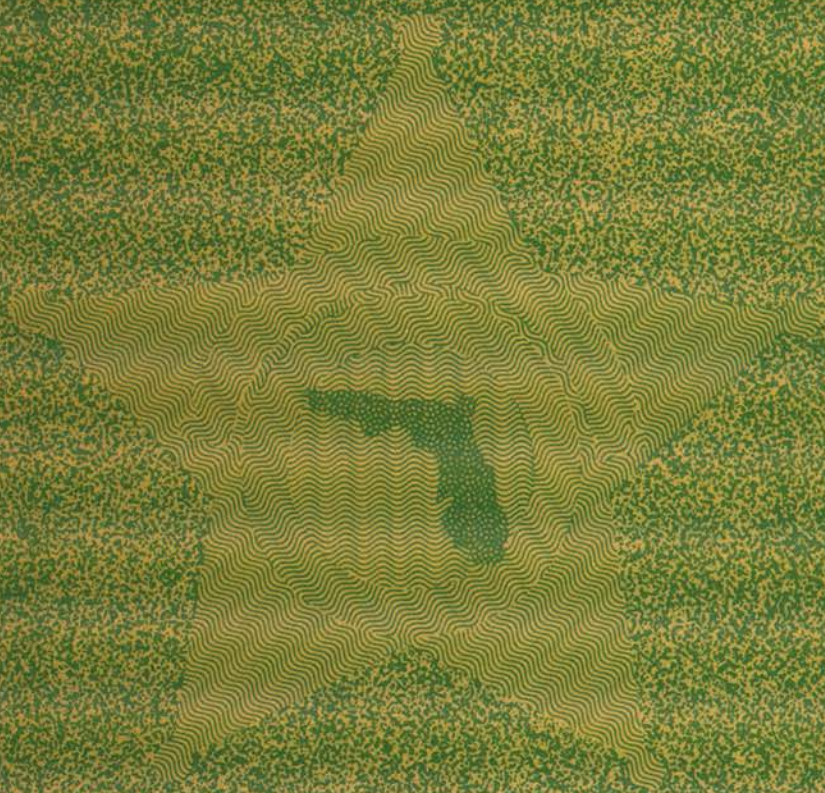

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President's Message

Don't be misled by our angry outbursts

In recent months, Sheriffs have been openly critical of numerous agencies and individuals in the criminal justice system. This criticism has been reported extensively by the news media, and it is also evident in this issue of THE SHERIFF'S STAR.

We have been getting a lot of things off our chests. We have given vent to our frustrations, and, in some cases, our hostilities. We have benefited in the same way that the father administering a spanking sometimes benefits more than the child receiving the spanking.

But, it is important for the public to know that our critical outbursts have been accompanied by diligent efforts to work cooperatively with all elements of the criminal justice system in seeking answers to problems.

Actually, we have worked harder at being constructive than we have at being critical, but the constructive efforts have not been so widely publicized.

Our criticism of unrealistic and unnecessary jail rules and regulations proposed by the State Division of Corrections made headlines. But, our efforts to work out an acceptable compromise with officials of the Division of Corrections didn't make headlines — even though these efforts covered many weeks and produced many constructive results.

It should be pointed out also that when the Division of Corrections first started handing down jail rules and regulations many years ago, the officials in charge consulted with Sheriffs before taking final action.

We have always had a cooperative relationship with them, and we still have. We got angry when they closed the prisons. We banged our fists when the new jail rules were proposed, but we didn't break off our lines of communication, and we don't intend to.

We have been throwing brickbats at the Division of Youth Services and the Parole and Probation Commission, but we are also offering constructive suggestions for governmental reorganization which we hope will bring about a change of philosophy and effective improvement in methods of operation.

We have been saying that the criminal justice system is not working, which is pretty obvious, but we have also been involved in a wide variety of activities which we hope will bring about constructive improvement.

Supreme Court Chief Justice James C. Adkins and Health and Rehabilitative Services Secretary O. J. Keller have been holding a series of conferences on criminal justice system improvements, and Sheriffs have been participating vocally as well as constructively.

We have been actively supporting budgetary requests of the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement, designed

to improve local law enforcement services.

We have been using our influence to get adequate funding for desperately needed crime laboratory facilities.

