



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Step by step for many years the Sheriffs of Florida have been moving toward the goal of professionalization in law enforcement.

We abolished the fee system of financing law enforcement, with its inherent evils.

We created in its stead an efficient, businesslike budgetsalary system.

We sponsored the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, Florida's first state-wide crime fighting agency with a clear mission to support and assist - - - not supersede - - - local law enforcement (and we have seen this principle further carried out in the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement).

We have strengthened criminal laws, developed modern communications networks, helped to create minimum standards for law enforcement officers, enhanced law enforcement training opportunities.

We have standardized our badge, our deputies' uniforms and our patrol car markings.

All this is history.

Now we stand at the threshold of our goal, and we have been handed the key that will open the door to full professionalization. This key is the Omnibus Crime Bill passed by the U. S. Congress in 1968 to provide millions of dollars in federal funds for improvement of local law enforcement.

As the chief law enforcement officers in Florida's 67 counties, it is incumbent upon Sheriffs to accept this key and use it to good advantage for the betterment of all levels of law enforcement.

It is our duty - - - and our opportunity - - - to actively participate in the planning that is now in progress, and eventually in the utilization of Omnibus Crime Bill funds.

Working closely with state and municipal agencies, we can take a leading role in developing projects that will demonstrate new methods of reducing crime; recruiting and training personnel; fighting organized crime; improving community relations; and developing better educational opportunities for the men who wear the badge.

And, of course, we have an alternative.

We can be indifferent. We can drag our feet. But, if we do, the opportunities fumbled by us will be handed to other agencies.

Law enforcement will move forward in Florida - - - with or without us - - - and, if we fail to move with it, we must be prepared to see the Sheriff's job degenerate to that of a jail keeper and process server.

I am confident Florida's Sheriffs will not accept this alternative; and, as president of the Florida Sheriffs Association for 1969, I intend to do everything in my power to keep them in the front ranks of law enforcement's forward march.

We are at the threshold. The key is within reach. Let us resolve to turn the key and step forward into the realm of true professionalization.

Enroute to a rendezvous with two dead accident victims, Deputy Sheriff Tom Rudge was thinking about the . . .

WRONG WAY DRIVER

TITUSVILLE — Deputy Sheriff Tom Rudge - - - a seasoned officer who would not care to try to remember all the broken and mangled bodies he has pulled out of wrecked autos - - - was enroute to a fatal traffic accident when his thoughts turned to the menace of the "Wrong-Way Driver".

Later he told Karl Hunziker about his meditations, and Karl, who is Public Information Officer for the Brevard County Sheriff's Department, put them down on paper for THE SHERIFF'S STAR.

They went like this:

"I was cruising along in my patrol car when the radio dispatcher's voice snapped me to attention. A two-car accident on U. S. Route One - - - possibly at least one fatality.

"I shudder when I hear calls like this. In this case, I was approximately two miles away. As do all other police officers, I started to work the accident before I got there.

"What goes through our minds? Is the ambulance enroute, has the Florida Highway Patrol (whose major role includes investigating highway dents) been notified and are they enroute? There must be spilled gasoline on the highway. Is there a fire danger and how soon will the firemen be there? "The Radio Dispatcher assured me everyone had been notified and was enroute. Everything that could be done at this point had been handled. Now, to get to the scene, as safely and as soon as possible. But one thing kept burning in my mind: How did such an accident happen, on a four-laned divided highway?

"With all our signs and safe highways and traffic control, how and why, do we have these head-on collisions on four-laned, divided highways? Experience has taught us these usually involve the 'wrong way' driver.

Well, the reasons are fairly obvious. Florida is a tourist state. We invite tourism and tourists get confused. They will pull into one of our filling stations and leave as one of

the 'wrong way' drivers. This is a strange road to them, a strange area and they are confused.

"But this is only one kind of wrong way driver and really not the most dangerous. The most dangerous one is the one who pulls out of a tavern or a bar after his 'one for the road' refreshment and, due to his condition, has no idea he is doing wrong.

"Other vehicles try to warn him by flashing their headlights but this just makes him angry. He can't think straight. This man will KILL, possibly within seconds or minutes. He is just as dangerous as a maniac brandishing a loaded machinegun. The potential is set. Only a few questions remain: just where is it going to happen, who else is it going to involve, will there be but one person in the other unsuspecting car, or will the other vehicle contain a whole family?

"Probably it will happen on a curve or a bridge where the other driver or drivers have no time to take action. But it may not, and sometimes does not end that way. This 'wrong way' driver may be caught by the state troopers or deputy sheriffs before anything happens. But, all too often, it ends the other way.

"We have still another type of 'wrong way' driver. We'll call him 'Short Cut Sam', the driver who, rather than go to the next turn around, is going to take a short cut. He is going to slip down the wrong side of the road and save himself a couple of seconds. But one day 'Short Cut Sam' is going to meet 'Heavy Foot Harry' and people like myself are going to ask ourselves why?

"We know we have 'wrong way' drivers who are potential killers, innocent though they may be in their

It's Not Just a Home - It's Also a "Boys Town"

Harry Weaver stood on his front porch looking out over the rolling acres of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

Then he turned to the visitor beside him. "Running this place," he said, "is just like running a small municipality. We have the same problems --- financial and otherwise."

A staff member driving a Jeep interrupted briefly to tell the Ranch Administrator about some mechanical difficulties at the sewage disposal plant.

"You see," Weaver explained as

the Jeep moved on, "we have our own sewer and water systems. A telephone system too - - - street lights - - - fire hydrants - - - even our own fire department."

