budgets and salaries.

We have many people like this in Florida now, but the ranks are thin in comparison to the growing horde of lawbreakers and we need more people on our team.

In a free society, good law enforcement is

everybody's business.

You can make it your business by becoming more than just a law abiding citizen.



The total cost of crime in this country is in excess of 22-billion dollars a year -enough money, at current rates, to provide appropriations for the state government of Florida for nearly 50 years!

And this money-cost is only a small part of the picture. The cost in lives, in tragedy, in horror

is even more appalling.

Unfortunately, the climate and scenery and prosperity of Florida are as attractive to criminals as they are to reputable citizens. And, the crooks are much more mobile than the "good guys"-they don't have to wait for vacation time to head south; they don't have to sell homes before resettling; they don't have to worry about whether the kids finish out a school year at a particular school. They just pack up and come.

So-as does each of the more popular, rapidly-growing and prosperous states—we have an even higher than average crime rate (the fifth highest of the states, as a matter of fact). And this means that we pay even more than our pro rata share of the cost in money and slaughter and terror.

Day and night, year in, year out, we are carrying on a never-ending battle against the criminal army in Florida; and with the crime rate increasing four or five times faster than the population, there is a striking similarity between our home-grown war against crime and the war in Viet Nam.

—Both are guerrilla wars.

-In each it is extremely difficult to sort out friends from enemies.

-Both are unbelievably expensive.

-Both are filled with murder, rape, pillage, horror and tragedy.

To point up further similarities, it is interesting to note that a high Defense Department spokesman recently announced a whole new concept of guerrilla warfare would be used against the Viet Cong. Instead of attempting to use massive force in battalion and regimental strength against the shadowy enemy-so hard to tell from the friendly civilian populace-small local police forces of from 12 to 40 men will be permanently stationed in local communities.

These forces will be able to distinguish friends from enemies, will know local terrain and hiding places, will win the confidence of friendly natives and give them a sense of

participation in the war.

Each of these forces will be furnished the finest in coordinating and technical assistance, yet continue to function as an independent unit.

This is a new strategy in Viet Nam -but an old one to Florida's Sheriffs.

More than a decade ago Sheriffs saw that their hit-and-run war against crime lacked coordination, free exchange of information and technical assistance.

That is when they came up with the idea of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau—a state agency geared to meet these needs without taking control of law enforcement away from the local level.

Their basic logic told them that local law enforcement is the first and most important line of defense against criminal guerrillas-that every effort should be made to strengthen

On this exact premise the unique Florida Sheriffs Bureau was created by the legislature and now functions. It provides the "qualified advisors" and "the best in technical help" to the irreplaceable front line of local law enforcement groups.

Now in its tenth year of operation, the Bareau is controlled by a board consisting of the governor, the attorney general and five sheriffs appointed for staggered terms. Operations are under the supervision of a board-appointed director.

Currently employing 74 persons (all its key staff members are professional-level, career officers and administrators), the Bureau performs a host of services that give "muscle" to all local law enforcement.

It has in operation a highly-efficient crime laboratory; a central records and identification system, serving the Division of Corrections, the Parole Commission, local agencies, and the state employee fingerprinting program; 11 skilled investigators and polygraph examiners in the field, available to sheriffs on request; a training program for local officers; and a state and national communications network. It also publishes a remarkably successful, twice-a-week crime bulletin, the first state-wide medium of exchange for information concerning criminals and their activities, with a mailing list of over 1,000 agencies in Florida and the Southeast.

Through these and other services the Bureau has established itself as a vital force in law enforcement—as important to the lives and property of the people of Florida as are schools, buildings, tourist promotion, roads and any of the other essential elements of state government.

Its financial needs therefore merit careful and intelligent scrutiny by the 1965 Legislature when it tackles the highly important job of appropriating funds to operate Florida's government for the next two years.

In its budget for the coming biennium the Bureau is asking for \$932,000 the first year and \$848,674 the second year—only five per cent more than it asked for two years ago but 64 per cent more than the appropriation it actually received.

This sharply illustrates the dilemma that has faced the Bureau ever since it was created in 1955—the "dollar gap" between actual cash and actual needs.

Not a single penny was appropriated for the Bureau by the 1955 legislature—and for two precarious years its existence depended on a policy of "beg and borrow."

In 1957 the Bureau received its first appropriation. Some increases followed in 1959, 1961 and 1963, but it simply has never received quite enough money to bring its operation to maximum efficiency.

Because it is unique—the first of its kind in the nation—the Bureau has had a sort of "stepchild" existence among state agencies. It has had to prove its value and lift itself by its own bootstraps, but it has done this admirably and the time has come to give it full stature.

The "dollar gap" that for ten years has been the bane of the Bureau's existence—and a source of aid and comfort to every crook within our borders—can no longer be justified. Wars are not won that way, no matter whether the battleground is a rice paddy in Viet Nam or a burglarized warehouse in Miami.

The Sheriffs Bureau is no longer a stepchild. It has just moved into specially designed and far more efficient quarters in the new Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission Building. For the first time in its "Horatio Alger" life it is under one roof, instead of being pigeon-holed in two separate buildings three blocks apart.

Its crime laboratory, by virtue of the newly-acquired facilities, has been rounded out into one of the most outstanding of its kind in the country—a bastion of good law enforcement that frees the innocent almost as often as it convicts the guilty. Other units of the Bureau too will be better equipped, better coordinated and more effective.

This is a new beachhead in the war against crime and it is reflected in the Bureau's operating costs. The budget for the next biennium contains an item of nearly \$170,000 for rent and more efficient telephone communications. Heretofore the Bureau paid no rent.