We have received commendations for the assistance we are rendering to the Governor's "Help Stop Crime" program.

Our spokesmen have been appearing with regularity before legislative committees — especially those dealing with criminal justice matters.

We are broadening the training the Sheriffs Association offers to Sheriffs and deputies, and, at the same time, we are doing whatever we can to influence constructively the entire law enforcement training effort of all agencies state-wide.

With no fanfare, but with very satisfying results, we have been developing ways and means which will enable Sheriffs to prepare, present and defend their annual budgets more effectively.

We are involved in a 16-county project seeking ways to improve crime detection and crime reporting.

We are publishing professional manuals, helping unfortunate youngsters (I assume everyone knows about our Boys Ranch and Girls Villa), and, in many ways, doing everything we can to perform as progressive law enforcement professionals.

But the state of the world being what it is, we also get frustrated, apprehensive and angry. When we do, we shout and bang our fists and raise hell — and the press puts us in the spotlight.

Next time this happens, please view it as just one of our occasional outbursts, and please remember that, underneath all the furor, we are doing everything we can to improve the criminal justice system in constructive ways.

Why the criminal justice system is not working

"The first thing we have to do is admit that what we are doing is not working," said Hillsborough County Sheriff Malcolm Beard in comments presented to the Judiciary-Criminal Committee of the Florida Senate, January 10, 1975.

The purpose of the meeting was to determine the causes of Florida's increasing crime rate, and Sheriff Beard, as chairman of the Florida Sheriffs Association's Legislative Committee, was appearing as spokesman for his fellow sheriffs.

He covered many matters Sheriffs are concerned about, and placed strong emphasis on the fact that "the protection of society has been neglected and the taxpayers have been used as guinea pigs."

Here is the text of his remarks:

I am speaking on behalf of the Florida Sheriffs Association and as a Sheriff of one of the largest counties in this state. My comments are not meant to be derogatory or to point the finger at other agencies in the criminal justice system, but you should keep in mind that I represent those people who see crime first hand in the street. Consequently, it is understandable that we become upset when some dangerous criminal is released on society by the recommendation of some inexperienced classification person who is not being held accountable for his failures and mistakes. We become upset because too often these decisions are made just because the inmate has shown some social readjustment in prison or because he behaves in a contrite manner. It is more than likely the person responsible is not even aware of his mistake.

The purpose of our meeting today is to determine the cause of Florida's increasing crime rate. I believe the first thing we have to do is admit that what we are doing is not working. To our minds, the following are some of the most significant problem areas that we face.

PRIORITIES REVERSED

In its efforts to rehabilitate offenders, and thus return them to society where they can become contributing citizens, the state has managed to lose sight of its responsibility to the public. Millions of dollars have been squandered on programs which have priority over vitally needed prison buildings. As a result of the desire to make programs work, the protection of society has been neglected and the taxpayers have been used as guinea pigs. I believe that the priorities have been reversed because of the philosophies of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. There is an immediate and absolute need to construct prisons necessary to house (warehouse, if you will) offenders who present a clear danger to society. Along the same lines, persons temporarily freed on work release and furloughs should be screened more carefully than they are now. There are entirely too many instances of vicious crimes being committed by such offenders. This is something the public cannot understand.

We must ask ourselves--"Which comes first, society's right to protection or the individual rights of convicted criminals?" We need to realize that while rehabilitative programs have their place when they are effective, some people are worthy of, thoroughly deserve and fully understand nothing more than punishment.

PROBATION AND PAROLE

The concepts of deferred punishment and aftercare, otherwise known as probation and parole, are good, but their application has been haphazard. People on probation and parole require more intensive supervision if the use of these alternatives to incarceration is to be meaningful. We cannot long continue the process of "dumping" offenders back into society without adequate supervision and expect other than a skyrocketing crime rate.

SWIFT AND SURE JUSTICE

It is necessary for us to make the persons who violate the criminal laws of Florida realize that their chances of being caught by professional law enforcement officers are pretty good and that, if caught, they can be assured of the one constitutional right they are not demanding: a fair and speedy trial. They must realize that, if convicted, they can be certain of some type of meaningful punishment and, if they are professional criminals with numerous convictions, they will be taken out of society for a lengthy time without recourse. When we do this, then we will see our crime rate plummet.

