President's message:

"Unity is my theme for 1987"

Not many of my friends in law enforcement know that this good ole boy performed in operas while attending Florida State University, but they are going to suspect some kind of musical background after they hear me harping on unity ... unity ... unity during my term as President of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Yes, unity is my theme for 1987, and I intend to promote it as often as possible, in as many places as possible. Unity is absolutely essential if law enforcement is going to continue its present march of progress.

Close cooperation is our key to success, not only within the Florida Sheriffs Association, but also throughout the entire criminal justice system.

I am greatly encouraged by the spirit of unity that has already developed between the Florida Sheriffs Association and the Florida Police Chiefs Association; also between Sheriffs and various state and federal agencies. I have recently seen evidence that the Sheriffs Association and the State Association of County Commissioners are capable of working together to attain mutually beneficial goals, and that too pleases me.

Law enforcement seems to be on the threshold of something truly worthwhile, but there is always the danger that we might lose our momentum — that we might be tempted to "go it alone." That would be disastrous. Consequently I have this uneasy feeling that, although present law enforcement trends are good, they are not good enough, and we must try harder than ever to strengthen the common bonds that already exist within the law enforcement community.

Sheriffs and their law enforcement associates are facing heavy responsibilities, especially in dealing with jail and prison overcrowding, and in winning the war on drugs. Success in these and other areas will come only as the result of unified action. Anything less than that will lead us down the road to mediocrity.

Meanwhile, it is important for private citizens to realize that they too have significant roles to play in the search for unity. I want to urge them to get involved in Neighborhood Watch programs; to be diligent in reporting crimes; to serve willingly on grand and petit juries; to become well informed about law enforcement issues — particularly those dealing with budgets; and to vote intelligently rather than emotionally so that important law enforcement positions can be filled with well qualified, professional people.

So much for my 1987 theme. Please regard this President's Message as an overture. Arias will come later, but I suspect that they will simply be variations on the same theme.



GOVERNOR

GOVERNOR BOB MARTINEZ (R)

When Bob Martinez was inaugurated as Florida's 40th Governor on January 6, 1987, it marked the second time in 113 years that the powers of the state's highest office had been handed to a Republican.

Prior to that time only Republican Claude R. Kirk, Jr. (1967-71) and Prohibition Party Candidate Sidney J. Catts (1917-21) had been able to break a pattern of Democratic Party domination that began after the reconstruction era.

A lifelong resident of Tampa, Governor Martinez was born on December 25, 1934. He attained political prominence in 1979 when he was elected Mayor of his native city. He topped a field of five candidates without a runoff in that election, and was reelected in 1983 by capturing 81 percent of the vote.

During his terms as Mayor he was credited with a conservative approach to government that lowered property taxes, decreased the number of city employees and improved the quality of life.

His official biography points out that Tampa was chosen as one of ten "megatrend" cities of the future by author John Naisbett during the Martinez administration, and "its robust diversified economy has become a model for growth."

Governor Martinez is a Past President of the Florida League of Cities, and he served on the Board of Directors of the National League of Cities.

President Ronald Reagan appointed him to the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. He also served on the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies, and as Vice Chairman of the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

Governor Martinez holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Tampa, and a Master's Degree in Labor and Industrial Relations from the University of Illinois. He spent 12 years in the field of education, including seven years as a classroom teacher. He also operated a private business that was sold in 1983.

He and his wife, Mary Jane, have been married for 31 years. They have a daughter, Sharon Martinez Keen, and a son, Alan.

Governors hold "Supreme Executive Power"

In strong language, Article IV, Section 1, of Florida's Constitution decrees that "the supreme executive power shall be vested in a governor."

Then it adds: He shall be commander-in-chief of all military forces of the state. . . He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, commission all officers of the state and counties, and transact all necessary business with the officers of government. He may require information in writing from all executive or administrative state, county

or municipal officers upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

Other constitutional powers permit the Governor to: initiate judicial proceedings requiring public officials to do their duty, or refrain from unauthorized actions; request Supreme Court interpretations of his constitutional powers and duties; call out the militia to preserve the public peace; make appointments to fill vacancies in state and county offices.