Personnel increases will be nominal. The new budget request includes only 16 new positions in the first year and five in the second.

Twelve of these positions are additional clerk-typists and fingerprint technicians in the Records and Identification Section. The State Employee Fingerprinting Program, initiated by the State Cabinet in 1962, has created large backlogs in

many areas, despite emergency personnel increases granted by the Budget Commission.

Four of the new positions, three technical and one clerical, would be assigned to the Crime Laboratory, which suffers from a constant overload.

One additional Special Agent would be assigned to the field to provide relief for the men already so stationed. Two clerical assistants are needed to process field reports.

An additional Special Agent is contemplated in what is now a one-man Intelligence Unit. This is a fairly new operation that has shown tremendous results in gathering intelligence about the whereabouts and activities of major criminals in Florida.

And one clerk-typist would be assigned to the Crime Bulletin to assist in its stepped-up production.

The Budget Commission digest of the Bureau's request shows an average increase in salaries of 17-per cent in the first year and 3-per cent in the second. This is a little misleading. These are not arbitrary increases, but are primarily the result of several re-classifications under a carefully worked out and followed job classification system (which closely follows the Merit System classifications).

There are "squeezes" in both the lower and higher classifications. For example, the Bureau is in competition with the FBI for young men as fingerprint technicians, yet it is paying them about 25-per cent less than FBI scale. The Bureau has re-classified its Special Agent in Charge of the Crime Laboratory from absolute necessity—he comes very close to being the irreplaceable man— and this has caused the re-classification of two higher-ranking positions.

One of the primary increases in expenses in the new biennium, approximately \$50,000, is for increased printing and postage for the already-proven Crime Bulletin. It is proposed that publication be stepped-up from 104 issues to 208, providing local agencies fresher and more valuable criminal information.

Major capital outlay items include additional office furniture for the new building—which the Bureau has long needed but did not have room for—and special filing equipment—about \$57,000 worth—which will increase the efficiency and capabilities of records and identification personnel and materially reduce the time required to search the ever-growing records.

A 3-car headquarters car pool is proposed. The Bureau has never had enough rolling stock. It has had to pay its head-quarters personnel 10-cents a mile for the use of their personal cars on field trips, even though its experience has shown it can operate its own cars for 6.4-cents per mile.

Aside from these specific items, practically all of the budget request is simply to carry on the present, successful activities of the Bureau in the regular manner, with allowances for normal growth.

Essentially, this is a budget designed to increase the effectiveness and "firepower" of an agency engaged in a "shooting war"—a war as dangerous to all of us and our families as any we have ever engaged in—a war that will bring losses of nearly 2-billion dollars in Florida during the next biennium.





Sheriffs Bureau Finds a Home

TALLAHASSEE — After wandering around the capitol center for almost ten years from a little honeymoon cottage, to a ramshackle building

slum clearance overlooked, to a small corner of the Carlton Building (follow the photos below from left to right) the Florida Sheriffs Bureau has finally found a home in the new Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission Building pictured at right.

This move, which took place February 26, 27, and 28 puts all of the Bureau's sections under one roof and for

the first time gives them facilities to match their topnotch equipment and personnel.

Flexing its crime fighting muscles within 19,300 square feet of floor space, compared to 1,200 square feet in the honeymoon cottage, the Bureau can, now begin to realize its full potential. It is occupying a major portion of the basement and second floors; while the Game Commission is on the main floor and the Division of Corrections is on the third floor.

A snack bar and a 100-seat auditorium will be used by all occupants of the building.



Much has been said about the crisis in Law Enforcement. It is proclaimed by those in and without the ranks of law enforcement. The crisis, and its causes, are described in varying terms.

I agree that there is a crisis in law enforcement, but I do not agree that it is new or that it can be attributed to any single cause.

There always will be a crisis in law enforcement because war always involves a state of crisis. Law enforcement is a war, a war against crime, and the criminal. A war that will continue until and unless man becomes a different creature than he is.

True, there are storms and squalls which arise from time to time which cause the waves to run higher and break harder, heightening temporarily the crisis. But for the most part these dramatic upheavals are solved because of the force of their own weight and the attention they attract.

However, there are other factors which vitally and continuously influence the real crisis in law enforcement, but are neither sufficiently dramatic, nor so well understood, as to demand the attention or action necessary to their solution. I would like to discuss some of these with you.

Many years ago, I dreamed of helping to solve some, if not all, the problems of the world. I have learned that it is impossible even to state the problems which need solution, and that defining a problem is at least half of its remedy.

Humbly, I must admit I do not have the answers necessary to solving your problems, and I suspect that you don't either. But I am convinced that we can't wait for someone who has all the answers—for he may never appear. This encourages me to continue this discussion.

I am convinced that the real crisis in law enforcement finds its cause and its reason in the massive public apathy toward this vital field of our government.

In the early days of English history, the king held the One Hundred, i.e., the inhabitants of the town, responsible for producing the perpetrator of a crime committed there. If they didn't deliver the guilty person, the town's people were required to pay a fine to the crown.

This was an effective method for apprehending criminals, and, more important, it gave every citizen a direcí, personal and equal responsibility for law enforcement in the community.

The One Hundred was replaced by the Grand Jury. Over the years that have passed, for reasons which I will leave to others to explain, the individual citizen, and the public generally, has gradually divested himself of any feeling or commitment of personal duty or accountability for law enforcement in the community.