Presently, only about 22% of all crimes result in arrest, and all crimes are not reported. If a criminal is caught, his chance for plea bargaining is practically assured. If he commits a series of crimes, he is usually charged with only one or maybe two. Legal delays and continuances could be strung out for as long as two years. Charges are often nolle prossed or dropped because witnesses become unavailable. A criminal's chances of acquittal are good and, if convicted and sentenced to a lengthy term of years (instead of parole or suspended sentence), he is eligible for parole consideration within 6 months. Once parole procedures are begun, they usually operate with a total disregard for the wishes of the trial judge and law enforcement officers, or even consultation with them. This creates apathy even among professional law enforcement officers. It also creates a lack of respect for the entire criminal justice system and confuses and frustrates the law abiding taxpayer.

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Why the criminal justice system is not working

A COMPROMISE WITH CRIME

Plea bargaining is one of the most reprehensible practices found in the criminal justice system. It is nothing more than a compromise with crime. In many cases, an offender has already enjoyed "de facto" plea bargaining because not every charge available is brought against him. It is up to the State Attorney's office to decide which charges should be brought. I believe that unless there are unusual circumstances, each person should be tried as charged. Neither heavily scheduled trial dockets nor overcrowded prisons are valid excuses for plea bargaining. The availability of space and the date of a trial should never enter into the decision of determining a person's guilt or innocence.

We feel very strongly that the arbitrary closing of the state prisons has contributed to the crime picture. It has sent a message to the criminals that we don't have any place to put them to punish them for their crimes. The courts and prosecutors have also certainly been adversely affected as a result of not having a place to send people who violate our criminal laws.

Youthful offenders are not held accountable for their actions nor are their parents. Nearly half of all serious crimes are committed by persons under eighteen years of age. Yet in Florida the Division of Youth Services appears to impress upon its counselors the feeling that they have failed if they recommend detention (incarceration) for a delinquent youth. As an example, I received a copy of a letter from a judge which brought to my attention the record of a juvenile in the city of Tampa who had been reported seven times for felonies, all of which had been handled "non-judicially" by the Division of Youth Services, indicating the Court never knew of this case or child.

Young people should not be permitted to commit crimes with impunity merely because of their age. We cannot understand how juveniles and their parents can be afforded their constitutional rights without total responsibility for their actions. While counseling may be of value, there is no conceivable way that the state can replace the family as an instructive force during a child's formative years merely through periodic meetings.

THE EFFECTS OF TOURISM

Much has been said recently concerning the effects of tourism upon the crime rate in Florida. Officials high in the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services contend that the more than twenty million tourists a year who visit Florida have no appreciable effect on the incidence of crime.

In spite of Division of Corrections statistics indicating Florida does not have an undue proportion of inmates from out of state, it should be realized that the mere presence of such large numbers of transients present a law enforcement problem. Even if all tourists were law abiding, their mere presence here results in more crime. Many resident criminals came here from out of state because of the number of potential tourist victims. A nine-year-old boy whose throat was slashed in a Miami hotel would not be dead today if he had not accompanied his parents on a vacation to that city. The point is, Florida is an unique state and you cannot compare it with most other states.

SUMMATION

In order to turn around the increasing crime rate in Florida, we must reappraise our current philosophy of criminal justice.

We need punishment for those who deserve it, with less emphasis on idealistic and wasteful rehabilitative programs for every offender.

We need to reaffirm the right of society to protection under the law instead of continuing to guarantee the personal privileges of individual offenders at the expense of the public.

We need to provide adequate staffing for probation and parole programs if they are to amount to more than a virtual release on recognizance.

We need to insure swift and sure punishment for all offenders and to allow no recourse to plea bargained sentences.

We must not allow extraneous conditions such as prison space and court dockets to influence the dispensation of justice.

We need to hold youthful offenders accountable for their actions. Age alone is no excuse for breaking the law, nor is it a protective blanket from retribution.

And, finally, we must look at the causes of crime in the context of its surroundings. One of the first pages of the uniform crime reports cautions against comparing statistical information of separate areas based solely on a similarity in their population counts. Many factors influence the type and rate of crime incidence including: population density and size; age, sex and racial composition; economic status and mores; population stability, including commuters, seasonal and other transient types; climate; police force strength and methods of appointment; policies of the prosecuting officials; attitudes and policies of the courts and corrections; and, the overall cooperation of the community in aiding criminal justice agencies in the effective enforcement of the law.

