices in the Association, including President, Treasurer and member of the Board of Directors. He also served as a Trustee and Treasurer of the Boys Ranch, and as a member of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau's Administrative Board.

* Mortgages negotiated in 1957 to start the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch were paid off in 1964 and burned during ceremonies dedicating a \$50,000 residence cottage in memory of Suwannee County Sheriff Hugh Lewis, one of the Boys Ranch founders. The dedication rites were held on April 5, 1964.

1965

★ The Florida Sheriffs Bureau moved into greatly expanded quarters in the new Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission building (Bryant Building) after wandering around Tallahassee's Capitol Center from a tiny honeymoon cottage with 1,200 square feet of floor space to a ramshackle build-



It was 1966. The Florida Sheriffs Bureau was planning to computerize its crime files and link them with similar files in other states and Washington, D.C. ing that slum clearance overlooked, to a small corner of the Carlton Building. Now, with 19,000 square feet, the Bureau for the first time had quarters to match its top-notch equipment and personnel.

1966

★ The Sheriffs Association played an active role in developing minimum standards for Florida's law enforcement officers. Four Sheriffs served on the Advisory Council appointed by Governor Haydon Burns on February 24, 1966, to make a comprehensive study of proposed standards and submit recommendations.

★ Former Baker County Sheriff Ed Yarbrough succeeded Don McLeod as Director of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau on June 1, 1966.

1967

★ When the Florida Sheriffs Bureau became the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement by action of the 1967 Legislature, one of the resulting changes was a decision to take the Bureau out of the law enforcement training business. This left the Sheriffs Association without a staff to operate its Law Enforcement Academy, and Academy classes were halted.

1968

★ The former Florida Law Enforcement Academy on January 4, 1968, became Florida's first state-operated "halfway house" for juvenile delinquents released from the state's training schools. It was turned over to the Florida Division of Youth Services under a lease-purchase agreement in which the Sheriffs Association volunteered to contribute \$50,000 of the \$150,000 selling price, if the state exercised its option to purchase the Academy buildings.

1969

★ Iven S. Lamb, Jr., Director of the Department of Police Science and Administration at Florida Junior College, Jacksonville, was hired by the Sheriffs Association to compile a complete update of the Florida Sheriffs Manual (a comprehensive guidebook covering Sheriffs' duties and responsibilities), and to make periodic revisions on a continuing basis.

★ On September 19, 1969, the Sheriffs Association voted to establish the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa as its second child care institution. Later a site was selected near Bartow.

1970

* When a jurisdictional dispute developed between the Leon County Sheriff's Department and the Tallahassee Police Department, Circuit Judge Guyte McCord, Jr., ruled that whenever there is an irreconcilable conflict of this nature, "The power of the Sheriff... is paramount, and the police should give way to the Sheriff." In support of his opinion, Judge McCord quoted the Florida Supreme Court's 1935 declaration that "The office of Sheriff is one of ancient origin," and the holder of the office "has always been the chief executive officer and conservator of peace in his county."

1971

★ Ground was broken on August 27, 1971, for the first building at the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa site, two miles east of Bartow.

1972

★ The first girls were enrolled at the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa on August 22, 1972.

1973

★ Gulf County Sheriff Byrd E. Parker was 78 when he hung up his badge at the beginning of 1973. He appears to have been Florida's oldest Sheriff, and his 36 years in office enabled him to tie the service record set by Clay County Sheriff John P. Hall in 1964. ★ While discussing heroes of the political wars, an old-timer brought up the legendary Haywood Thomas (Bill) Williams, who was elected Sheriff of Brevard County five times without opposition, and retired in 1957 without ever having to face a political opponent.

* Responding to a trend toward collective bargaining in law enforcement, Sheriffs attending the Annual Conference of their Association passed by unanimous vote a resolution strongly opposing unionization of deputy sheriffs. They gave numerous reasons why the unique status of deputies made collective bargaining neither acceptable, nor necessary.

★ Berwin Williams resigned as Executive Director of Region One, Governor's Council on Criminal Justice, and, on Novermber 1, became the Sheriffs Association's first Director of Research and Development. At that point his law enforcement career had spanned almost 25 years and a variety of professional roles.

1975

★ A special issue of *The Sheriff's Star* was devoted to the expanding role of women in law enforcement — "those pioneers in pantyhose" who were gaining male respect and approval in jobs such as patrol deputies that had formerly been held exclusively by men. According to the Police Foundation, there were

In 1975, law enforcement was witnessing a revolution. Women were holding jobs as road patrol deputies, bailiffs, scuba divers, and department heads that had formerly been held exclusively by men. Among the women "leading the charge" were Bonnie Lewis, a rookie Pinellas County Deputy, who learned how to hog tie a gator from Game Warden Dave Stermen; Patrol Deputies Elizabeth Cline and Connie Johnson; and Mrs. Carolyn Ivey, who scored 97.2 points out of a possible 100 when she became the first trained woman member of Sheriff Dale Carson's Four-Wheel-Drive Posse.

fewer than a dozen women on patrol nationwide in 1971, and the total mushroomed to about 1,000 in 1974, with a similar increase in the use of women in supervisory positions.

1976

★ The Sheriffs Association teamed up with the Attorney General's "Help Stop Crime" program to sponsor a successful "Three years to life" campaign which made criminals and potential criminals aware of a tough new law giving anyone carrying a gun while committing a serious crime at least three years in prison with no hope of parole, probation or judicial leniency. Outdoor advertising companies, newspapers, radio and television stations donated free advertising.