Later, as they were driving around the Ranch, some deep rutted sand that had washed over the pavement brought up the need for storm sewers and curbs and gutters.

When they passed the handsome medical and dental clinic, Weaver mentioned the difficulty he was having in finding a full-time registered nurse to staff it.

Personnel problems came up again when they stopped at the new administration building - - - the "city hall" of the Ranch complex. Weaver explained that one whole wing of the building had been set aside for the Social Service Department which helps boys with their emotional problems, interviews potential Ranchers, keeps in touch with parents and relatives outside the Ranch, and places boys in good homes when the opportunity arises; but staffing it with qualified professionals had been difficult.

More and more, as the Boys Ranch grows, Weaver talks the language of city managers. Raising boys is still his number one priority, but each day brings him reminders that the Ranch is no longer just a home for boys - - - that it is also a "town for boys" with its own laundry, airport (a landing strip for single-engine planes), newspaper, industries (such as farming, livestock raising and bee keeping), maintenance department, transportation system, hospital, educational opportunities, library and recreational facilities.

The Ranch Administrator points out all this to his visitor as the tour ends at the All Faiths Chapel. Then, looking at the high spire, he makes a comment that identifies the Boys Ranch as something more than just a small municipality.

"God is involved in all that we do. I know this and I also know that we could not be successful without His guiding hand."



THE ROAD THAT LEADS TO A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Over 200 needy and worthy boys have found a brighter future by traveling down the road that leads to the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch. During the past 10 years many of them have also left the Ranch to become law-abiding, self-supporting citizens. Some are in college, some have become successful in business and some are serving their country in the armed forces.

THE GREATEST YEAR FOR GROWTH

1968 was the greatest year for growth in the history of the Boys Ranch. Projects completed during the year included a \$35,000 fire house; a \$100,000 administration building, the first \$50,000 phase of a new sewer system, a \$50,000 medical and dental clinic, and a \$20,000 guest house. Construction was also started on a \$90,000 residence cottage and a \$170,000 gymnasium. The map below shows present and proposed facilities.



Arley Can Really "Dish It Out!"

Sometime during the current year Arley Hurst will dip a big spoon into an oversize pot and start serving the 500,000th meal he has prepared at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

We don't know exactly when he will hit this milestone - - - apparently around the middle of August - - but one thing we do know: Arley can really "dish it out" when it comes to filling boys with tasty, nutritious food.

Visitors from all parts of Florida and many other states have praised his meals. Youngsters living at the Ranch express their appreciation in the silent but eloquent language of smiling, healthy faces.

Arley, whose seniority rates him the title of "Old Timer", came to the Boys Ranch in 1959 when there were four boys, two staff members and one \$60,000 building. He worked over a small



four-burner stove, bought groceries at the corner store and kept left-overs in a small family-size refrigerator.

Today there are 100 boys, over 30 staff members, and 28 buildings valued at around \$1,000,000.

Arley, assisted by several helpers, labors over large restaurant-size ranges in a modern cafetorium preparing food that comes to the Ranch in wholesale, truckload quantities.

Many changes have taken place, but one thing remains unchanged: the mouth-watering quality of the odors that drift out of the Boys Ranch kitchen when Arley is at work.



NOW THERE ARE FOUR

The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch was the first institution of its kind in the nation when it was founded in 1957.

Since then the Sheriffs of Georgia, Alabama and Minnesota have followed Florida's lead by establishing similar Boys Ranches for needy and worthy youngsters.

Sheriffs in other states - - - including Ohio and New Jersey - - - are seriously considering the idea.

FACTS....

About the Ranch

LOCATION-11 miles north of Live Oak, Florida, on the Suwannee River and about midway between Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

MAILING ADDRESS-P. O. Box 520, Live Oak, Florida.

FOUNDED-in 1957 by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

BEGAN OPERATION—in February, 1959, when the first boys were admitted.

FINANCING—supported entirely by public donations. (They are deductible for income tax purposes.)

SIZE-737 acres of rolling farmlands.


ENROLLMENT – 100 boys. Eventual goal: 400 boys.

PURPOSE—to provide a good home and a secure future for dependent, neglected and homeless boys who might otherwise drift into a life of delinquency or hopeless futility. The Ranch is not an institution for delinquents.

AGE LIMITS—at admission a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 16. Once he is admitted, the Ranch becomes his home and he remains there through high school and college unless his home situation improves or another good home develops.

ELIGIBILITY—each boy must be of average intelligence and in good physical condition. He must be declared a dependent child by the Juvenile Court and approved by the Sheriff of the county in which he resides.

SOURCE OF BOYS—applicants are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by welfare, school and juvenile court officials.



Boys Ranch Bequests

"I am including a bequest to the Boys Ranch in my will. How should I designate the legatee?"

This question is asked frequently and the answer is: "The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Fund."

Bequests are a major source of income. Some are designated for specific uses such as scholarships or new facilities. Others not earmarked go into our endowment trust fund which is administered by a large Florida bank, under supervision of the Ranch trustees.

\$3.50 PER MONTH FOR CLOTHING

Could you clothe a healthy, active boy for \$42. a year?

Bet you couldn't - - - but the Boys Ranch can.

Donated clothing, valued at about \$30 per boy, per year, helps tremendously to keep the cost down.

But there are other factors such as patching and mending, (which keeps one staff member busy full time); buying clothes in quantity; and using hand-me-downs.

If a boy turns in a used piece of clothing in good condition at the Ranch clothing store, he gets a cash credit toward the purchase of another piece of used or new clothing.