The citizens are afraid. We must make some dramatic changes in order to turn this thing around and restore confidence of the people.

On truth in sentencing

TAMPA — Leon County Sheriff Raymond Hamlin told a criminal justice conference he was concerned about a lack of "truth in sentencing", and frustrated with a system that convicts too few and paroles too many.

He said judges, juries and attorneys do not get the full impact of serious and violent crimes. "The judge sits in a clean courtroom and everybody is clean and the prisoner's got religion; but law enforcement officers see the criminal and victim where the crime has taken place. We see the criminal nearest the crime, where he portrays himself as he really is."

Hamlin added that sentences handed down by judges usually bear little resemblance to the time actually served. He said if an individual is given a 10-year sentence, he rarely ever serves the full 10 years and is likely to be paroled in three and a half years.

On expensive prisons

CHIPLEY — "I am afraid our standards for nice, expensive prison buildings are too high," Washington County Sheriff Theron Cook told his home town newspaper.

"We should settle for a more conservative type building, of rugged construction and pay less attention to its comfort and beauty.

"As a former serviceman, it gripes me no end that we set our standards so high for housing our criminals when there have been so many men and soldiers who have had to sleep in the mud and in pup tents while defending this great country in every war since its birth."

On a crime victim's plight

JACKSONVILLE — Commenting on the injustice of justice toward crime victims, Bill Marden, Florida Times-Union staff writer, offered this typical incident:

"Let's look at a victim named John Smith, who works in a convenience store. One Friday night a gunman walks in, puts a bullet in Smith's stomach and walks out with \$43.

"The bullet severs Smith's spinal cord, leaving him a cripple. He's out of a job, insurance doesn't come close to paying his hospital bills, and most aid, whether government or private, is so hedged about with restrictions and qualifications that John Smith would need a lawyer to get any of it. And he can't afford the lawyer.

"On the other hand, when Smith's assailant is shot and captured by police, his hospital bill is on the state — which means you, the taxpayer. When he stands trial, his lawyer is appointed for him and he pays not one penny.

"When convicted, he goes to a state-supported prison system and, if he wants it, he can take advantage of vocational education programs, also paid for by the taxpayer. Within a relatively short time — on a charge of robbery, with a 20-year sentence, parole within five years is not unusual — he will be a free man."

Marden went on to point out that the plight of crime victims has been a matter of concern for many years, and he quoted the comments of a delegate who attended the Paris Prison Conference of 1895 to support his point.

He said, however, crime victims have not always been neglected and uncompensated. In ancient Babylon, he explained, the famous code of Hammurabi specified that: "If a man has committed robbery and is caught, the man who has been robbed shall formally declare what he has lost...and the city... shall replace what he has lost for him. If it is the life of the owner that is lost, the city or the mayor shall pay one maneh of silver to his kinfolk."

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In ancient Arabia, too, according to Marden, the responsibility for helping dependents of homicide victims was placed on the entire community.

"Later," he said, "during the Middle Ages, a criminal was required to pay a 'bote' or 'wergild' (a sum of money) to his victim's family to amend the wrong he had done.

"Through these practices, society expressed the belief that it was responsible for the welfare of victims it could not protect from harm, and that the victim had a right to compensation from the one who had injured him."

On guilt and sin

The Rev. R. Joseph Dooley, President of The International Conference of Police Chaplains, wonders whatever happened to guilt.

"One of the most distressing signs of contemporary times," he said, "is the denial of guilt.

"Guilt has practically disappeared from our culture. Psychology, sociology and legalities are sweeping guilt away. Law enforcement officers see it daily in their work and in the courtroom.

"The popular leaning is away from notions of guilt and morality. Disease and treatment have been the watchwords of the day, and little is said about selfishness and guilt. And, certainly, no one talks about sin.

"Psychology tells people: 'we're no longer penitents, but patients', and sociology says that the environment, not the person, is responsible for behavior. Even in the Church, we no longer have penance — we have "sensitivity" sessions. You go sometimes to a psychoanalyst, not to have your sins forgiven, but to have them explained away.