1977

★ The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch celebrated its 20th anniversary on October 2, 1977, and Governor Reubin Askew proclaimed October 2 through October 8 "Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Week" throughout Florida.

★ Berwin Williams, former Director of Research and Development, succeeded Carl Stauffer as Executive Director of the Sheriffs Association. Stauffer had served 20 years as the paid, full-time executive of the Association.

1978

★ The Sheriff's Star praised State Representative Ed Blackburn's right thumb — the one he had used effectively to shoot down bad bills in the Florida Legislature. Blackburn, a former Hillsborough County Sheriff who helped to create the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch and the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, was retiring from the Florida House of Representatives.

★ Hillsborough County Sheriff Malcolm Beard was elected to the House of Representatives in 1978, and migrated to the Florida Senate in 1980.

1979

★ A report revealed that the Sheriffs Association in almost six years had trained 3,168 deputies and Sheriff's Department employees at regional seminars designed to improve their skills in various technical areas. The man in charge of the seminars was (and still is) Iven S. Lamb, Jr., a Jacksonville attorney and college instructor employed as a consultant by the Sheriffs Association.

★ Sheriffs serving during this era were experienced professionals. A University of Central Florida study showed that 37 percent had five to 12 years of police experience prior to being elected; while 48 percent had over 13 years of prior experience, and only 15 percent fell in the "no experience to four years' experience" category.

THE 1980s

★ "You are the proud protectors of our society," said Governor Bob Graham to Sheriffs attending the Annual Mid-Winter conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, in January, 1980. "You make the words of the preamble to the U.S. Constitution come alive when it states the need to 'insure domestic tranquility.'"

* Along about this time the term "BAT Mobiles" was becoming prominent in the lexicon of law enforcement. "BAT Mobiles" are vans equipped with breath alcohol testing equipment. Sheriffs use them to give "on the scene" tests to suspected drunken drivers. BAT is an acronym derived from Breath Alcohol Testing.

★ "Stings," the undercover fencing operations used by Sheriffs to recover stolen property and catch thieves, were reaching a zenith of success in this decade. Hillsborough County Sheriff Walter C. Heinrich was called "The King of Sting" in 1984 after his department recovered over \$3 million in stolen property and logged almost 300 arrests during a series of



"sting" operations spread over a period of five years.

★ During the 1970s and 80s the Sheriffs Association worked closely with the Florida Department of Corrections and other agencies to bring about sweeping improvements in county jails. Many new jails were built to accommodate Florida's growing inmate population, and many old jails were modernized.

★ Currently, public support for Sheriffs remains strong. The most recent evidence of this emerged in Sarasota County on February 5, 1985, when voters soundly defeated a strong effort to make the Sheriff an appointed (rather than an elected) official, and change his title to Director of Public Safety. In previous years, voters in 16 other Florida counties had voted likewise on the elected vs. appointed issue, and Dade remains the only county in which the chief law enforcement officer is appointed.

Association had one-man staff and no office prior to 1958

Since 1940 the Florida Sheriffs Association has had four paid executives.

W. E. Van Loon, of Jacksonville, served from 1940 to 1953. His title was Field Secretary.

The others are: Carl Stauffer, Field Secretary, 1953-54; Eddie Hafner, Field Secretary, 1954-57; Carl Stauffer, Field Secretary and Executive Director, 1957-77; E. Berwin Williams, Executive Director, 1977 to the present.

Incomplete records fail to show whether or not the Association had a paid executive prior to 1940. They do show, however, that the Field Secretary was the Association's only employee until 1958, the year that Mrs. Walter Godfrey was hired as the Field Secretary's secretary.

In 1958 the Association acquired its first "home base" by renting a one-room office in the old Lewis State Bank Building, in Tallahassee. Prior to that time the paid executive occupied "free" space in the Duval County (Jacksonville) and Leon County (Talla-

hassee) Sheriffs' Departments. Much of his time was spent traveling around the state selling advertising for *The Florida Sheriff*, a magazine that was the Association's primary source of income.

Today, the Association owns an office building in Tallahassee and has 13 full-time employees. Five people are on the part-time payroll.

Sheriffs Bureau Was:

"A Tom Thumb agency doing a Gargantuan job"



It has been said that a lot of crooks merely laughed, shrugged their shoulders and went on about their nefarious business when the Florida Sheriffs Bureau was created by the Florida Legislature in 1955.

Sponsored by the Florida Sheriffs Association, the Bureau was Florida's first statewide crime fighting agency. On paper it was potent, but, in actuality, it was a toothless tiger set adrift by the Legislature without any operating funds.

It could have died from fiscal anemia, but fortunately the Legislature had authorized other state agencies to support it, and their handouts kept it alive through the most crucial months of its existence.

Marion County Sheriff Don McLeod, a professional with an FBI National Academy diploma on his office wall, was hired as the first Director by the Bureau's Administrative Board which was composed of the Governor, Attorney General and five Sheriffs.

That was a start, and in a short time McLeod was in business with a staff of four that included Ross Anderson, former Chief Deputy in the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department; Berwin Williams, a Jackson County deputy sheriff; and two secretaries, Mrs. Bertha Catts and Mrs. Vera Teston. For shelter, this little band moved into a small cottage owned by the state and located one block east of the Capitol.