The used clothes that are turned in are cleaned and reconditioned for resale. Each boy has a monthly clothing allowance and he can really stretch it by purchasing good, used clothes for work and play.

NEW EDITOR NEW LOOK

Rodney Heffern is the new editor of "Ranch Doin's", the Boys Ranch newspaper. "Ranch Doin's" will also have a "new look" this year because it will be printed for the first time, rather than mimeographed. Rodney said he's planning to print editorials, cartoons and pictures. Another sign of progress at the Boys Ranch.

Basketball is only one of many types of recreation at the Boys Ranch. There's also boating, fishing, hunting, camping, swimming, baseball, football, horseback riding, arts and crafts projects. movies and special entertainment programs.


27 CENTS PER MEAL

The Boys Ranch food bill amounted to approximately 27 cents for each meal served in the cafetorium in 1968.

This low figure - - - which is much less than the average housewife spends - - - was possibly due to the fact that some of the food was raised on the ranch and much of it was purchased in wholesale, truckload lots.

Meals served during the year to boys, staff members and visitors totaled almost 134,000 resulting in a total expenditure of almost \$36,000 (salaries not included).

The food bill per day, per boy was 81 cents.



SAFE AND SECURE

Perhans even a baby quail can understand what the Boys Ranch is all about. In any event, this little fellow seems to feel safe and secure under the watchful care of Rancher Bobby Ploucher and Houseparent Neill Ray. He was rescued after his mother abandoned him in a Boys Ranch pasture, and he spent the winter in a box in "Pop" Ray's apartment. "Pop" Ray was formerly a survival instructor with the U. S. Army Rangers and he digs wildlife - - - as well as boys.

FROM BROKEN HOMES

Approximately 65 per cent of the youngsters at the Boys Ranch are from broken homes.

Only three of the boys living there at the end of 1968 were orphans with both parents deceased.

Twenty were "half orphans" with one parent deceased. Nine of these were motherless; and 11 were fatherless.

Only 10 boys had both parents living, and living together.



Law Enforcement Salaries Moved Up After Compulsory Training Began

Most people seem to agree that law enforcement salaries are too low - - - somewhere in the range of janitors and garbage collectors if you figure them on an hourly basis.

But efforts to raise them have consistently ended in a stalemate reminiscent of the old barnyard puzzle about

"which came first, the chicken or the egg?"

On one side you had the people who said: "You've got to have decent salaries first to attract qualified men. Therefore, raise the salaries and the quality of law enforcement personnel will improve."

On the other side you had the people who said: "No, you're wrong. First it is necessary to improve the quality of law enforcement personnel, and salaries will just naturally come up to where they should be."

Back and forth the controversy has raged for many years, and now finally it looks as though the second group (improve quality first and salaries will follow) is winning the argument.

NEW LAW WAS THE KEY

The key factor in this turn of events is a 1967 law supported by the Florida Sheriffs Association which established the Florida Police Standards Council and Florida's minimum standards for law enforcement officers.

According to Jack Ledden, Executive Director of the Police Standards Council, salaries began to move up after the minimum standards law went into effect and training programs were introduced across the state by the Council.

He cited pay scales ranging from \$6,200 to \$7,400 per year in Jacksonville, Miami and Tampa; and a Florida Highway Patrol starting pay boost from \$460 to \$535 per month.

Surveys by the Police Standards Council showing an urgent need for career officers indicate this trend materialized none too soon. They reveal that the average career for all levels from state to county and municipal agencies is just $6\ 1/2\ years$.

And, inadequate salaries were pegged as the main reason.

12-MEMBER BOARD IN CHARGE

Hopefully this situation will improve as Florida continues to move down the road toward top quality law enforcement under the leadership of the 12-member Police Standards Council.

Attorney General Earl Faircloth is the Chairman of the Council, and Alachua County Sheriff Joe Crevasse, Jr., is Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Two other Sheriffs — Leigh Wilson, of Brevard County; and Dave Starr, of Orange County — are also members.

The remaining Council line-up includes: Col. H. N. Kirkman, Director of the Florida Highway Patrol; State School Superintendent Floyd Christian; Robert Gebhardt,

Special Agent in Charge of the FBI's North Florida District; Ocala Police Chief K. C. Alvarez; Pensacola Police Chief D. P. Caldwell; Daytona Beach Police Chief A. O. Folsom, Jr.; Lt. Jim Reese of the Miami Police Department; and Major Charles Otero of the Tampa Police Department.

QUALIFICATIONS ESTABLISHED

When the minimum standards law went into effect on June 21, 1967, it established the following qualifications for newly-hired police officers:

- 1. At least 21 years of age.
- 2. Citizen of the United States.
- 3. High School graduate, or "equivalent".
- 4. Must not have been convicted of a felony, or of a misdemeanor involving "moral turpitude".
- 5. Must not have been released or discharged from the U. S. Armed Services under any other than honorable conditions.
- 6. Must have fingerprints on file.
- Must have a good moral character, as determined by investigation.

These qualifications do not apply to elected law enforcement officers or to police officers who were employed prior to the effective date of the law (June 21, 1967).

One of the Council's first tasks after it was created was to develop a 200-hour curriculum for a recruit training program. This curriculum was adopted on June 9, 1968; and after that date all newly-hired officers were required to complete the 200 hours of training.

35 SCHOOLS ORGANIZED

The Council, in cooperation with the State Department of Education, organized and certified 35 schools in various areas of the state during 1968 to enable officers to fulfill the 200-hour requirement.