"To show how legalities are being used to excuse moral guilt, recently there was a union-management battle over a cashier caught taking money from the cash register.

"For three months the union fought the dismissal of the cashier on the grounds that management did not tell her it was wrong to steal. Finally, to avert a strike, management agreed to reinstate the cashier and pay her three months back pay.

"Now she knows that it is wrong to steal!"

VIEWPOINT

On young repeat offenders

JACKSONVILLE — Eighty per cent of crime is caused by repeat offenders, Sheriff Dale Carson told a Crime Prevention Week audience.

"It is the young repeater who is causing the problem we have today, and this is what we have to zero in on," he said. "When these people are released early, you and I suffer from crime."

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Carson went on to say that overcrowded prisons and jails make the situation worse. He said even with helicopters, computers and other modern crime fighting tools, law enforcement officers can't cope with the rising crime rate so long as there is a serious shortage of prison space.

"They are releasing people who shouldn't be released, and then there is no proper supervision of them," he added.

He said he is not opposed to rehabilitation, but feels there is a limit to its effectiveness. "It's something like curing alcoholism," he said. "If a person wants to get rid of his problem, maybe he can."

Jokingly, in reference to a Board of Regents ruling that convicted felons can attend law school, Carson commented: "They are beginning to say that it's harder to get a prisoner into the state prison than it is to get him into law school."

VIEWPOINT

On catching criminals

STARKE — There's good news and bad news. The good news is that "It's a lot easier now to catch criminals," according to Bradford County Sheriff Dolph Reddish.

And the bad news is that "They don't seem to mind being caught any more," Reddish said.

He explained the present attitude of criminals is due to the fact that the criminal justice system is not tough enough and gives them too many opportunities to avoid punishment.

In comments to his state legislators, Reddish was especially critical of the Division of Youth Services, which he said "is going to contribute to criminality with its position that a child cannot commit a crime."

He said the DYS has total control over children 17 and under, and the failure or success of the program "should be at their doorstep." He added: "I think it is a total failure."

VIEWPOINT

On weak judges

BRADENTON — Manatee County Sheriff Richard Weitzenfeld told the press we have strong law but weak judges.

"A judge we used to have gave life sentences for armed robbery — a two-pound pull of the trigger away from murder. We then had few armed robberies," he said.

"Now I know of at least two armed robbers sentenced to work release without incarceration in the county jail, and we've had 24 armed robberies in one month!"

"If the general public would let it be known that they are unhappy about these leniencies, maybe we could get the judges to change — or change the lenient judges at election time."

VIEWPOINT

On compensation to victims

TALLAHASSEE — According to David Cook, Associate Editor of The Tallahassee Democrat, there is a great deal of injustice masquerading these days as justice in our dealings with criminals and their victims and something needs to be done to correct this disturbing situation.

"The injustice," said Cook, "is the overriding concern of our criminal justice system for the protection of the rights of the criminal, and the attempts to generate public sympathy for his unhappy situation."

"We strive for the best possible treatment of the criminal, if he should happen to get a prison term, and the plight of his victim is ignored."

"Elaborate educational and rehabilitation programs are set up for the benefit of the criminal at the expense of the taxpayer."

"Expensive prison systems are built for the housing and care and feeding of the criminal. The cost to the taxpayer is tremendous and growing."

"Equally expensive parole and probation systems are developed to assist the criminal who never goes to jail, as well as the one who has convinced authorities that he ought to be let out of prison early."

"What we do on behalf of our criminals doesn't end there. If a criminal doesn't have a lawyer and can't afford one, the public hires one for him. If he should go to jail and has a family, we put the family on public welfare. In Florida, during the past decade, we have created an entirely new court bureaucracy to help the criminal — the office of public defender."

"Despite all this consideration for the criminal, only a few voices have been raised about the plight of the victim. His problems, assuming he is still alive, often continue long after the criminal has 'paid' his debt to society."

"There are a number of ideas circulating around the country for assisting victims. Several states already have implemented some of the ideas or are experimenting with them."

"The most reasonable alternative to payments to victims from public funds puts the criminal to work to repay his victim. This works particularly well where the theft of money or property is involved."

"Georgia is developing a rehabilitation system in which the prison inmate works at a job during the day with part of his earnings going to his victim and part to support his own family, if any."