Laughter turned to applause

Those were quaint, unreal times in the annals of the infant agency, with McLeod and Anderson "bunking" in a back room and the secretaries using borrowed typewriters. Jokes were made about the "world-wide crime fighting network of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau," but the Bureau survived, and in time the laughter turned to applause.

In 1957 the Bureau received its first appropriation from the Florida Legislature — a \$534,495 bonanza that was tiny by Tallahassee standards, but big in the eves of the impoverished Bureau staff.

This allowed the little agency to hire more people

and start moving toward some of its goals. By October 1, 1958, the third anniversary of its founding, the Bureau was able to report that it had 36 employees who were operating a small crime lab, assisting Sheriffs with crime investigations and completing the "start-up" of Florida's first centralized criminal identification system.

In 1964 the Bureau increased its training activities by staffing the Florida Law Enforcement Academy, a training facility for city, county, state and federal officers built by the Sheriffs Association on a site adjacent to the Tallahassee airport.

At about this time newspapers all over Florida were printing an Associated Press story describing the Bureau as "a Tom Thumb agency doing a gargantuan job."

Big case solved "single-handedly"

The article said that although the Bureau had only 11 agents, it had been investigating "virtually every crime of consequence in a state of better than five million people."

The celebrated Chillingworth case involving the brutal murder of a circuit judge and his wife was solved almost single-handedly by the Bureau, the article pointed out, then added:

"More recently, the bureau exposed a ring counterfeiting state warrants, arresting 14 persons and succeeding, thus far... in convicting three who got prison sentences.

"The attempted slaughter of a Bonifay family of three was solved with the arrest of a depraved exconvict for rape and murder, and with his subsequent execution.

"And the killer of Gilchrist County Sheriff Mark Read was brought swiftly to justice in 1956."

Shaped by Sheriffs to resemble England's famous Scotland Yard, the Bureau entered a case only when requested to do so by the Sheriff of a county where the crime occurred.

"We make no arrests, we issue no press releases, and

we seek no publicity," Director McLeod explained. "That way we stay in the background where we work more efficiently."

In 1967 the Florida Legislature "beefed up" the Bureau by giving it more money, more men and more authority. But, the agency also began to lose some of its identity as an entity founded by Sheriffs. Its name was changed to the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement, and for the first time its head man was not a former Sheriff. Bill Reed, a career law enforcement man with a law degree and police experience, took over the top job and the sign on his office door was changed from "Director" to "Commissioner." The new budget authorized 94 employees and operating funds totaling \$1,510,145. Meanwhile, three Sheriffs had been dropped off the governing board and replaced by a police chief, and two state cabinet members: the State Treasurer and State Comptroller.

Elevated to department status

In 1969, the Legislature elevated the Bureau to Department status and changed its name to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE). Another switch was made to Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement (FDCLE) in 1974; and the title returned to Florida Department of Law Enforcement in 1978.

For the 1984-85 fiscal year, FDLE has a budget of \$48 million and a staff of 950. It has come of age, and, although Sheriffs no longer have a hand in determining its destiny, they have not lost their pride of parenthood. They are not likely to forget that this large, successful state agency can trace its roots to the progressive impulses of Florida's Sheriffs.

40 Years Ago:

Serious problems had simple answers



To park a prisoner, you simply chained him to an old oak tree

Turn the calendar back 40 years and try to imagine what it was like to be a deputy sheriff in Collier County, a big chunk of wide open South Florida real estate that stretches 100 miles in one direction and about 60 in the other.

Let's suppose you are in Immokalee, a little frontier type town plopped down in the middle of one of the state's richest vegetable farming areas. You have just arrested a man, and you are 40 miles away from Everglades City, the county seat where the jail is located.

You can't take your prisoner to the jail right away because you have other pressing matters to investigate in Immokalee, so what do you do with him?

You can't leave him cooped up in your patrol car on this blazing hot South Florida day, so you take him to the old oak tree — the one with the heavy metal chain around its trunk — and you handcuff him to the chain. Now he can rest in the shade, while you go about your business, and you can retrieve him later when you are

ready to drive to the jail.

Oh yes, there were serious problems back then, but the solutions seemed so simple. At least that's the picture a writer gets while digging around among the memories stored up by Collier County Sheriff Aubrey Rogers during his 37-year law enforcement career.

Rogers was a policeman in Fort Myers when parking prisoners in the shade of the

Collier County, and by the time he became Collier County's Chief Deputy in 1956, the chain on the oak tree had been replaced by a makeshift lockup. However, law enforcement was still an uncomplicated, almost casual business with plenty of opportunities for improvising.

At the side of the Immokalee lockup there was a small shed and a telephone. The janitor who cleaned up around the place was required to answer the phone, and turn on a red light on top of a tall pole if someone wanted to talk to "the law." When a cruising deputy saw the red light, he knew there was a message waiting for him.

Later on, to make the system more efficient, the janitor was given a "walkie talkie" so he could contact patrol cars by radio. This was progress, but for a while the janitor was so nervous about using the newfangled device that he was only able to blurt "message" into the radio mike, and deputies still had to drive to the lockup to get details.

Because Collier County was so vast and radios had not reached a high level of efficiency, Sheriff's deputies and Florida Highway Patrol Troopers were often out of range and could not communicate with their base stations. This was a worrisome problem, but a simple solution was found when one of the officers discovered that he could increase the range of his patrol car radio by parking under the telegraph line that was strung along the highway from Fort Myers to Miami.