Instructors are mainly volunteers, with only a small number receiving any compensation for their services. Director Ledden said the cooperation of police departments, Sheriffs' Departments, judges, prosecutors, lawyers, doctors, The Florida Highway Patrol, FBI, American Red Cross, city managers, vocational instructors and college instructors provided outstanding faculties and an excellent reaction.

Classroom interest was reflected in final examination grades that ran above average, he added.

"Naturally," said Ledden, "any new program involving more than 12,000 persons is bound to have problems. Small departments found it difficult to meet the 200-hour training requirement, but the Attorney General provided an opinion which gave some relief.

CONCESSIONS WERE MADE

"Generally, however, where exceptions were warranted, concessions were made by the Council with an agreement that men hired without the 200-hours of training would attend school while working."

Although initial emphasis was upon recruits and preservice training, the Police Standards Council is also authorized to develop in-service training programs and advanced type programs to upgrade the calibre of law enforcement in all areas.

Police officer training is the primary concern of the Council, and police education is recognized as a second stage priority.

Already, however, a strong trend has been noted toward academic credentials for law enforcement officers.

A State Department of Education study committee reported that 17 of Florida's 27 junior colleges are teaching law enforcement in various seminar type and associate degree courses.

"It is hoped," Director Ledden said, "that an associate degree program will eventually be available to police officers on a voluntary basis in all junior colleges."

ADVANCEMENT "BY DEGREES"

He said experience in other states indicates an officer who enters law enforcement with a training oriented attitude will be anxious to upgrade himself as a stronger educational program is developed; and this eventually leads to two-year and four-year degree programs in colleges.

A cooperative effort with higher education to establish a four-year law enforcement degree program in Florida is in the future planning of the Standards Council.

But, its next move, if adequate funds are provided by the 1969 Legislature, will be to expand operations in the area of in-service training.

Underfinanced in its initial year, the Council got off to a slow start. However, special appropriations that were eventually passed, plus close coordination with all police agencies, produced success on a state-wide basis, according to Director Ledden.

"Our recruit program is now firmly entrenched," he added, "and we are looking forward to continued close cooperation with all agencies as we move into the realm of in-service training."

actions or intentions. What are we going to do about them? We can get those places of business that are located where this can happen to put up signs. We can point out hazardous areas to the State Road Department for emergency studies.

"But let's go one more step: Let's try 'education'. How many times have you, Mr. and Mrs. John Citizen, driven on a four-lane, divided highway and passed another vehicle on the left just on top of a bridge, or passed one on a curve. Sure, it is not against the law, on divided highways, and you are within your rights to do it. But what happens if you meet 'Mr. Wrong Way Driver' on top of the bridge or on that curve. Undoubtedly he will be on his side of the road (at least that's what he thinks) because if he is going the wrong way he thinks it is a two-lane road. So he is on his right and if you are passing you are on the left. And it is obvious

what happens then.

"I, like many other law enforcement officers, am guilty of sticking to the left hand side of the road because I can see traffic ahead a lot better and observe violations more readily. Also, I can turn around to chase a violator a lot faster from this lane. I make it a habit, on curves and on bridges, to slip back into the right lane because I want to be there to catch the 'Wrong Way' driver before he kills someone. I want to be sure that I am not the one 'Mr. Wrong Way Driver' may be setting up to kill, should I be the person in that


left hand lane he is traveling towards, because he thinks he is somewhere he isn't.

"I heartily recommend that all law enforcement officers, as well as the general public, utilize this defensive driving technique in their daily driving habits. You're a 'long time dead' if you are smacked head on by 'Mr. Wrong Way Driver', whether he was aware he was driving wrong

or not. "And, by the way, reached that two-car crash on U.S. 1 (the one I was heading for when I started my mental harangue against wrong-way drivers), both drivers were

dead.

"The wrong-way driver had been killed instantly, and so had his innocent victim.

First Halfway House Is A Hit! Funds Requested for Nine More

TALLAHASSEE – Walter Scott Criswell House is only one year old, but it is already helping Florida to chart a new course in the treatment of juvenile delinquents.

Founded as a joint venture of the Florida Division of Youth Services and the Florida Sheriffs Association, Criswell House is a bold experiment in the rehabilitation of young lawbreakers.

It gives special guidance, education and training to delinquent boys leaving Florida's training schools - - - or delinquents who seem to be headed inevitably for the training schools - - - in an effort to help them become law abiding citizens instead of career criminals. Unofficially it is known as a "halfway house" for boys who are "halfway in or halfway out" of the training schools at Marianna and Okeechobee.

The first boys were admitted in February, 1968, and the enrollment reached a full capacity of 25 boys last October. It's too soon to quote statistics, officials of the Division of Youth Services admit, but their enthusiasm is evident.

YOUTH CAMPS INCLUDED

In fact, their faith in the ultimate success of Criswell House is so great that they are asking the 1969 Florida

Legislature to provide funds for nine additional "halfway houses," including two youth camps.

Funds are also being sought to purchase Criswell House from the Florida Sheriffs Association.

If these funds are voted by the Legislature, the Sheriffs Association has pledged to demonstrate its faith in the "halfway house" experiment by donating \$50,000 toward the appraised value of \$150,000, leaving a net cost to the State of \$100,000.

Meanwhile, the Division of Youth Services is going ahead with plans for the youth camps; and one of them, located at Fort Clinch State Park, Fernandina Beach, is expected to be in operation by the time this yearbook edition of THE SHERIFF'S STAR goes to press.

Richard Rachin, whose Department of Group Treatment administers the halfway house program, explained that a youth camp differs from a halfway house in that it is "one step further removed from community living".

WILL WORK ON PARK PROJECTS

"But," he added, "it is not as far removed as a training school."