"That is an extension of the 'work release' program which has operated in Florida prisons and jails for a number of years and which has become a part of the federal prison rehabilitation system. It is reasonable to expect a criminal to make restitution, assuming he has the mental capabilities to handle a productive job."

On punishment and rehabilitation

CHICAGO — Addressing an audience of big city police chiefs, Harvard University Professor of Government James Q. Wilson cited studies which confirm that certainty of punishment is a factor in reducing the crime rate.

"There have now been between one and two dozen studies that have measured, on a state-by-state basis, how certainty and severity of punishment effects the crime rate," he said.

"These studies support the view that the more certain the prospect of imprisonment, the lower the crime rate. Some have suggested that for certain kinds of crime the severity of punishment will also deter crime, but all agree that certainty of punishment does seem to deter crime."

He said a recent review examined over 230 studies on the subject of criminal rehabilitation. "The result of this review was the showing that there is no consistent or measurable gain in reducing recidivism to be had from any of the rehabilitation programs that have been examined.

"Yet, judges are, in many cases, devoted to the belief that we CAN rehabilitate offenders. You should not merely argue with them, but suggest what the evidence shows about the futility of the rehabilitative ideal."

On permissiveness

BRONSON — In response to a Gainesville Sun editorial entitled "License to Kill", which was critical of law enforcement officers, Levy County Sheriff Pat Hartley wrote the following letter which was also printed in the Sun:

Next to being shot himself, a law enforcement officer's greatest fear is the possibility that he might have to shoot another person in the performance of his duty.

When he considers and chooses a career in this vital profession, he knows the risk involved to himself and family. After he is accepted into the profession, his compulsory training period at an accredited academy further prepares him for the job that lies ahead. He is trained and licensed to use certain tools, equipment and expertise of the trade. So, in fact, he does have a LICENSE. Isn't this true of most professions?

To keep this LICENSE, the officer must be careful with the great power and responsibility entrusted to him.

On the other side of this declared war, the criminals, and those considering a career in this lucrative profession, also have a LICENSE. They didn't need training at an academy, nor did they need long years of experience to earn their LICENSES.

They were given to them on beautiful silver platters over the last three decades by well-meaning, unsuspecting leaders of our freedom-loving country. This LICENSE is one of permissiveness, and it has encouraged countless thousands of our young people to choose a career in crime because of the low risk factor.

Most of us are guilty to some degree in granting this license of permissiveness. It starts at home and continues through schools, churches and the total Criminal Justice System. It is my firm belief that the computer has not been made that could accurately compute the losses we have suffered because of the permissiveness factor. Losses of our young people who become criminals and losses suffered by the victims of crime.

Educators are given a great percentage of the responsibility of molding our children into men and women and, at the same time, are stripped of the authority necessary to get the job done. No wonder that our children have lost faith in the system. They have difficulty in finding something strong to lean on. If you doubt this, observe the results of a good sports program where strong discipline is applied. Here you see boys and girls molded into responsible adults.

If one would agree that permissiveness has been responsible for part of the losses we have suffered in this war on crime, what, then, would be the results of an announcement that police can no longer use necessary force to stop and arrest a fleeing felon? Would this be saying, "If you're fleet of foot, crime does pay!"? It is a tragic thing when a human being is shot even while fleeing the scene of a crime. It would, however, be even more tragic to reduce the risk for criminal acts and thereby recruit more young people into the camp of the enemy.

It is very late but, perhaps, not too late for all concerned to consider the rights of law-abiding citizens, and to remember that in the commission of a crime, the criminal has forfeited many of his "rights".

We are all involved in a war, and the cost of fighting this war will become prohibitive if we don't stop the advance of the enemy and simply say "NO" and mean it.

On juveniles and plea bargaining

TRENTON — Gilchrist County Sheriff Charlie Parrish bitterly attacked the Division of Youth Services in an appearance before the county's legislative delegation and asked for changes in laws concerning the handling of juvenile criminals.

Parrish also made a strong attack on "plea bargaining" by the state attorney's office, and cited a recent case in which a man charged with attempting to murder his wife was permitted to plead guilty to a lesser charge. He said the man is now appealing a five-year sentence on an aggravated assault conviction.

"He shot her down like a hog, and he intended to kill her," the Sheriff said of the incident.