The result has been, and is, the prevalent view that law enforcement, the prevention and control of crime, is the sole responsibility and burden of the professional police officer.

This misconception has been further extended to the point that the public now feels free to and does blame the law enforcement authorities for crime in the community, and for its increase.

This is a convenient method by which we as citizens can relieve our own consciences, and place the blame elsewhere, but it won't hold water.

As you and I know, and the public ought to know, police officers have little or nothing to do with the causes of crime. About as much as doctors have to do with the increase in the birth rate, or as much as courts have to do with the increase in litigation.

The doctor doesn't commit the act that causes the birth of a baby. The parents do it. The judges don't start the dispute that ends up in court, and the police don't commit the violations of the law which we call crime.

Moreover, the policeman is not responsible for the varied conditions which are said to be the causes of crime. The police deal only with the symptoms. Dealing with the causes of crime are the functions of other agencies in the community.

True, respect for and obedience to law depends in large measure on the adequacy and efficiency of the law enforcement machinery; to the extent that crime is permitted or not prevented because enforcement is not adequate the police may be justly blamed. But only to this extent.

It is noteworthy, and in blaming the police officer the public ought to consider this carefully, that the crime rate has made its greatest increase during the very period when the police have made their greatest progress in the science and technique of prevention and detection of crime, and the greatest upgrading in quality and training of personnel. This does not square with the cry that the police are to blame for the increase in crime.

This public view that the police are solely responsible for law enforcement, and for the increase in crime, has caused another public and individual misconception to appear. This misconception is that we can't do anything to stop the rising wave of crime.

It results in a debilitating sense of frustration, causes a tendency to accept

the crime increase as inevitable, and to some extent produces a loss of willingness to wage a war against it.

To some extent at least, the sense of frustration is understandable.

The citizen can't buckle on a gun or otherwise directly assist in combating crime. But this does not mean that the citizen can't help, and it doesn't mean that his apathy toward law enforcement is justified.

The fact remains, whatever the reason, that despite all the evidence that crime and criminal law enforcement is a major and a critical problem in our lives, it has not yet become a personal concern to our citizens.

It is not unusual that a major problem in public affairs can exist without public awareness of or concern for it, but it is a proven truth that until there is widespread concern of the kind that leads to determined public action by a significant number of the public, there is no chance of any effective attack on the problem.

So, until a good number of our citizens recognize and understand that crime and its prevention and control is a major problem, that they have a personal responsibility for law enforcement, and that they can do something about it, we will continue to lose the war against crime, as the proof shows we are.

You and I know that if we are to win this war we have got to also convince our people that they must: (1) reappraise upward the importance of the role played and the service rendered by the law enforcement officer; (2) reevaluate the status accorded him in our society, giving him the respect, the appreciation and the honor which the trust we place in, and require of, him deserves; (3) recognize that the police officer is not an enemy of our freedom and security, but the protector of it.

If we can convince the public to take this view of law enforcement and of the law enforcement officer, then we will also be able to convince them, and we haven't yet, that we must: (1) pay compensation adequate to attract and keep men and women possessed of the intelligence, character, honesty, integrity, education, personality and dedication, who are willing to risk their lives every day in public service of importance second to none; (2) provide adequate training; (3) provide an adequate number of personnel sufficient to deter and prevent as well as to detect and to solve crime; and provide equipment necessary to do the job effectively.

But how do we get this done?

Our system of government is based on the theory and the expectation that every citizen will acquaint himself reasonably well with the functioning and the needs of public agencies, and that he will act effectively to make them adequate. It is a sound theory. I would want to live under no other.

Yet my experience has taught me, and I am sure yours has taught you, that with rare, if any exceptions, the public is not likely to search out or educate itself as to needs of any public agency, or function of government, so long as it operates reasonably well.

It must either be driven to take a closer look by a complete breakdown of operation, or it must be led to do so by effective, respectable and knowledgeable leadership.

This is particularly true in the field of law enforcement, as it is with the judicial system. Law enforcement is not a function of government which will automatically encourage constructive public interest on a wide basis. Further, it is generally true that you do not deal with the cream of society in enforcing the law. The citizens you do contact are seldom glad to see you or to have been served, and the criminal element who are your customers are not likely to sponsor your efforts to improve law enforcement.

Add to this that most laymen are not competent to evaluate the performance or judge the needs of law enforcement without the aid of professional explanation and guidance.

It becomes apparent that if the changes in attitude, correction of misconceptions, and the basic needs of law enforcement agencies are to be met, the public must be educated as to what is required. It is equally obvious that only the professional law enforcement officer, you, is capable of furnishing the leadership and the teaching.

You can say, if you wish, that it is not your job to educate, that you are a police officer. Technically you would be correct, but not correct in practicality. And who else is there to educate the people as to what you do, why you do it, what the condition of crime is in your community, why it is that way and what will be required to improve it? Who else is capable of explaining why you need better salaries to get competent people, why you need more personnel and how many? Who else can properly explain that statistics showing an increase in crime don't reflect a poor police department, but rather shows a need for more police.

I am convinced that the only way that law enforcement agencies will get

On the office wall at the Florida Law Enforcement Academy, in Tallahassee, is a large map of the state dotted with colored pins.

There are 308 of them scattered from Key West to Pensacola, and each pin represents a student enrolled at the Academy during its first year of operation.

The green pins (144 of them) represent Sheriffs and their deputies; the blue pins (56 of them) are for Police Chiefs and city police officers; the yellow pins (98 of them) are for state enforcement officers; and the red pins (10 of them) are for others such as constables and fire department arson investigators.