"For example," he continued, "the boys will work four hours a day on projects within the park, rather than

at part-time jobs in town, as they do at Criswell House.

"Their academic needs will also be met within the camp, rather than in community schools. They will receive four hours of daily, remedial, academic assistance through small group and individual programs designed to meet the needs of each resident.

"As in a halfway house, the most important part of the program will be the 90-minute guided group interaction sessions five evenings per week.

"Other important similarities will be the number of youths served (25) and the open, non-custodial living situation."

N. E. (Bill) Miller, Director of the Board of Parks and Historic Memorials, is enthusiastic about the camps. He feels the parks - - - and the public - - - will benefit from the outdoor environment.

TRAINING "AFLOAT" BEING DISCUSSED

Another state agency, The State Board of Conservation under Director W. Randolph Hodges, is also getting involved in the halfway house concept.

Plans are being favorably discussed to put boys aboard Department of Conservation boats to give them a firsthand knowledge of the conservation, law enforcement and research activities of this agency.

Something else that's new on the Division of Youth Services horizon is a group foster home program which would provide a neighborhood setting for five or six youngsters.

Experience in Florida's Aftercare (juvenile parole) program has shown that many youngsters on furlough from training schools fail to make the grade because they return to the deplorable home situations that created their problems originally.

Group foster homes will provide a practical alternative for these boys, as well as for those who are committed to the Division of Youth Services but do not need training school placement.

ANOTHER TRAINING SCHOOL

Still another diversification of treatment approaches will be available upon completion of a fifth training school in Gilchrist County.

This new facility will provide custodial care for 200 boys and girls who are more severely disturbed than the "average" delinquent. Again, guided group interaction will be an important part of an intensified rehabilitation effort.

Division of Youth Services Director Oliver Keller said these new programs will allow more realistic population levels at the existing training schools, even in the face of the rising tide of juvenile delinquency.

"Our training schools have been faced with a gargantuan task, under impossible conditions," he explained.

"But, once we achieve realistic staff-ward ratios at the training schools; and once our proposed halfway houses, youth camps and group foster homes become operational; then we can provide the kinds of individualized treatment our job demands."

A PROMISING DEPARTURE

This, then, is the new course that has been plotted for treatment of Florida's juvenile delinquents. It's a promising departure from the much criticized, and obviously inadequate, training school concept; and Criswell House is an important factor because it was one of the first steps in a new direction.

The genealogy of Criswell House goes like this:

In 1967 the Florida Legislature created the Division of Youth Services to bring together the state's fragmented services for youthful offenders.

This action was taken in response to a legislative interim committee report that noted a national trend toward "small training school facilities where only the most serious youthful offenders are sent and where those youths receive intensive care and treatment - - - also toward a

system of forestry camps - - - and the offering of more local community services such as halfway houses and treatment centers."

A new approach was the obvious intent of the Legislature and the new Director of the Division of Youth Services, Oliver J. Keller, Jr., lost no time in taking the first step.

HE SAW THE POSSIBILITIES

He learned that the Florida Sheriffs Association was closing its Law Enforcement Academy, in Tallahassee, and he saw the possibilities of converting the Academy facilities into Florida's first "halfway house" for juvenile delinquents. He had formerly been involved in similar projects outside Florida and was familiar with the theory as well as the practical details of their operation.

The Sheriffs Association responded enthusiastically to Keller's proposal, which he pointed out would be in keeping with the crime prevention traditions already established by the Association through the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, a scholarship program for outstanding students from state training schools and other projects.

And, in January, 1968, arrangements were completed for the Division of Youth Services to lease the Academy facilities, with an option to purchase later, if desired. These facilities include an office, dormitory rooms, a classroom

and a combination dining room and recreation room.

The new halfway house was named in honor of the late Judge Walter Scott Criswell, of Duval County, one of

Florida's outstanding juvenile judges.

Staff members were hired, the first boys admitted in February, 1968, and something new was created under the Florida sun - - - an intensive treatment program to develop major changes in delinquent attitudes and behavior.

BOYS SHARE DECISIONS

And it seems to be working.

"Guided group interaction" is the tool that is being used, and it requires the Criswell House boys to share with the staff the making of decisions regarding themselves.

The pressure which the youths bring to bear on each other is incessant. Each youth is under everyone else's (Continued on next page)

scrutiny, and is held accountable to his peers for the decisions he makes. This is a difficult process, since most delinquents resist self-examination and behavior change.

At Criswell House the youngsters are in an open, non-security living situation which brings them in constant daily contact with temptations and "real-life" problems. They attend public schools in Tallahassee, and some of them work at part-time jobs.

UNDER STRONG PERSUASION

Although they live in relative freedom and dignity, without the 24-hours-a-day scrutiny of a correctional staff, they are under strong persuasion to change their ways.

Each week they participate in at least 7 1/2 hours of group treatment in which they freely discuss each other's attitudes, problems and behavior.

They also become involved in special "peertake" and evaluation meetings to decide who shall be admitted to Criswell House, which boys are "ready" to be successfully discharged, and which youths it appears necessary to send to the training schools.

Favorable results are already apparent, and Youth Services Director Keller credits much of the success potential to the understanding, acceptance and support Tallahassee has extended to the project.

"The community has cooperated admirably," he said. "We are extremely grateful to the Leon County School System; to the businessmen and state government leaders who have provided part-time jobs for our young men; and to the many clubs and church groups that have donated so much of their time and resources to Criswell House."