Parrish said he had charged the man with assault with intent to murder, and compiled a 19-page investigative report but that he was not consulted when the decision was reached to reduce the charge to aggravated assault.

REUBIN O'DONOVAN ASKEW

The Honorable Reubin O'Donovan Askew was elected the 37th Governor of Florida in 1970 as essentially a tax reform candidate.

After inauguration day, he sustained this image by winning legislative approval of a referendum on a corporate profits tax. Then he campaigned for the tax from one end of the state to the other against what he called the "shadow government" of lobbyists and powerful special interests in Florida.

His tax reform won voter approval by a 70 per cent margin. Taxes on household utilities and apartment rentals were promptly repealed. Loopholes were closed and other reforms enacted. He became the first Florida Governor reelected to a second full term when he easily won reelection in 1974 over Democratic and Republican opposition.

Governor Askew also has been successful in fostering improvements in law enforcement, prison reform, court reform, benefits for the working man, and environmental planning.

He has been a stout defender of equal educational opportunities and was, as a result, awarded the 1971 John F. Kennedy "Profiles in Courage" award by B'nai B'rith. His fight to protect Florida's environment has been cited in several conservation awards, including the special award of the National Wildlife Federation.

As his reform programs gained national recognition, Governor Askew was selected to deliver the Keynote Address at the 1972 Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach.

Earlier honors included his selection by the Florida Jaycees in 1960 as "One of Florida's Five Outstanding Young Men"; the State Jaycee Good Government Award in 1971; and a number of citations as an "outstanding" member during his 12 years in Florida's Legislature.

Born in Muskogee, Oklahoma, on September 11, 1928, Governor Askew was one of six children.

In 1937 his family moved to Pensacola, where he entered the Escambia County public school system and, beginning at the age of nine, worked in his free time to help his mother



support the family. When he was graduated from high school at 17, he entered the Army as a Private in the Paratroopers and rose to the rank of Sergeant. He then entered Florida State University where he was a member of ROTC and served

as student body president. He was graduated with a B.S. degree in Public Administration and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force. After two additional years of active duty in the Air Force, Captain Askew was admitted to the University of Florida Law School. In 1956 he received his LL.B. degree.

Almost immediately he began his public service career by accepting an appointment as Assistant County Solicitor of Escambia County. He was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1958 and to the State Senate in 1962.

In the Senate, he was Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and the Senate Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Revision and worked vigorously for fair apportionment in both the House and the Senate.

His many community services include membership in the Western Division of Children's Home Society of Florida (Past President), Florida Association for Retarded Children (Past member, Board of Directors), the Farm Bureau, Escambia County Tuberculosis and Health Association, YMCA, American Legion, Heart Association and United Fund. He is a Mason and Rotarian.

He is married to the former Donna Lou Harper of Sanford, Florida, and the couple has two children, Angela Adair and Kevin O'Donovan. Governor Askew is an elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Pensacola.

Lieutenant Governor

JAMES H. WILLIAMS II

The Hon. James H. "Jim" Williams, II, has been a lifetime resident of Ocala, an area he represented as State Senator from 1968 until his election as Lieutenant Governor in 1974.

Williams was born June 17, 1926, attended Ocala public schools and, upon graduation, enlisted in the U. S. Army Air Force in 1944.

After the war, Williams attended the University of Florida for one year, but, upon the death of his father, joined the family businesses, which included cattle, citrus and limestone and granite mining interests in Florida and Georgia. It was not until 1962, at age 36, that Williams returned to school to complete his education. He attended Central Florida Junior College and the University of Florida, where he earned a B. A. degree in political science in 1966.

In 1968, he was elected to the Senate. In 1972, he was re-elected without opposition. Williams served as Chairman of Governmental Operations, Vice-Chairman of Ways and Means, and as a member of the major House-Senate conference committees.

In 1973, he received the Allen Morris award, sponsored by the Florida Times-Union, for "Most Effective in Committee" as voted by his fellow lawmakers. In 1974, he was runner-up to Senator Dempsey Barron as "Most Effective Senator".

He won the 1973 St. Petersburg Times "Most Valuable Legislator" award, based on a statewide poll of journalists and editors who covered the session. Williams was among the three Senators nominated for the same award for the 1974 session.

He also received the "67 Award" in 1972 from the Florida School Board Association for excellence in educational legislation.