This improvised booster system only worked in certain locations, but these spots were easy to find, Rogers said, because the grass had been worn off by patrol cars parking on the shoulder of the road.

In a pinch, deputies could also drive to a remote Forestry Department fire tower, connect their radios to a cable that had been strung to the top of the tower, and get their messages through.

In summer, freaky atmospheric conditions allowed Florida deputies to communicate car-to-car with California deputies. This was helpful. Rogers remembers that there were many times when he could not make direct contact with his own base station, and had to relay messages by way of California.

In those long gone days, Collier County deputies usually carried bed rolls, coffee pots and tin cans in their patrol cars as standard equipment, and for a good reason.

When prisoners escaped from a state road camp in the area, it was customary to seal off the county by setting up road blocks. Then, instead of heading out over the wild terrain in pursuit of their quarry, deputies simply waited until mosquitoes, alligators, heat and hunger forced the fugitives to give themselves up.



Between 1956 and 1975 Rogers was the Chief Deputy and Chief Investigator under Sheriff Doug Hendry.

When two deputies were waiting at a road block, one would throw his bedroll on the hood of his patrol car and catch some sleep, while the other stayed on watch. Later they would switch; and, to break the monotony, they occasionally put some gasoline in a tin can, lit it and brewed some coffee.


That's how it was during some of the 19 years Rogers logged as Chief Deputy, but a new era had arrived by the time he became Sheriff in 1975.

Today, everything has changed. The county seat is in fast-growing Naples instead of remote Everglades City. The seven deputies who were on the payroll in 1956 have been replaced by hundreds of trained professionals.

And the jail well, the present big correctional system with its professional staff, and its new hightech facility that is due to open before the end of 1985, offers a sharp contrast to the old jail Rogers and his family lived in when he was Chief Deputy.

The old jail was literally operated by inmates. One was the "turnkey." One was the cook. Others did chores, and some were even used as babysitters.

Yes, things have really changed. Gone are the telegraph lines that were strung along the highway, but who cares. The Sheriff's modern radio communications system, with its satellite repeaters and other improvements, can now reach all areas of the county, and deputies even have "snatch and go" radios they

can carry with them when they leave their patrol cars.

It's all very complex and professional. The work week is shorter, and putting in 36 hours at a stretch is no longer a common practice for deputies.

But, on the other hand, wouldn't today's highly trained professionals sort of welcome one of those "slow days" from 30 or 40 years ago when a deputy could mix a little fishing and relaxing with his patrol duties? In those days he could always tell the boss he had been out of range and unable to receive any radio messages.

"Rare public official"

NAPLES — In a recent editorial the Naples News called Collier County Sheriff Aubrey Rogers "one of those rare public officials about whom it is hard to say anything but good.

"He has headed the Sheriff's Department through a period of unprecedented growth," the News added, "and has grown with it every step of the way.

"He has been on top of the drug problem like no other Sheriff in the state, and at a time when departments in other counties have been rocked with scandal, there has been not a hint of misconduct within the Collier County Sheriff's Department."

Historical Highlight:

Trapdoor in old jail is a relic of the era when Sheriffs were hangmen

STARKE — Near the end of 1984, when preparations were being made to tear down the 74-year-old Bradford County Jail, a long-forgotten gallows was discovered on the second floor.

This was a grim relic of bygone days when Sheriffs were required to be executioners. It consisted of a trapdoor in the floor, which had been covered up some time in the jail's long history, and a heavy eye bolt in the ceiling from which a hangman's noose could be suspended.

Old newspaper articles reveal that this contraption, with its intricate rod and lever system controlling the trapdoor, was known as a "Patent Gallows." Since similar rigs have been found in a number of old jails, including those in nearby Baker and Hamilton Counties, it seems possible that some handyman in the northeast Florida area was responsible for the tricky mechanism.

When the Bradford County Jail was under construction in 1910, the Bradford County Telegraph, a newspaper published in Starke, reported that work was "going along merrily" and the new gallows had turned out to be a handy device that could be used "as a hoist for materials, as well as a drop for bad men."

Apparently the indoor gallows was never actually used for an execution, since old photographs show that Bradford County's two known public hangings were held on gallows constructed outdoors. However, there has been some talk of preserving the "Patent Gallows" as a reminder of the era when trials were speedy and punishment was swift and certain.

Prior to 1924, the year Florida began using the electric chair at the State Prison, condemned men were hanged in the counties where they had committed their crimes, and Sheriffs were required to carry out the execution.

Hangings were customarily held on the courthouse square, and they drew large crowds of men, women and children — most of them dressed in their "Sunday best."

Perhaps it was the immense popularity of hangings as public events that prevented the "Patent Gallows" from being used. Obviously there would have been a




Bradford County Sheriff Dolph Reddish inspects the "Patent Gallows."

great outcry of public protest if a hanging had been held inside the jail where it could be witnessed by only a few people.



History repeats:

Voters once more reject attempt to make Sheriff an appointed official

Will they ever learn?

When will proponents of "power by appointment" begin to realize that they cannot sell Florida voters on the idea of accepting an appointed rather than an elected Sheriff?

Florida Sheriffs Association records show that the issue has been confronted in at least 17 Florida counties during the past 30 years, and voters in 16 of those counties overwhelmingly supported the concept of an elected Sheriff.