There, at a glance, is the success story of Florida's first state-wide law enforcement training facility.

Although the Academy is only one year old the map shows that it is already fulfilling its original aim—which was to give quality instruction to law enforcement officers from all sections of the State and from all levels of government.

The first year's curriculum offered basic subjects for the rookie, training for "top brass" and courses for specialized fields such as vice investigations, fingerprint identification and riot control.

Instructors—there were 131 of them—ran the gamut from men of long experience on the crime war firing line to judges, attorneys, pathologists, college professors, ballistics experts, and other specialists. It is doubtful that such a smorgasbord of law enforcement "know how" has ever before been offered in Florida.

There were 16 separate schools offering over 1,000 hours of practical, concentrated instruction. In

the second year of operation, which is now under way, the initial schools will cover:

Basic Training	March 21-27
Supervisory Techniques	April 4-9
Death Investigations	
and Sex Crimes	April 25-30
Burglary, Larceny, Robber	yMay 16-21
Instructor's Training	June 6-11

The Florida Sheriffs Association created the Academy in 1963 and built facilities to house it on a site adjacent to the Tallahassee Municipal Airport. These facilities were called the Florida Sheriffs Memorial Training Center and were dedicated in memory of Florida law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty. Classes began on February 9, 1964.


The Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created by the 1955 Legislature at the request of the Sheriffs Association, operates the Academy and provides some of the instructors.

Tuition paid by students, which averages \$15 a day and includes room and board, is used to defray the operating expenses.

Only duly constituted law enforcement officers employed on a full-time basis by city, county, state or federal law enforcement agencies are eligible to attend. They live together in a modern dormitory and eat together in the Academy dining room. This gives men from all levels of law enforcement an opportunity to get to know each other, to develop closer cooperation, and to gain a better understanding of each other's problems.

Law Enforcement Study Proposed

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the needs of law enforcement in the State of Florida are constantly the subject of concern and consideration by the Sheriffs of Florida, and

WHEREAS, one of the continuing and principal requirements for good law enforcement in any city, county, state or nation is dependent upon appropriate education and training, and

WHEREAS, a survey of the needs of law enforcement in Florida seems indicated.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Florida Sheriffs Association in Mid-Winter Conference assembled in Lakeland, Florida, this 28th day of January, 1965, that there be created the Florida Inter-Agency Law Enforcement Committee to be composed of sheriffs, police chiefs and representatives from various state and federal law enforcement agencies for the purpose of conducting by the most practical means available a survey of the needs of law enforcement in Florida, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, based on such survey the Florida Inter-Agency Law Enforcement Committee shall make such recommendations as described above, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the committee establish liaison with Florida universities and junior colleges with a view toward cooperating in the fullest degree and promoting good law enforcement throughout the State of Florida.

APPROVED and ADOPTED this 28th day of January, 1965.

YOU are men who deal with the stark realities of life and it is rather strange for me to be talking to you about a myth—about something that has been arbitrarily invented, something that is strictly a product of the imagination. However, this is a sinister myth that threatens the very foundation of our present system of law enforcement, and although it is not a thing of substance or reality, I feel you should be prepared to defend yourself against it, just as you are prepared to subdue the armed criminal or the drunken brawler.

This dangerous assailant I will call "The State Police Myth."

First, it is necessary for you to understand the difference between the state police and "the state police myth."

A Myth Based on Reality

You know, as well as I do, that the state police is a flesh and blood organization in some states, even though we do not have it in Florida.

No matter what you think about it, it does exist.

Presumably there was a breakdown of local law enforcement—local officers were not doing their duty—and the state stepped in and took over the police authority.

This is reality!

Now, to take this reality and change it into a myth. You begin by saying that "Florida needs a State Police."

It's a Sinister Thing

You begin with this basic premise and you add a bit of misinformation here—an untruth there—and, some half-truths someplace else—until you have built up quite a creature—quite a product of the imagination.

If you were doing this as an idle pastime—if you were just dreaming—this would be a rather harmless mental exercise. But if you build this creature—and then you seriously try to pass it off as a thing of substance and reality—you are doing a sinister thing.

Now you know as well as I do that just this sort of sinister thing is going on in Florida.

You know as well as I do that various merchants of misinformation have built a "State Police Myth" in Florida and they are trying to convince the people of Florida that we need a state police.

Let There Be No Misunderstanding

Perhaps I should—right now—make a further definition of terms, so there will be no misunderstanding.

When I speak of "State Police," I am in no sense referring to organizations and agencies such as the Florida Highway Patrol, the State Beverage Department, the Conservation Department, and similar such fine specialized groups who perform their assigned tasks within their limited specialized fields so nobly, successfully, and well.

Only if these agencies were to seek to go beyond their proper areas of responsibilities, and delve into the general law enforcement field, would they enter the area which I condemn.

Florida has the finest Highway Patrol of any State in the Union and I want to keep it that way. The traffic safety problems of this State are immense, and the law enforcement officers of Florida would be unable to cope with this problem were it not for the outstanding services of the Department of Public Safety and the Highway Patrol, under the direction of its able Director, Colonel Neil Kirkman.

No Reflection on State Agencies

Similarly, when I refer disparagingly to a State Police, I intend no reflection upon the Beverage Department—nor upon our fine Conservation Department—and their Agents throughout Florida,

Both of these agencies again fill a specialized need in a limited field, in areas regulated by State law which need specialists for enforcement purposes.

I have nothing but the highest praise for the Conservation Department. Under the able leadership of Senator Randolph Hodges, they have made giant strides forward in this field.