First Year Report of the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement

Historically, the mantle of responsibility for preserving the peace, protecting lives and property, and maintaining law and order has been placed upon local law enforcement. Thus, the sheriff of the county, the police agency in the city or town, protect the law-abiding citizenry from the lawless members of society, who, given the opportunity, resort to myriad ways of circumventing the laws and trampling underfoot the lives, properties, and rights of their victims.

Crime, and those who perpetrate criminal acts, recognize no boundaries, nor jurisdictional limitations, operating from city to city, county to county. As a result, the effects of a free-wheeling, highly flexible and mobile criminal effort are felt at every level of society and of government.

In 1967, the need for a total re-appraisal of law enforcement capabilities and a complete assessment of the crime dilemma was graphically and dramatically revealed by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in the report, "The Challenge of Crime in a Free Society."

The 1967 Florida Legislature, armed with numerous recommendations derived from that report, incorporated many of them in the Florida Law Enforcement Act of 1967 which created the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement, and this new agency became operational on October 1, 1967.

AGENCIES WERE COMBINED

The authority and responsibilities of several agencies were combined and included within the framework of the Bureau; namely, the State Narcotics Bureau, division of the State Board of Health; the Attorney General's "Anti-Bookie Squad" that specialized in illegal off-track betting; and the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, Florida's first state-wide crime fighting agency. Added to this amalgamation was the authority for self-initiating investigations into the violation of any criminal laws of the State of Florida, including the following special mandates:

- ...To investigate organized crime, vice, racketeering, rioting, inciting to riot, and insurrection.
- . . . To investigate narcotic and drug abuse violations.

- ...To investigate, when specifically directed by the Governor in writing, misconduct in connection with official duties of public officials and employees, officials and members of public corporations, and authorities subject to suspension or removal by the Governor.
- ...To establish a system of fingerprint analysis and identification.
- ...To establish a system of intrastate communication of vital statistics and information relating to crimes, criminals, and criminal activity.
- ...To recommend cooperative policies for the coordination of the law enforcement work of all state, county, and municipal agencies possessing law enforcement responsibilities.
- ...To promote cooperation, elimination of duplication of effort, and economy of operation among all law enforcement agencies in securing efficient and effective law enforcement.
- ...To establish a State Uniform Crime Reporting System. (All state, county, and municipal law enforcement agencies are required by law to submit to the Bureau uniform crime reports setting forth their activities in connection with law enforcement.)

GOVERNED BY 7-MAN BOARD

The Bureau is governed by a non-partisan, seven-man Board, comprised of Governor Claude R. Kirk, Jr.; Attorney General Earl Faircloth; State Treasurer Broward Williams; State Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson, Jr.; two sheriffs, Sheriff Donald S. Genung, Pinellas County, and Sheriff Malcolm Beard, Hillsborough County; and one police chief, William Barnes, West Palm Beach. The Bureau Board selected William L. Reed, a police officer-attorney to be Commissioner of the Bureau.

The Bureau was subsequently organized into five functional divisions:

- (1) Division of Intelligence and Investigation, the primary operational division, with responsibilities including tactical criminal intelligence and investigation activities, and providing assistance to all levels of law enforcement in major criminal investigations.
- (2) Division of Administrative Intelligence, has as its primary concern the collection, evaluation, and dissemination of strategic intelligence data pertinent to organized crime, rioting, and insurrection. An intelligence bulletin is published weekly which provides all law enforcement agencies with information relative to current criminal activities, wanted persons, missing persons, and other items of interest.
- (3) Division of Technical Services, primary responsibilities include operation of the Bureau Records and Identification Section and the Crime Laboratory. The Crime Laboratory provides microanalysis; examinations of documents, chemistry, firearms, toolmarks, photography, latent fingerprints; polygraph examinations; and expertise in crime investigations and scientific analysis of evidence submitted by all law enforcement agencies. The analysts further assist the contributing agency and prosecutor by providing court testimony as expert witnesses regarding results of evidence analyzed.

(The Records and Identification Section maintains statewide fingerprint records and individual criminal records. All State employees' fingerprints are filed with the Bureau as required by State law.)

(4) Division of Research and Development, coordinates

- all operational and administrative planning activities of the Bureau; provides limited planning and research services to city, county, and state law enforcement agencies to promote increased efficiency.
- (5) Division of Administration, which is responsible for Personnel, Fiscal, and Training aspects of the Bureau's activities.

LOCAL ROLE UNCHANGED

It is the stated policy of the Bureau that "local law enforcement must remain the backbone of effective law enforcement" and as a corollary, the State fulfills a vital and important role of support, coordination, and investigative services where either the type of crime or local geographic limitations expresses the need for state-wide effort. Investigative assistance in local cases is provided upon request only if the case has proceeded to that point wherein the criminal activity itself is not compatible to solution within local resources; or where local officials cannot cope with a jurisdictional roadblock.

The work of the Bureau in the brief span of its first year clearly indicates justification of its existence. Through cooperative and coordinated efforts with both local and federal law enforcement agencies in the first 12 months of operation, the following has been achieved through arrest and seizure: \$10,150,000 worth of cocaine; \$45,000 worth of heroin; \$93,000 worth of marihuana; \$115,000 in illegal gambling operations; and the recovery of \$250,000 worth of stolen property.

Florida holds a unique position: her climate attracts millions of visitors from all sections of the nation, many wealthy. And as the bird of prey follows its quarry, so does the criminal element follow the sun, the tourist, and the wealth. Because of her many wonderful attributes which draw so many people to share her charms, Florida law enforcement agencies face the challenge of organized crime - narcotics - drug abuse - illegal gambling - organized gangs of professional thieves - loansharking. To these grave problems all law enforcement agencies must address themselves in positive terms to work together in harmony and in cooperation in order to fulfill their vital mission.