Many years ago Dade County abolished the elected office of Sheriff, and its chief law enforcement officer became an appointed Director of Public Safety. The 66 remaining counties have an elected Sheriff.

Recently, Sarasota County voters wrestled with the issue, and had to go to the polls twice before deciding overwhelmingly that they wanted to continue to elect

The first time they voted was during the General Election, in November, 1984. At that time a slim majority voted in favor of appointing the Sheriff, but there was a loud outcry that the wording of the ballot was confusing and many people either refrained from voting or were not certain how they had voted. It was charged that almost 22,000 people who had cast ballots in the election had skipped over the elected vs. appointed issue because they were confused.

When a majority of the County Commissioners refused to place the issue before the voters a second time, citizens formed a coalition to demand a special election through signed petitions. It was held on February 5, 1985, and this time voters voted overwhelmingly to retain the office of Sheriff as an elected position. The margin of victory was 36,388 to 12,269.

The special election was simply a case of history repeating itself, but it also carved a special niche in the annals of Florida law enforcement for Geoffrey Monge, the man voters had chosen as their new Sheriff in a General Election landslide.

Monge is the only Florida Sheriff who has switched titles from Sheriff to Director of Public Safety and back to Sheriff again. He did it in the space of a few

months, and here's how:

Although Monge was elected Sheriff in November, 1984, voters simultaneously abolished the elected office of Sheriff. Therefore, Monge was sworn-in as Sarasota County's Director of Public Safety to serve out his four-year elected term, after which the Director's position was to become appointive.

The special election on February 5 changed Monge's title back to Sheriff again, effective May 1, 1985, and his continuity in office will be subject to the

will of the voters again in 1988.

Among those who rejoiced at the outcome of the special election was County Commissioner Mabry Carlton, the first Commissioner to declare in November that voters had not understood the General Election ballot.

"I told you! I told you!" he shouted as he watched the results of the February 5 special election. "The people have regained control of their government. There was never a doubt in my mind. The people want to elect their leaders."

"The sweetest and gentlest Sheriff of them all"

PENSACOLA - Escambia County Deputy Sheriffs in uniform were pallbearers, Escambia County Sheriff Vince Seely and Sheriffs from neighboring counties were honorary pallbearers, patrol cars escorted the funeral procession, and Mrs. Celia King was laid to rest here February 25, with all the honors due a true law enforcement officer.

Mrs. King, who died on February 21, at the age of 86, was the first woman to actively serve as Sheriff in Florida. She was appointed Sheriff of Walton County on April 15, 1938, by Governor Fred P. Cone, after her first husband, Sheriff Daniel Clayton Adkinson, was killed in the line of duty.

She served until an election was held, and, although she did not run for the office, she was more than a figurehead while she held the title of Sheriff. Some Sheriffs' widows who were appointed in other counties during the same era merely served in an honorary capacity, but Mrs. Adkinson, who later became Mrs. King, was always proud of the fact that she carried out the full duties of the office.

A few years ago she admitted to an interviewer that she had carried a gun in her purse, but fortunately did not have to use it. She declared she was "a pretty good shot," and could "hit a bottle floating in the water from a reasonable distance."

Although she was a diminutive, soft spoken woman, lawbreakers gave Mrs. Adkinson proper respect, according to stories that have survived in Walton County. If she had a warrant for a man's arrest, she merely invited him to come to the jail and go through the booking procedure. They say her invitations were never turned down, and therefore she never had to make an arrest in the usual manner with handcuffs and other restraints.

Long after she had hung up her badge and removed the gun from her purse, Mrs. King kept in touch with her friends in the law enforcement business. While in her late 70s she was still attending conferences of the Florida Sheriffs Association — her passport being a lifetime honorary membership in the Association.

After the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch was founded in 1957, she visited the Ranch frequently, although it was almost 300 miles away from her home in Pensacola. Numerous times she gave the youngsters flannel board Bible talks, and they in turn adopted her unofficially as one of their foster grandparents.

She is survived by one son, two daughters, eight grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. How proud they must be as descendants of a woman who was called by one of her law enforcement friends: "the sweetest and gentlest Sheriff of them all."

Relics of another era

After 140 years:

"Yardstick" sought for future Sheriffs

Historic action taken during Annual Mid-Winter Conference

For almost 140 years of Florida history, the constitutional qualifications of the "high Sheriff" have been about on a par with those of the governor, cabinet members and other prominent officials.

He is only required to be an elector (registered to vote in Florida), but Sheriffs attending the Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association in West Palm Beach, January 27-29, decided that's not good enough for today's high level of professionalism in law enforcement.

They voted to seek a constitutional amendment that will permit other standards such as experience and training to be written into Florida law.

If they are successful, they will shoot down the often-heard argument that "anyone can run for Sheriff, and therefore Sheriffs should be appointed rather than elected to guarantee that qualified people are chosen."

This argument comes up every time voters are given an opportunity to make their Sheriff an appointed rather than elected official, but, after looking at the calibre of Florida's Sheriffs, voters have not been swayed. (A good example occurred in Sarasota County recently when an attempt to make the Sheriff an appointed official was soundly defeated.)

Electing unqualified Sheriffs has not been a serious problem in Florida. A 1984 survey showed that Sheriffs then in office were averaging 20 years of law enforcement experience. But, there is always the possibility that the voters could slip up and elect a totally unfit candidate.

Years ago Sheriffs were instrumental in setting minimum standards for their deputies, and, to do the same for themselves, will be one more advance in their long list of professional achievements.