Ultimate Aim—Centralized Government

This same principle applies to the many other specialized agencies and organizations who perform much needed functions in unique fields such as narcotic investigations, securities frauds and in other technical areas.

These agencies, like the Florida Sheriffs Bureau itself, assist, supplement and complement local law enforcement and are performing vital, necessary functions and performing them with distinction.

But, when you seek to broaden any one of these specialist areas into a true "State Police," an organization designed to take over, compete with, brush aside, and supersede local law enforcement, you then join the massive conspiracy to abolish government at the local level and bring about the full concept of centralized government which has as its ultimate objective the destruction of democracy.

Do Something About It

The assumption that we need this type of law enforcement in Florida, or that we should even think that we might need such an undemocratic concept in our fair State, is where the myth begins and where I take issue with the tellers of this fantastic tale.

You know that this myth exists—and you know on face value it is ridiculous. I do not need to dwell on this, but I do feel compelled to urge you to do

something about it.

Myths have a way of leading whole nations astray—like Hitler's myth of the master race—or the Communist myth of world domination—and, no matter how ridiculous they are, they should be reckoned with—they should be destroyed.

Present System Not Unstable

Expose this myth!

This is my message to you today. Tear away each false premise, piece by piece, and expose this monster for what it really is.

Dissect it.

Start with the false claim that the present system of law enforcement, with the Sheriff as the chief enforcement officer in each county, is unstable.

You have heard it said, I am sure, that there is too much turnover among sheriffs—that they come and go with each idle whim of the electorate—that each new sheriff does a thorough job of house-cleaning—sweeping out the old employees and bringing in a new staff.

You have heard it said that this scares away qualified, professional law enforcement officers, who are looking for job security; and it creates a general instability that lowers the quality of law enforce-

ment.

We Are in a New Era Now

The critics who say this, need to be brought upto-date about the facts of life in Florida—or else, they are purposely ignoring the facts. The things they are saying might have been true to a limited degree in 1941 when 36 Sheriffs were defeated at the polls or even in 1952 when there were 30 sheriffs defeated by the ballot box. We are in a new era now —and the situation has changed drastically.

I wish your critics were here so I could bring them up-to-date. I would like to show them the election results for 1960, when only 7 sheriffs were defeated; and, I would like to give them a rundown on the 1964 elections, when only 6 incumbent sheriffs were defeated. This is less than 10 percent and the trend is for the turnover to get lower each year.

There are other factors too, that are making our system of law enforcement more stable with each

passing year.

A Highly Technical Business

Many sheriff's departments are under civil service, giving deputies job security through changes in administration. When I was Sheriff of Monroe County, I sponsored a bill to establish civil service

and it is now in operation.

Here's something else I am sure you are aware of: Law enforcement is becoming a highly technical and professionalized business. No longer can you take a raw recruit and make a deputy sheriff out of him, simply by giving him a gun and a badge. To operate effectively, a Sheriff needs well trained, qualified men, and, since the supply is limited, he would be completely stupid to throw out all of his predecessor's experienced men and form a completely new staff. Let's face it. The spoils system is a thing of the past.

Let's face it—The people who say "Florida needs

a State Police" are living in the past, too.

Uniformity - This We Have

This becomes evident when they claim that our present system of law enforcement lacks uniformity.

Where have they been during the past decade? Are they aware that Florida's Sheriffs, working through the Florida Sheriffs Association, have standardized their uniforms, badges and patrol car markings? Are they aware that a uniform system of keeping accounts and records is being used statewide by all sheriffs? Are they aware that the same training is provided for sheriffs and deputies in all parts of the state through the Florida Law Enforcement Academy created by the Florida Sheriffs Association?

Are they ignoring the fact that the services of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau with its crime laboratory and trained technicians are available to all sheriffs, giving all counties a uniformly high calibre of law enforcement?

Unprofessional? — It Ain't So

You know these things—and I know them—but my plea to you is to be sure the public knows—otherwise, the State might be led down the road to centralized government.

The people who are trying to create the "State Police Myth" in Florida and pawn it off on the people as the real article, will go to any lengths. They

will say, for instance, that Sheriffs are inexperienced and unprofessional—when surely they know

better.

If they really wanted to know the facts, they could look at the current issue of the Florida Sheriffs Association's yearbook, which gives the background and experience of every Sheriff. They would find that the sheriffs listed there have been in office an average of 10.6 years apiece—or a total of 713 years. Add to this the years of experience many of you have had as city police officers, Florida Highway Patrolmen, FBI agents, deputy sheriffs, state agents, and constables, before you became sheriffs, and the average would go even higher.

Overlapping Jurisdiction?—Doubletalk

What does it take to make a professional? Training and experience — And you men have what it takes. You are career law enforcement officers.

Bit by bit this "State Police Myth"—this paper tiger—falls apart. But we are not through with it. Let us probe deeper. Let us look at this thing your

critics call "overlapping jurisdiction."

This is bureaucratic doubletalk that means, "let's concentrate all the power of government in Tallahassee." They don't say this, but if you are tuned in on their frequency, you will know this is what they mean.

The Old Capitol Theme Song

They would have you believe that county government, in fact, all local government, is outmoded and inefficient because of "overlapping jurisdiction."

They say that there is much duplication of effort, not just in law enforcement, but in all functions of government—such as collecting taxes, building roads, operating schools, and so forth.

They want to take local government out of the picture completely and run the whole show from

Tallahassee.

Up in Washington, they sing the same theme song about "overlapping jurisdiction" with this variation: they say there is much duplication of effort between state and national governments—so, they want to take state governments out of the picture and run the whole show from Washington.