Williams is married to the former Louise Oxner of Oklawaha. They have three children: Kerry Anne, Laura Elizabeth, and James Hunter.

His current business interests include citrus, partnership in two cattle raising companies and other investments.

Williams has served as lay leader and Official Board Chairman in the First United Methodist Church, was Senior High MYF Counselor for ten years, and is a Church School Teacher.

In July, 1974, Senator Williams accepted Governor Reubin Askew's invitation to serve as Lieutenant Governor in Askew's



second administration. In November, 1974, Askew was elected to a second term as Governor and Williams was elected Lieutenant Governor of Florida.

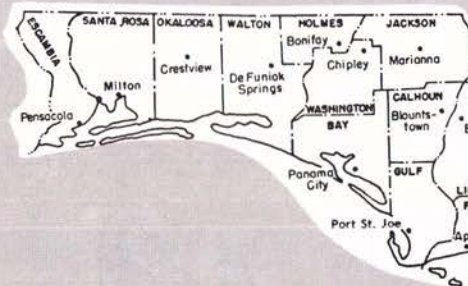

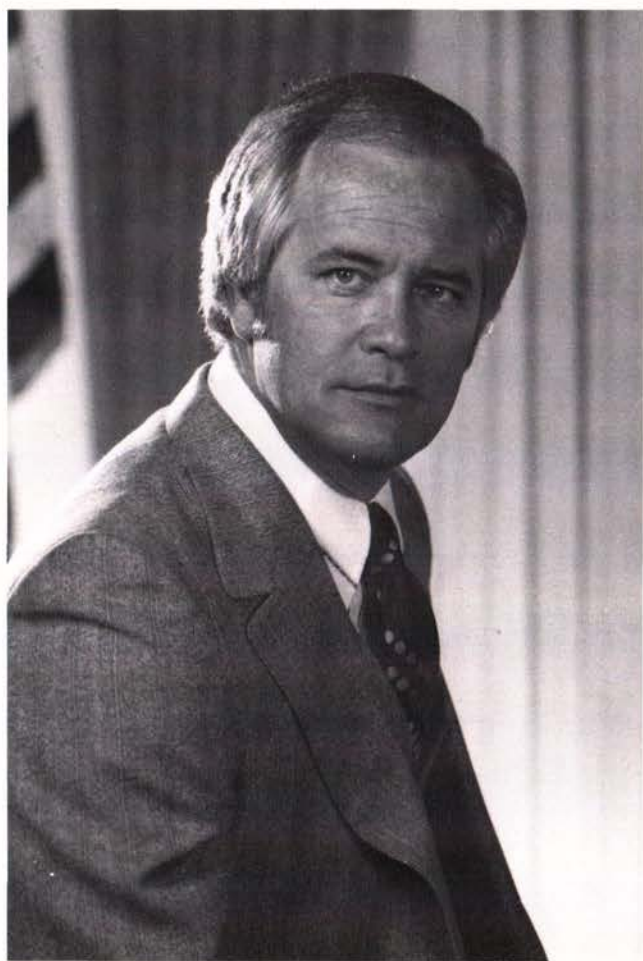

Justice Hal P. Dekle has resigned from the Florida Supreme Court, and at the time the Yearbook was prepared, the name of his successor was not available.

As prescribed in the Florida Constitution, filling this vacancy requires a Supreme Court Judicial Nominating Commission of nine members to consider the qualifications of applicants and within 30 days of the time a vacancy occurs, present a list of at least three people to the Governor. He in turn chooses one man who will serve on the State's highest court until a successor has been elected and sworn in to fill out the last year of Justice Dekle's six-year term.

Justice Dekle began his judicial career as a Civil Court of Record judge in Dade County in 1957 and became a circuit judge in 1960. He was elected to the Florida Supreme Court in 1970.

While Mrs. Peggy Carlton of Yarrow Court called the Comm Center and was kept on the line describing events, her neighbors took up guard around the targeted home.

Although one suspect escaped as the neighborhood mobilization was taking place, another was cornered in the house and was trapped there until Dep. Robert Trapp arrived and arrested him in a rear bedroom.

The 15-year-old was charged with breaking and entering and carrying a concealed weapon (a 6" knife). The second suspect was being sought.