Minimum standards for Sheriffs was only one item on a long agenda at the Mid-Winter Conference. Sheriffs also:


★ Voted unanimously in favor of a proposed law that would change future Sheriffs' elections from partisan to non-partisan;

★ Voted to take no position at this time on a current proposal to create a statewide prosecutor;

★ Demonstrated their concern for the rights of crime victims and witnesses by discussing ways

and means of setting up Victim Advocacy Programs;

* Agreed to push for passage of a new law that will allow law enforcement and correctional officers to counterclaim for damages up to \$1,000 against anyone who sues them frivolously or maliciously.

Bill to reduce frivolous lawsuits has support of Senate President

WEST PALM BEACH — When he addressed the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association here January 28, Senate President Harry A. Johnston II told Sheriffs he will give strong support to a bill they are sponsoring to reduce the number of frivolous and malicious lawsuits filed against law enforcement and correctional officers.

This bill would allow officers to file counterclaims against anyone who sues them "as part of a conspiracy to misuse judicial process," and they would be able to collect up to \$1,000 in damages, plus reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs.

Sheriffs were pleased with Johnston's endorsement of their proposed bill, but took a wary attitude toward another proposal aimed at creating a statewide prosecutor.

"We must be able to address sophisticated, complicated criminal enterprises without stumbling over artificial geographical lines drawn for governmental organizational convenience, yet ignored by criminal enterprises," said Johnston.

Later Sheriffs discussed current efforts to centralize prosecution of crimes in Florida, and decided they wanted to wait until a specific bill is drafted before taking a stand.

Johnston expressed concern about the "fragmentation" of Florida's criminal justice system, which "has not evolved in accordance with any particular plan."

He said Florida law enforcement will have to reduce its fragmentation and lack of coordination "in order to meet the needs of the populace.

"This is not something new," he added. "It is rather a long-standing problem, but it is one which we can no longer afford to neglect.

"Historically, Florida law enforcement has sought local law enforcement autonomy. This rejection of a strong, centralized law enforcement presence parallels the political and social philosophy of Florida, not only in the area of law enforcement but also in the area of prosecution.

"Although acceptable in the past, this approach to crime becomes less so as our population and technological know-how increase."

First Sheriff was a loner who used a mop and broom

TAMPA — Today it requires around 1,000 people to carry out essentially the same duties that Hillsborough County's first Sheriff handled all by himself.

John Parker, a former military captain in the Seminole Indian Wars, became the first Sheriff in 1845 when Florida was admitted to the Union, and the Sheriff's Department apparently functioned as a one-man operation for at least ten years. The first recorded mention of a deputy sheriff was found in County Commission minutes dated 1857.

Then, as now, law enforcement was the Sheriff's business, but he was also required to do menial jobs such as cleaning the courthouse and planting chinaberry trees on the courthouse property.

The pay was so poor that early Sheriffs had to have other careers on the side as merchants and businessmen to support their families.

During the 19th Century, Sheriffs had several duties that are no longer required. One of them, which dates back to 1857, was making a list of all school

children in the county and receiving a fee of five cents for each name. Another, prior to the Civil War, involved picking up all slaves who were found roaming around after their 9 p.m. curfew.

Hillsborough County was established in 1834 and covered an area now occupied by ten counties. Carved from it were Polk, Pasco, Pinellas, Manatee, Sarasota, Charlotte, DeSoto, Hardee and Highlands counties.

The first Hillsborough County Jail was built in 1834 at a cost of \$200, and the second was erected on Tam-

pa's "Courthouse Square" in 1848 at a cost of \$345.

The Sheriff's Department acquired its first patrol car, a Model T Ford, in 1913 at a cost of \$500, and added a motorcycle a year later.

In 1929 the first uniforms were issued to deputies. In 1941 the first radios were installed in patrol cars, but they could only receive messages from the base station, and could not transmit replies. Two-way radios became standard equipment in 1945.

The office of Sheriff has roots that run deep into antiquity

Sheriffs stand tall in modern, progressive law enforcement, but their roots also run deep into antiquity. The Bible tells us, in the Book of Daniel, chapter 3, verse 2, that when Nebuchadnezzar the king was ready to dedicate a golden image in Babylon he called together the high officials, including princes, governors, captains, judges, treasurers, counsellors and Sheriffs.

Some historians have traced the office back to the ancient Roman pro-counsuls. Others are persuaded the office may have been derived from Saxon Germany.

It has been said that the the word Sheriff came from the Arabic word *Sharif*, which literally translates as *illustrious* or *noble* and signifies an Arab chief or prince.

Ancient England was divided into shires, similar to our counties, and each shire had a boss who was called the reeve. Some researchers claim that these two words were eventually linked into the title, *Shire-Reeve*, and this evolved into the word *Sheriff*.

Shire-reeves were appointed by noblemen and kings to maintain peace and tranquility — a role that modern Sheriffs are still attempting to fill.

Under Norman rule, English Sheriffs gained power not only as law enforcement officials, but also as tax collectors. Sheriffs were mentioned numerous times in the *Magna Carta*, an ancient English "bill of rights," and were present when it was signed. Later on they became appointees of the king — an extension of his authority.

There have been attempts to show that America was named for Richard Amerycke, who was the High Sheriff of Bristol, England, in 1503, and while this has not been proven conclusively, there is no doubt that the office of Sheriff was woven into the political fabric of the colonies during early stages of their development.