The Executive Branch of state government administers and enforces laws. Top officials are the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and six cabinet officials — Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture, Attorney General, Comptroller, Secretary of State and Commissioner of Education. Each cabinet member is elected statewide and given specific duties.







A Sheriff's Bath of 1634



The Oath quoted in full below was sworn by Captain William Stone, first Sheriff of Accomak (State of Virginia) on July 5, 1634.

"Ye shall sweare that well and truely kepe the King's Right and all that belongeth to the Crowne.

"You shall truely and rightfully treate the people of the Sheriffwicke, and do right as well to the poore as to the Ritch in all that belonged to your office.

"You shall doe no wrong to anie man for anie guift or other behest or promise of goods for favour nor hate.

"You shall disturb noe man's rights. You shall truely returne and truely serve all the King's writts as ffar forthe as shall be to you coming.

"You shall take noe Bayliffe into your service but such as you will answere for.

"You shall make such of yor Bayliffes to take such oath as you make yourseffe in that belongeth to your occupation.

"You shall be dwelling in your own yyn ysons (proper persons?) within your Bayliewicke for the tyme that you shall be in the same office, except you are otherwise licensed by the Governor and Counsell of this Colony. And you shall diligently and truely doe all of the things appertaining to yor sayd office of Sheriffwicke to the uttermost of yr power. Soe help your God Ye."

Dean departs:

With greater respect for "switchers"

CRYSTAL RIVER — In his parting remarks after ending his term as President of the Florida Sheriffs Association, Citrus County Sheriff Charles S. Dean said his experiences at the helm had taught him something about switching political parties.

The successful switch from Democrat to Republican made by Seminole County Sheriff John Polk was particularly enlightening, he told a Sheriffs Association Mid-Winter Conference audience.

"Not long ago we were in Tallahassee, riding up to the Capitol, and I was in the back seat listening to all this celestial knowledge going on in the front seat. I said 'Damn John, you know you haven't been a Republican for three months, but you already think like one, and now you're talking like one!"

Dean said some of the best experiences during his term of office resulted from the close cooperation that developed between the Florida Sheriffs Association and the Florida Association of Counties — also between the Sheriffs Association and the Florida Police Chiefs Association.

To Willis Booth, the Executive Director of the Police Chiefs Association who was in the audience, Dean said "I appreciate you so much ... especially because of the cooperation you have given me all year, and the cooperation between your association and this association ... long needed.

"We've got a long road ahead of us, but it's fun to pull the plow together, and I want you to know that."

Dean also aimed praise at the Sheriffs' jail administrators with whom he met during a 1986 conference. "I was proud to sit there and listen to the legislative program those people proposed," he said, adding that he was greatly impressed with the administrators' sincerity, their level of concern, their commitment to run a good detention facility, and their determination to carry out their responsibilities in a way that has reflected favorably on the whole system.

Conference report:

Sheriffs seek sales tax revenue to solve overcrowding crisis in jails

CRYSTAL RIVER — Faced with severe overcrowding in county jails, Sheriffs attending the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association here February 15-17 agreed to try to tap sales tax revenue as a source of funding for jail construction projects.

This strategy, which has also been endorsed by the Florida Police Chiefs Association and the State Association of Counties, will require favorable action by the Florida Legislature. Bills are already "in the hopper" authorizing an additional 1¢ sales tax of limited duration to be levied following approval by a majority plus one vote by the Boards of County Commissioners.

In other conference action, Sheriffs also:

- * Voted to seek repeal of Florida sentencing guidelines.
- * Reiterated their support for a statewide standard governing licences to carry concealed weapons, and for central record keeping of license information allowing immediate access for all law enforcement agencies.