"SEEKS TO PROVIDE FINEST"

To this end the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement seeks to provide to local law enforcement in Florida the finest in law enforcement assistance, support, and services involving multi-county, intrastate and interstate criminal activities. For the first time in Florida a centrally coordinated effort against syndicated or organized crime can be accomplished with the Bureau serving as a clearinghouse for intelligence and operational activity, and utilizing agents having statewide authority.

As a prerequisite to achieving maximum cooperative law enforcement effort, the Florida Crime Information Center System (F.C.I.C.) has, after deep and far-reaching analysis, reached the status of near reality - the future of the system being dependent upon allocation of adequate appropriations by the 1969 Legislature to ensure operational success. The objective of the F.C.I.C. System is to improve the performance of law enforcement through a computerized retrieval and exchange of law enforcement information. The end result will be to improve the solution rate of crime and to increase the risk of detection to the criminal since the system makes vital information available to a police officer on the street in a matter of seconds. The F.C.I.C. will be tied in with the National Crime Information Center (N.C.I.C.); and will provide the same service to Florida law enforcement that the N.C.I.C. provides the nation. This system is considered by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and many



others to be one of the greatest advances in law enforcement in recent times.

Progress continues to be achieved in developing a system of crime reporting. The goal for commencing operation of the Florida Uniform Crime Reporting System has been established for January 1, 1970.

The Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement has experienced a most productive year, and has enjoyed maximum reciprocal cooperation with all law enforcement agencies. Yet, the challenge of crime remains as a continuous threat to a free society. Law enforcement in Florida must not, will not, fail.

CLAUDE ROY KIRK, JR. 36th GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA

The Hon. Claude R. Kirk, Jr., was elected Governor of the State of Florida at the age of 40 on November 8, 1966, and became the State's first Republican Chief Executive in 94 years.

With the adoption of a new state constitution in the November, 1968, General Election, he became Florida's first governor with constitutional authority to succeed himself for a second four-year term.

Governor Kirk was born January 7, 1926, in San Bernardino, California, the first child of Claude R. Kirk, Sr., a native of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Kirk, a native of Arkansas.

The family moved from California to Oak Park, a Chicago publisher companying in 1026; and later to Monte

Chicago suburban community in 1936; and later to Montgomery, Alabama, where Governor Kirk completed his high school education at Lanier High.

He entered the U. S. Marine Corps, was accepted for officer training at Emory and Duke Universities, was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant at 19, and ended a three-year

tour of duty in 1946.

The following year he entered the University of Alabama, where he received a law degree in 1949. He also holds an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from Rollins College. He married a University of Alabama schoolmate, Miss Sarah Stokes, of Montgomery.

During his college career he taught jiu-jitsu to the Alabama State Patrol and sold insurance. After he was graduated from law school, he moved to Birmingham, Ala-

bama, where he continued selling insurance.

He was recalled to military service during the Korean conflict; and served as an infantry 1st Lieutenant, and as a naval fire control spotter. He completed this tour of duty

in 1952 and was awarded the Air Medal.

Upon returning to civilian life in 1952 he was one of the founders and the first President of American Heritage Life Insurance Company, with headquarters in Jacksonville, Florida. He directed this business venture until he moved to a partnership in Hayden, Stone, Inc., Wall Street Investment Bankers.

His first venture in politics came in 1960 when he served as Florida Chairman of the "Democrats for Nixon" campaign. He changed his registration from Democrat to Republican as a result of that campaign, and made his first bid for public office as a candidate for U. S. Senator against Spessard Holland in 1964.

Following the Senatorial campaign, Governor Kirk

Following the Senatorial campaign, Governor Kirk formed his own firm, Kirk Investment Company, and continued actively in this endeavor until he made his successful

bid for the Governorship in 1966.

A member of the Episcopal Church, Governor Kirk helped to found missions at New Berlin and Fort George while living in Jacksonville; and he served them as a Lay Reader until a clergyman was assigned to them.

Governor Kirk was divorced from his first wife in 1966. Four children (two daughters and twin sons) were

born to this marriage.

A few weeks after he was inaugurated in 1967, Governor Kirk announced his engagement to Erika Mattfeld, German-born beauty from Brazil; and they were married in West Palm Beach, February 18, 1967.


Their first child, Claudia Mattfeld Kirk, was born August 15, 1968. The Governor also has a stepdaughter, Adriana Mattfeld Dolabella, 7, who is his wife's daughter


by a former marriage.

Governor Kirk moved into an active role in national Republican affairs after his election. He played an important part in bringing the Republican National Convention to Florida in August, 1968, and actively supported Richard Nixon for President in the subsequent General Election campaign.

RAY C. OSBORNE

Florida's First
Lt. Governor
In the 20th Century

The State Constitutions of 1865 and 1868 gave Florida an elected Lieutenant Governor who served as presiding officer of the Senate, but the office was abolished with the adoption of the constitution of 1885.

The new Constitution that became effective on January 7, 1969, again provided for the office of Lieutenant Governor, and the position was immediately filled when Governor Kirk appointed the Hon. Ray C. Osborne, St. Petersburg Attorney and former Republican member of

the Florida Legislature.

Lt. Gov. Osborne was born September 7, 1933, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and was graduated from North Carolina State College in 1955 with a BS Degree. He was commissioned a Lieutenant in the U. S. Army, served in Europe with the Third Armored Division until 1957, returned to college and received his law degree from the University of North Carolina in 1961. That same year he married the former Mary Thom White, of Richmond, Va., and they moved to St. Petersburg, where he entered the practice of law.