Apparently the office of Sheriff was transplanted to the North American continent as early as 1634 when the first counties were established in Virginia. Not long afterward, Thomas Jefferson called the office of Sheriff "the most important of all the executive offices of the county."

During colonial times Sheriffs had ceremonial duties such as announcing the coronation of English kings and queens. They served official papers, and when culprits were sentenced it was their duty to carry out the punishment. Miscreants were whipped for "opprobrious language," and pilloried for perjury.

During the heydey of the "wild west," Sheriffs became legendary figures, and were credited with exploits into which both fact and fiction were carelessly woven.

Nevertheless, the fact remains that Sheriffs have played important roles throughout many centuries, and they are still making history as leaders in the current modernization of law enforcement.

Murders were rare in the 1940s

ORLANDO — When the late "Big Jim" Black was Sheriff of Orange County in the 1940s murders were rare, cattle rustling was common, and the Sheriff's Department was paid \$3.50 for each arrest that was made.

"Enforcing the law was quite a lot different than it is now," said Black, in a 1983 interview, "because we only had about 70,000 people in the county. There wasn't near as much to do."

Today, Orange County's population is over 500,000, and law enforcement is a complex business that could not operate without computers, helicopters and modern communications devices.

"You have more killings in one day than I had in eight years," Black said in the 1983 interview. He recalled that there were only four murders, and all were solved, during the two terms he served from 1941 to 1949.

When Black became Sheriff, the only crime-fighting equipment the department had was a few guns and patrol cars. Because the patrol cars had no radios, deputies had to return to headquarters frequently to see if there were any calls to be answered.

GOVERNOR BOB GRAHAM (D)

Bob Graham, the 38th Governor of the State of Florida, was born in Coral Gables on November 9, 1936, and was educated in Dade County public schools, graduating from Miami Senior High School. As Governor, Graham has established a clear reputation as a crime fighter and strong supporter of law enforcement.

Graham has been vocal and active in his fight against drug trafficking in Florida. He supported and signed into law bills that mandate a minimum 15-year prison sentence for drug smugglers. He traveled to Columbia in an effort to find ways to cut off the drug trade at its source and he has repeatedly called for a greater federal role in fighting drug smuggling. Governor Graham is a supporter of capital punishment and has signed many death warrants since taking office.

Accomplishments of the Graham Administration have been far-reaching in the areas of economic development, education, human services and the environment.

Governor Graham believes in a personal style of governing. He has carried over into his term as Governor the election campaign practice of doing different "workdays" throughout the state. These jobs include stints as policeman, railroad engineer, construction worker, sponge fisherman, factory worker, social worker, busboy, teacher and newsman.

Tallahassee's Capitol complex is familiar territory to Wayne Mixson, a Jackson County farmer who was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1978 and reelected in 1982.

Before he became Governor Bob Graham's running mate in the 1978 election campaign, he served 12 years in the Florida Legislature. For six of those years he was Chairman of the House Agriculture and General



Legislation Committee. During his tenure in the House, he also served on the Appropriations and Rules committees. A variety of groups across the State have honored him for his service to Florida in the Legislature.

Outside the Legislature his public service has included appointments to the Governor's Council on Housing Goals, the Governor's Commission on Property Rights, and the Florida Migrant Labor Commission.

Lieutenant Governor Mixson holds the historical distinction of being the first person ever reelected to serve in that office. The Lieutenant Governor was born in New Brockton, Alabama, on June 16, 1922, and became a resident of Florida in 1941. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from the University of Florida, where he was graduated with honors. He also attended Columbia University and the University of Pennsylvania.

Historical Highlight — Why are police officers called "cops"? One school of trivia collecting claims that it started in England — that English policemen were called "cops" because of the copper badges they wore. However, there are other theories about the origin of the word, and one of them was given to us by Arthur G. Vogel, of Ormond Beach, a Sheriff's Star subscriber.

Vogel said constabulary offices in England were located in neighborhood areas of each city and officers who foot patrolled the urban districts were called Constables. In the station office was a bulletin board listing all Constables by name, their patrol route and time schedule. Over this column of names was C.O.P., meaning "Constables on Patrol," and so "Constables on Patrol" was eventually shortened to COP when referring to law officers.

Our dictionary lists numerous slang synonyms for "cop" but all suffer from an aura of disrespect. For example: John Law, bluecoat, bull, flatfoot, gumshoe, shamus, dick, fuzz, reeve, catchpole, beagle, roundsman and arm of the law. "Cop," it seems, is about the best of the lot.

Governors hold "Supreme Executive Power"

In strong language, Article IV, section 1, of Florida's Constitution decrees that "the supreme executive power shall be vested in a governor."

Then it adds: He shall be commander-in-chief of all military forces of the state . . . He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, commission all officers of the state and counties, and transact all necessary business with the officers of government. He may require information in writing from all executive or administrative state, county or municipal officers upon any subject relating to the

duties of their respective offices.

Other constitutional powers permit the Governor to:

*Initiate judicial proceedings requiring public officials to do their duty, or refrain from unauthorized actions;

*Request Supreme Court interpretations of his constitutional powers and duties;

*Call out the militia to preserve the public peace;

*Make appointments to fill vacancies in state and county offices.