- * Agreed to seek reenactment of the present law establishing the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission. (The law will be automatically repealed in October under a "sunset" provision, unless reenacted.)
- * Voted to oppose any legislative action designed to weaken Florida's tough laws that allow the assets of convicted criminals — especially drug traffickers — to be seized and forfeited to law enforcement agencies for law enforcement purposes.
- * Reconfirmed their desire to see a law passed that gives the death penalty to anyone convicted of deliberately killing a law enforcement or correctional officer.

In an election of officers, Highlands County Sheriff Joe Sheppard was chosen to serve as President of the Association for 1987.

Elected to serve with him were: Franklin County Sheriff Jack Taylor, Vice President; Union County Sheriff Jerry Whitehead, Secretary; Hendry County Sheriff Earl (Sermon) Dyess, Jr., Treasurer; Levy County Sheriff Pat Hartley, Sergeant-at-Arms; and

Calhoun County Sheriff W.G. "Buddy" Smith, Chaplain.

Six new members were added to the Association's Board of Directors. They are: Jefferson County Sheriff Ken Fortune, Liberty County Sheriff Harrell Revell, Lafayette County Sheriff Bobby McCray, Brevard County Sheriff Jake Miller, Hardee County Sheriff Doyle Bryan and Collier County Sheriff Aubrey Rogers.

A reorganization meeting held by the Board of Directors resulted in the election of Pinellas County Sheriff Gerry Coleman as Chairman; and Jackson County Sheriff John McDaniel as Vice Chairman.

After Sheriffs complained about failing to receive adequate assistance from federal agencies in the handling of illegal aliens, a decision was made to place this problem on the agenda of a March meeting in Washington, D.C., involving Sheriffs, federal officials and U.S. Senators and Representatives.

The Sheriffs Association holds conferences twice a year to provide training, to exhibit state-of-the-art law enforcement equipment, and to give Sheriffs an opportunity to exchange technical and crime-oriented information.

These sessions are attended by officials from all levels of the criminal justice system, and provide a unique forum in which a wide range of law enforcement issues can be discussed. The next statewide meeting will be the Association's 74th

Annual conference. It will be held in Naples, July 12-15, 1987.

Message to Sheriffs:

Governor is "friend of law enforcement"

CRYSTAL RIVER — Addressing a banquet audience at the Plantation Inn during the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, Lt. Governor Bobby Brantley reassured Sheriffs that Governor Bob Martinez "is definitely a friend of law enforcement.

"There is no question in my mind," said Brantley, "that the commitment he makes to law enforcement and criminal justice as a whole will be the strongest commitment that has ever been seen in the State of Florida."

Brantley's address was one of the highlights of a three-day program dealing with current law enforcement issues, and focusing particularly on the problem of jail and prison overcrowding. The conference opened on February 15, and closed on February 17.

The answer to jail and prison overcrowding, said Brantley "cannot be simply to release inmates before their sentences have been served.

"We have a revolving door today," he added, "and we know very well that many of the people who will be released from the state prison system are going to end up in your (jail) facilities in the near future, and we don't think that is an appropriate response to the

crime problem."

The Governor's strategy to eliminate the necessity for early releases will be to ask the legislature to authorize a corrections construction program "that will be the most ambitious ever proposed in this state," said Brantley.

"We have got to start planning long term for criminal justice in this state," Brantley added. Then he disclosed that he and Governor Martinez plan to "start bringing together Sheriffs, Police Chiefs, Prosecutors, Public Defenders, Judges, and anyone who is in any way affiliated with criminal justice in this state, and start addressing the problems long range.

"We have got to make some tough decisions, and

then the legislators will have the responsibility of deciding exactly how much criminal justice they are willing to pay for.

"Until that happens, until those decisions are made, and until those minds come together and start working together, we are going to continue to have problems."

Brantley urged Sheriffs to "work with us by contacting your legislators and letting them know that it's imperative that they support the Governor's proposal to build new correctional institutions."