Let The People Know

I am sure you see the picture—because this is the very thing Sheriffs have been fighting for years. How else did the Sheriffs Association get the title: "First line of defense in local self-government"?

You know that the "State Police Myth" is all part of a massive conspiracy to abolish government at the

local level.

You know that a State Police is only one step in the process of centralization of government—and, the next step will be to create a national police force and abolish the state police.

You know this, so my message to you is to speak

up!

It is your duty to let the people of this State know what is going on. Other voices are being raised in defense of local self-government, and I want you to join the chorus.

"Both Unnecessary and Unwise"

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau

of Investigation, had this to say: "Every officer and citizen interested in good law enforcement should be aware that we are occasionally confronted with proposals pointing toward centralization of police powers in a state or federal agency. I firmly believe that such proposals are both unnecessary and unwise."

Now, listen to this from an article by Raymond Moley, in the December 21, 1964, issue of Newsweek Magazine: "Under our system of dispersed authority, we have countless jurisdictions. Each has its share of law enforcement. Each has its own set of officers upon whom this responsibility lies. While the area of Federal jurisdiction has grown greatly in the past half-century, it is still narrowly restricted by the U. S. Constitution and the laws passed under that authority. The vast bulk of law enforcement still lies with the states and local governments. This is well, because the imposition of a centralized police authority would inevitably be a peril to individual liberty and local self-government.

Variations in law are needed in such a great country as ours. What is a problem in Montana is absent in New York or Massachusetts, or vice

versa."

A Peril to Individual Liberty

Applying Mr. Moley's words to the State level, I think we can well paraphrase him as follows: The imposition of a centralized police authority at the Tallahassee level would inevitably be a peril to individual liberty and self-government throughout the State. What is a problem in Miami is absent in Perry. And what is a problem in St. Petersburg exists not at all in Pensacola. Each area has and should have its own set of officers who are cognizant of its local problems and upon whom responsibility for localized enforcement must lie.

Yes, other voices are being raised, and we can

only hope that the public will listen.

State Police is No Bargain

We can only hope that the public will not be misled by false claims that a state police will be less expensive than our present system of law enforcement. This is part of the "State Police Myth."

Just as an example, I will remind you that a high police official from another state tried to show in a speech last year that the State of Florida could save millions of dollars by establishing a state police.

What he failed to point out—and I am convinced this was intentional—was that in states where state police agencies now operate, Sheriffs still must carry out all the duties formerly performed except crimi-

nal investigations.

Some of these duties include administration of the county jails and the care of their prisoners, protection of the courts and the guarding of prisoners at trial, transportation of prisoners and serving civil process issued by the courts.

Failed to Tell the Whole Story

Our visitor from the North also failed to acknowledge the existence of county detectives who work under the supervision of the prosecutor and whose salaries are an additional burden on the law enforcement budget.

In comparing Florida's system with the state police, he did not take into account the 15 cities in his state with a population of 50,000 or greater, in

Ranch Capacity Boosted to New High of 100 Boys

It seems like only yesterday that a group of Sheriffs rode out across a rutted sand trail to a scenic but totally undeveloped site on the storied Suwannee River.

They looked at the unspoiled beauty of their surroundings and decided this was where they would build the Boys Ranch they had been dreaming about —a place where a youngster with three strikes against him could be given a second chance "at bat" in the game of life.

This was 1957, only seven years ago, and yet in this short time the rutted sand trail has given 'way to paved roads, the undeveloped land has become rolling green pastures, and the once quiet

banks of the Suwannee ring to the laughter of carefree boys.

In just seven years the Boys Ranch has become one of the largest child care institutions in the State of Florida with facilities valued at over \$750,000 and its fame has traveled nation-wide.

Truly, our brainchild is growing up, and 1964 will be remembered as the year it burst out of its sometimes insecure infancy into strapping adolescence.

1964 will be remembered as the year of the building boom . . . the year that the Ranch began to acquire something that could be called a "skyline" . . . the year we launched a \$250,000 building program and boosted our capacity to an all-time high of 80 boys.

As we go to press, our fifth residence cottage is being completed and this will jump our enrollment to 100 boys

Giving on the Installment Plan...

I wanted to give a large gift to the Boys Ranch, but I decided I couldn't afford it—not with three sons of my own to raise and educate.

Then I talked to an insurance agent and he showed me how I could do it at a cost of only a few dollars a month.

At his suggestion I took out a life insurance policy that will give the Boys Ranch \$4,000 when I die, and the premiums amount to less than \$18 a month.

Furthermore, since the Ranch is the irrevocable beneficiary (this means I can't change the beneficiary), my premiums are deductible for income tax purposes—just the same as any donation to the Ranch.

Others have done the same thing, and the Ranch now holds insurance policies with a total value of over \$50,000.

We Called Him "The Boy Nobody Wants"

I will not tell you his real name. But, I will tell you the title we gave him when we received his application for admission to the Boys Ranch.

We called him "the boy nobody wants" because he had been deserted by his parents and pushed around from foster home to foster home.

This had left its mark on him. He was bitter toward life. He was hostile

toward people. He was suspicious. He would have been the bottom contender in any juvenile personality contest.

He was, in fact, the most unwanted boy we had ever seen . . . but we wanted him, and we enrolled him at the Ranch

He had nothing and we had many things to give him . . . basic things



"Homicidal Maniacs" with Guns Turn "Spook Walk" into a Wild Stampede

Last year many of the boys who had been through the ordeal before, felt they were beyond being scared by the usual "stage props," so staff members put forth a special effort.