THE LEGISLATURE meets annually in Tallahassee for 60 days, and can also be called into extraordinary or special sessions. Senators serve four-year terms which are staggered so that half of the members are elected every two years. Representatives serve two-year terms. A candidate for election to the Legislature must be a qualified voter, at least 21 years of age, and a resident of Florida for at least two years prior to the election. In response to U.S. Supreme Court "one man, one vote" decisions, the Florida Legislature in 1972 adopted a population-based reapportionment plan that created 120 House seats and 40 Senate seats. Another reapportionment in 1982 was based upon the 1980 decennial census, but retained the same number of seats in the House and Senate.



Historical Highlight — During the years that Florida was a U. S. territory, Sheriffs shared authority for law enforcement with marshals of the federal courts. However, almost immediately after Florida became a state in 1845 laws were passed that gave Sheriffs more authority, and made them elected officials. The new state adopted the common law of England for the definition of crime, but outlawed "benefit of clergy" which allowed churchmen to be tried in ecclesiastical courts.



Peace keeping was "pretty wild" for turn-of-the-century Sheriff

Around the turn of the century, Miami was a village with scattered homesteaders' shacks and two substantial homes occupied by pioneer families, the Brickels and Tuttles.

On weekends Seminole Indians would come to town to sell their alligator hides, otter pelts and egret plumes, and Sheriff "Big John" Frohock had a hectic time trying to keep the peace.

When the fighting and carousing began to taper off, he was still a busy man, rounding up intoxicated Indians and guiding them to their canoes so they could head back out into the wilderness.

There were no laws then against operating a boat under the influence of alcohol (DUI). In fact, people just sort of took the law into their own hands, and shootings were an everyday occurrence.

"It was pretty wild down here," said Big John in a 1954 interview, "and, if I do say so myself, I made a pretty good Sheriff."

Chances are, Big John did. He had the credentials of a hardy pioneer, and considerable law enforcement experience before he served as Sheriff of Dade County between 1901 and 1909.

A native of Camden County, Georgia, Big John was born on April 3, 1872. He drifted down to Florida when he was 18, worked as a deputy sheriff in DeLand until the Sheriff got killed, then traveled to West Palm Beach, which was in Dade County, for a brief stopover.

Moving on down the east coast, he took a boat to Fort Lauderdale, and joined a party of contractors for a bone-rattling buggy ride over a narrow "cow path" to the fishing village of Miami. He served as a deputy sheriff, constable and town marshal before he was elected Sheriff in 1899.

Dade County was then one of the largest counties in the nation and embraced the area that was later divided into Martin, Palm Beach and Broward Counties. Miami Beach was a mangrove swamp with one building, a refuge for shipwrecked sailors.

The county seat was originally at Juno, about 15 miles north of Palm Beach, but Big John and other prominent citizens were able to have it moved to Miami around the turn of the century. Palm Beachites were disgruntled, and accused the Miamians of using "Indians and dead men" to vote the change.

Dade County was founded in 1836, and Edwin Quimby became its first Sheriff in 1846. Big John Frohock was the tenth Sheriff.

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Historical Highlight - Throughout Florida's history Sheriffs have always been administrators, the difference being that they have much, much more to administrate under today's complex system. Currently Florida's Sheriffs are employing over 20,000 persons and administering budgets totaling around \$540,000,000. Their problems are similar to those of other administrators, but more weighty because their decisions have a direct impact on public safety and security. Sheriffs literally make life and death decisions almost every day, and they do it under the scrutiny of the public. Their accounts and records are audited periodically by certified public accountants. The law holds them liable for the deeds and misdeeds of their deputies.

A crowning achievement

The Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund is one of the crowning achievements in the 75-year history of the Florida Sheriffs Association because it has demonstrated so dramatically the strong desire Sheriffs have always shared to alleviate the plight of needy and neglected youngsters.

The basic concept of the Youth Fund as a child care agency can be traced back to 1957 when the Florida Sheriffs Association founded the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch on the banks of the Suwannee River, near Live Oak.

The almost immediate success of this unique venture encouraged the Sheriffs Association to start a similar home for girls near Bartow and call it the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa. Originally conceived by the Sunshine State Women's Chamber of Commerce, a Madeira Beach organization, the Villa project was adopted by the Sheriffs Association in 1970, and the first girls were admitted in 1972.

A third project, the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch, was started in 1977 on a site near Clearwater as a haven for both boys and girls; and one year later all three agencies were merged into one legal entity: The Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund. It then became the responsibility of the Youth Fund to operate and raise funds for all child care projects sponsored by the Sheriffs Association.

Thousands of Florida firms and individuals have been giving generous support to the Youth Fund, including the outdoor advertising firms that are currently displaying Youth Fund posters on billboards in many areas of Florida.

In 1982 the Youth Fund added to its statewide network of child care projects the Florida Sheriffs Youth Camp, which is located north of DeLand on a site formerly used by Girls Scouts. This project offers wilderness camping year-round, and also provides more conventional short-term camping for hundreds of worthy boys and girls every summer.

Currently plans are being developed to establish another youth camp and a second youth ranch on property the Youth Fund has acquired near Stuart.

As a result of Florida's tremendous growth, the need for professional child care has been steadily increasing, and the Youth Fund is doing everything possible to meet that need.

From the beginning in 1957 the child care projects sponsored by the Sheriffs Association have been supported almost entirely by voluntary contributions, and Florida's citizens have responded with such sustained generosity that tremendous growth has been made possible. Clearly, these supporters have become persuaded that tax-deductible donations to the Youth Fund are sound investments in Florida's future.