While seeking funding for new prisons, the Governor will also be calling for a local option sales tax to fund construction of county jail facilities, Brantley added.

Crime rate remedy:

Restore the fear of being caught

CRYSTAL RIVER — "Once you get the fear of being caught back into the criminal justice system as far as the offender is concerned, that's going to reduce our crime problem," Attorney General Bob Butterworth told his former fellow-travelers in the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Butterworth, who is the first Sheriff to reach state cabinet rank in Florida, delivered the keynote address during the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, February 15-17.

Criminals do not really fear the system, he said, "because there are not enough prosecutors, never will be ... not enough law enforcement officers, never will be ... and not enough judges."

Butterworth acknowledged that overcrowding in prisons and jails is "the big issue" at the present time, and funding is needed to provide additional jail beds—as many, perhaps, as three thousand a year. But, said he, "we won't need three thousand jail beds every year, once you get the fear of being caught back into the system."

He said he was not opposed to eliminating some of the present sales tax exemptions to increase revenue, then added: "but ... why should we reduce the sales tax from 5 percent to $4\frac{1}{2}$ percent?"

It would be preferable, he said, to use that debated ½ percent for a two-year period to fund additional jail and prison beds. He estimated this would cost a family of four with \$15,000 in taxable sales tax expenditures about \$75 a year, "and there's no family I know out there in the State of Florida that's not willing to spend \$75 a year for the next two years to give us the jail beds we need."

Butterworth revealed that he was not favorably impressed by legislative action taken in 1986 to relieve jail and prison overcrowding. "For the life of me," he

said, "I do not understand how releasing 2,000 inmates is going to help the criminal justice system."

He told the Sheriffs in his audience: "Probably 80 percent of those that are being released you are going to have back again."

Near the end of Butterworth's address, a round of applause greeted his statement that the three top items on his agenda as Attorney General are "law enforcement, law enforcement, and law enforcement."

Overcrowding: Early American "gaols" achieved the ultimate

Officials who are currently struggling to meet court-ordered prisoner quotas in Florida's comfortable, well-lighted, heated, air conditioned and "wired for television" jails can discover the ultimate in overcrowding by delving into the history of early American "gaols."

Recommended reading includes the description of the 18th century Charles Town jail written by the Rev. Charles Woodmason. "This dismal place," said he, "is a small house hir'd by the Provost Marshal containing five or six rooms, about 12 feet square each.

"And, in one of these rooms have 16 debtors been crowded ... They often have no room to lye at length, but succeed each other to lye down.

"One was suffocated by the heat of the weather this summer, and when a coffin was sent for the corpse, there was no room to admit it until some wretches lay down and made their carcasses a table to lay the coffin on."

Other sources confirm that overcrowding was typical of 18th century jails.


So was corruption, according to a writer who reported that, "Unless an inmate could fee the jailer, he or she had to go without even firewood and blankets, and the suffering was most pitiable."

Jails were filthy. Inmates had to pay for their keep. Those who had money could buy liquor, food, privacy and many other privileges.

Reform began in 1790, but as late as 1824 Daniel Rose, first warden of the Maine State Prison, was expressing the following philosophy:

"States' prisons should be dark and comfortless abodes of guilt and wretchedness. No mode or degree of punishment ... is in its nature so well adapted to purposes of preventing crime and reforming a criminal as ... a solitary cell in which, cut off from all hope of relief ..., the convict shall be furnished with a hammock on which he may sleep, a block of wood on which he may sit, and with such coarse, though wholesome, food as may be best suited ... for grief and penitence."

Rose said he was willing to provide sufficient daylight in a prisoner's cell "as may enable him

"I never saw a man who looked With such a wistful eye Upon that little tent of blue Which prisoners call the sky, And at every wand'ring cloud That trailed its ravelled fleeces by."

to read the *New Testament*, which shall be given him as his sole companion and guide to a better life."

No wonder Nathaniel Hawthorne was moved to describe an early American jail as "the black flower of civilized society."