He served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1964 through 1967, and in 1968 was an unsuccessful Republican candidate for the Public Service Commission.

Lt. Gov. and Mrs. Osborne have a three-year-old daughter, Molly.

STATE CABINET

The Executive Branch of Florida's government administers and enforces laws. Its top officials are the Governor, Lt. Governor and six cabinet officials. Each cabinet member is elected state-wide and given specific duties. Many of the major administrative functions of the State government are exercised through "ex-officio" boards on which the Governor and cabinet members serve by virtue of the offices they hold. The Governor and all six cabinet members serve on boards such as The Budget Commission, The Board of Commissioners of State Institutions and The Department of Public Safety. Other "ex-officio" boards have as few as three members.

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

This commission is composed of 3 commissioners elected state-wide. It regulates railroads, common carriers, canal companies, telegraph companies, telephone companies, motor vehicle common carriers and privately owned electric, gas, water and sewer companies. Created in 1887 as The Florida Railroad Commission, it became The Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission in 1947 and the name was changed to Florida Public Utilities Commission in 1963. The present title was established by the 1965 Legislature. Each commissioner is elected for a four-year term.



The Florida Legislature, composed of the Senate and House of Representatives, is the lawmaking branch of our government. It meets annually in the Capitol, in Tallahassee, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in April. Thus, the next regular session is scheduled to convene on April 8, 1969. The Legislature also holds extraordinary or special sessions. The Governor can call one of these sessions; or the Legislature can call itself into one of these sessions. Senators are elected for four-year terms. Representatives for two years.



Don't Blame Criminals --- Blame Those Crazy Chromosomes

In Melbourne, Australia, a 21year-old laborer charged with murder was acquitted by a jury on grounds of insanity after a psychiatrist testified the man had an abnormal chromosome in his body cells.

The psychiatrist, Dr. Alan Bartholomew, said tests showed the murder suspect, Edward Hannell, had an extra Y chromosome.

"This is abnormal," said Dr. Bartholomew. "Every cell in his brain is abnormal.'

He testified Hannell was insane at the time of the crime and did not know what he was doing.

Unfortunately, this is not just an isolated incident, but a world-wide trend in the growing campaign to prove that criminals are not to blame for

In the past we have been told by sociologists and psychologists that we should blame crimes on all sorts of things like parental neglect, poverty, permissive mothers and acne - - - never on the criminal.

Psychiatrists too have had their innings - - - bringing up a wide assortment of mental aberrations.

Now geneticists are getting into the act with this business about the Y chromosome they found under their microscopes.

The Y chromosome is nothing new or rare. Every man has one in practically every cell, or he would not be a man.

But, a few men have two, and there's the rub.

Evidence gathered by researchers suggests the man with two Y chromosomes (like accused murderer Edward Hannell) may be a "supermale", overaggressive and potentially criminal.

To check this out, there has been a rash of research projects to determine the chromosome count of prison inmates in Scotland, England, Australia and the U. S. A.

These studies revealed that an unusually high percentage of men behind bars had two Y chromosomes in their body cells - - - in fact the incidence was reported to be 50 or 60 times greater than normal.

Dr. Bartholomew, who testified as a defense witness for Nannell, was a member of a panel of medical experts who tested 34 prisoners in a Melbourne prison.

They reported four of the prisoners had an extra Y chromosome.

Of the four, two had been convicted of murder, one of attempted murder and one of attempted larceny.

The reported consensus among investigators is that an extra Y chromosome seems to be associated with below-average intelligence, tall stature and severe acne - - - traits that might result from the hormone-stimulating effects of the duplicated chromosome.

Little more seems to be known about the Y chromosome's effects; and doubts have been expressed that the abnormal extra Y chromosome pattern can be linked with crimes of violence

The theory that a genetic abnormality may predispose a man to antisocial behavior, including crimes of violence, is deceptively and attractively simple, but will be difficult to prove.

Apparently no one knows the true incidence of the extra Y abnormality, and even when it is shown to exist, no one seems to know how the second Y can influence personality, let alone criminality.

But defense attorneys are not waiting for conclusive evidence.

The attorney representing Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, was quoted as saying he would seek a chromosome test for his client before Sirhan went to trial on a charge of murdering Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

In another California case, Raymond S. Tanner, who pleaded guilty to assault with intent to rape, sought to change his plea to innocent because of a claimed abnormal chromosome count.

Tanner's attorney said his client couldn't help assaulting a Van Nuys woman because his extra Y chromosome count makes him a "supermale" unable to restrain his actions.

Richard Speck was described as a man with two Y chromosomes when his attorneys were preparing to appeal his death sentence for the 1966 slaying of eight nurses in Chicago.

Daniel Hugon, awaiting trial in Paris on a charge of having murdered a prostitute, contended through his attorneys that he was mentally unfit to stand trial because of a chromosomal abnormality; and the Paris court appointed a panel of experts, including a psychiatrist and a geneticist, to advise it.

The trend is obvious and smart criminals will be quick to take their cue. The theme song will be the same ("Don't Blame Me") but the procedure in case of arrest will be different.

First, call your attorney.

Second, get in touch with a good geneticist.



THE HON. RICHARD W. ER-VIN has been a Justice of The Florida Supreme Court since January 17, 1964. He served as Florida's Attorney General for 15 years, having taken that office on January 4, 1949. Justice Ervin was born January 26, 1905, at Carrabelle, Florida; and was educated in the public schools of Citrus, DeSoto, Leon, Orange and Marion Counties. He was graduated from the College of Law at the University of Florida in