First a fake radio broadcast was aired over the cafetorium public address system during dinner warning that two homicidal maniacs were loose in the area

Then the boys were shown a spook movie to get them in the proper frame of mind, and they started out on their traditional "spook walk."

Everything went along about like other years, with the boys making a great show of bravado, until they came upon a car parked in the woods.

One of the more adventuresome boys walked up to the car and reported, "The motor's still warm."

Just then two strange men jumped up and started firing guns, one of the housefathers accompanying the boys dropped to the ground clutching a big red blotch on his chest, and the boys high tailed it out of there in a general stampede.

They didn't find out until they had reached their cottages—wide eyed and breathless—that the car and the strange men had been "planted" in the woods with "blanks" in their guns, and the housefather's "wound" was from a concealed bottle of catsup.

Now the boys are more determined than ever that they won't be hoaxed again, and the staff members are already plotting for the 1965 "spook walk."

The Pay-Off

LIVE OAK—Officials of New Idea Equipment Co. wanted to pay Suwannee County Sheriff Duke McCallister after he served delicious meals to some 500 people attending a demonstration of farm machinery here.

But the Sheriff politely explained he never accepts anything for putting on his famous barbecues and fish frys.

About the Ranch

LOCATION—11 miles north of Live Oak, Florida, on the Suwannee River and about midway between Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

MAILING ADDRESS—Route 3, Live Oak, Florida

FOUNDED—in 1957 by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

BEGAN OPERATION—in February, 1959, when the first boys were admitted.

FINANCING—supported entirely by public donations. (They are deductible for income tax purposes.)

SIZE—737 acres of rolling farmlands

ENROLLMENT—60 boys at the end of 1964; currently increasing to 80; expected to reach 100 by 1966. Eventual goal: 400 boys.

PURPOSE — to provide a good home and a secure future for Florida's needy and worthy boys —to give them love, security, discipline and all of the essential advantages that are every American boy's birthright. The Ranch is not a "reform school" or a "correctional institution." Boys enrolled at the Ranch are there simply because they need a good home—because they are the innocent victims of neglect or lack of opportunity.

AGE LIMITS—To be admitted a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 12½. Once he is admitted, the Ranch becomes his home and he remains there through high school and college unless his home situation improves or another good home develops.

ELIGIBILITY — Each boy who meets the mental and physical requirements must also be approved by the Sheriff and the Juvenile Court Judge of the county in which he resides.

SOURCE OF BOYS—Applicants are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by school, welfare and juvenile court officials.


Constantly Trying

HUGH LEWIS MEMORIAL COT-TAGE-Formerly used as a temporary dining hall, this building has been renovated as a residence for 20 boys and a married couple employed as "cottage parents." The project was completed early in 1965, boosting the Ranch capacity to 80 boys.

MERRILL MEMORIAL COTTAGE -Now nearing completion, this will be the Ranch's fifth residence cottage and will increase the capacity to 100 boys.

CATTLE BARN-This building is a valuable addition to the farm program. It was completed in 1964.

WATER SYSTEM—The water system was expanded through the addition of a 15,000-gallon ground reservoir completed in 1964. This was the fourth phase of a five-phase program. The next phase will be the addition of pressure pumps, and aerator and a chlorinator.

Polled Herefords that brought \$14,-000 on the auction block during the 12th annual Sunshine Sale at the Santa Fe River Ranch of chain store executive A. D. Davis were donated to the Boys Ranch by generous bidders.

The sale was held on January 16 and, as in three previous years, it will help to "beef up" the quality of our fine herd.

The late Cecil Webb, former president of Dixie Lily Milling Co., donated three heifers to the Ranch this year. Last year he paid \$7,100 for the top-priced heifer and the proceeds were donated to the Ranch by A. D. Davis as a memorial to the late Jim and Rena Swick, former owners of Copeland Sausage Co., who lost their lives in Jacksonville's Hotel Roosevelt fire.

Webb and Davis, both trustees of the Boys Ranch, thus added impetus to a fund raising drive that resulted in the building of our Jim and Rena Swick Memorial Cafetorium.

Other donors who gave animals to the Ranch this year are Falstaff Brewing Co.; Erwin Bryan, of Center Hill; Fred Cone, of Gainesville; and State Sen. Ben Hill Griffin, of Frostproof.

Bryan and Griffin are lifetime honorary members of the Florida Sheriffs Association because of previous donations to the Ranch; and Falstaff was similarly honored last year with a lifetime membership in the Boys Ranch Builder Club.

Accurate Records? We've Got 'Em

Record keeping is a big job at the Boys Ranch.

It involves inventory control of all property, a strict accounting of all cash and non-cash gifts, and detailed records of all purchases-from shoe laces to fertilizer.


Treasurer J. L. McMullen, a Live Oak food processor, had much to do with setting up the system originally; and in recent years our internal auditor, Joe Henry, a former assistant state auditor, has refined it and made it more comprehensive. Both are non-salaried officials of the Ranch.

Once each year our accounts and records undergo an independent audit and a report is filed with Florida's Secretary of State and with the Clerk of the Circuit Court in Suwannee County.

We also make a report each year to the U. S. Internal Revenue Service to maintain our tax exempt status; and we are proud of the fact that all donations have been ruled deductible for income tax purposes ever since the early days of the Ranch.


We are proud too that the Ranch is now debt-free. Mortgages that were negotiated with Live Oak banks to purchase a major portion of the 737-acre site in 1957 were paid off in 1964.

One rule we rigidly follow in our record keeping is that every donation, no matter how large or how small, must be acknowledged with a letter or an official receipt. This makes the Ranch unique among charitable institutions.

We Believe in Physical Fitness

Physical fitness is more than a phrase at the Boys Ranch—and more than just building strength and stamina, although there's plenty of that too.

Each boy receives a complete physical at least once a year, and special check-ups in between whenever necessary, under the experienced eye of Dr. J. W. Hayes, Jacksonville pediatrician who is the Ranch's non-salaried Cnief Medical Officer.

The Jacksonville Dental Society does its bit too. Members donate thousands of dollars worth of routine and specialized dental care each year.

Glasses and eye care are also provided free of charge through the Live Oak Lions Club, and the local public health nurse assists with the operation of the small medical clinic established at the Ranch.

Without the help of all these generous people, our medical and dental bills would be staggering.

Boys Ranch Milk Is Really Fresh

"Country Fresh Milk."

Although dairy advertisements have worked this phrase to death, there is such a thing—and we have it at the Boys Ranch.

Sleepy-eyed youngsters milk our six dairy cows at 5:30 every morning. They pasteurize the milk in our modern dairy and it reaches the Ranch kitchen as pure and rich as milk can be, with none of the cream removed.

The boys love it and there's no limit to the amount they are allowed to consume. They can have seconds, thirds or even fourths.

The spotless dairy is operated entirely by the boys and is inspected regularly by State inspectors. We take pride in the fact that the bacteria count is consistently low.

like healthful outdoor living, nutritious food, medical and dental care, a good education and a firm moral foundation.

And we had many things to teach him . . . like self respect . . . like how to give and accept affection . . . like how to feel secure.

Above all else we tried to make this boy realize he was wanted, and when we accomplished this we wiped out the last traces of "the boy nobody wants." He doesn't live here any more. He exists only in the memory of those of us who watched the transformation.

In his stead we have a reasonably normal, reasonably well adjusted boy who knows the one thing every boy needs to know above all else . . . that somebody cares.

"What was the worst thing that happened when Hurricane Dora hit here?" a visitor asked one of our boys.

"The power went off and we couldn't watch television," he replied.

For the boys, riding out the big storm was pretty much of a lark, but staff members took a more serious view of the crisis.

They watched the rising floodwaters of the Suwannee River, knowing that the Ranch was isolated and the boys might have to be evacuated by boat. Fortunately the river crested before this was necessary.

The corn crop was ruined and telephone service was knocked out for several days, but all in all everyone agreed it could have been much worse—even the boys who didn't get to see their favorite TV programs.

In Retrospect

James Snow, formerly of Gainesville, was one of the first boys to enroll at the Ranch when it opened for business in 1959, and he is now in the U. S. Navy attending radar school at Great Lakes, Ill.

In a letter to present Ranch residents he reminded them they have "opportunities a normal guy would never receive."

"The Ranch is a good place, you guys," he added, "so stick with it and see it grow until one of these days you will be glad you did have the opportunity and pleasure of being there."

A native of Maumee, Ohio, where he

Betty is from Lakeland, where she also attended South-Eastern Bible Co!lege and received her undergraduate degree from Florida Southern. The State Police Myth

which, I'm sure, the state police takes very little, if any, responsibility for criminal law enforcement. The combined population of these cities is 3,874,500 persons, with a total of more than 10,000 police personnel, assuming they have the same ratio to population as the average for that section of the country.

Quite a Grotesque Creature

While in Florida, as you well know, the Sheriff has responsibility for the enforcement of all criminal laws in his county, and the investigation of crimes wherever they may occur in his county, inside a city or otherwise. Even in Florida's three largest cities, the Sheriff still has this responsibility and takes joint jurisdiction with the city police in most cases.

Don't let the people of Florida be fooled. Let them see that a state police is no bargain—Let them see that a state police would actually increase the cost of law enforcement without increasing the

effectiveness.

Dissected—falsehood by falsehood—this "State Police Myth" becomes quite a grotesque creature, but we are not quite through with it. Let's probe to the very backbone and expose one of the basic arguments used to support this magnificent sham.

It goes like this: "Let's abolish the Sheriffs. establish a state police, and take politics out of law

I would be disappointed in my youngest son if he could not see through this argument, but no matter how phony it is, we must assume that otherwise intelligent citizens can be misled by it.

It's not that they lack the intelligence. It's just that they don't always take time to thoroughly an-

alvze the issues that confront them,

Let us hope that the people of Florida will ask

themselves a few pertinent questions.

Here's one: Have we ever taken politics out of anything by shifting authority from the local level to the state level?

No Politics—No People

Think about road building just for a minute. Road building used to be a local responsibility, but the state has taken over the lion's share. Did this take politics out of road building? If you think it did, you had better go back to your political history book.

Here are some more questions:

Can you remove politics from government with-

out removing the people too?

Is it possible for our democratic form of govern-

ment to function without politics?

Are the voters so incompetent that they are incapable of selecting qualified men as their chief law enforcement officers? Have we become so immature that we need someone in Tallahassee to hand-pick our law enforcement officers for us?

Now, suppose we have a state police thrust upon us. Are we to assume that the Superintendent of State Police who holds the reins of authority will spring from a different breed not subject to the subtle influence of money and corrupt politics?

While this may be true in any given case, experience gives us little basis for expecting a constant succession of such conscientious public servants. Furthermore, if the Superintendent of State Police is appointed by the Governor, he will be subject to all

sorts of political pressures.

Frankly, if I were a racketeer, I, would be very much in favor of a state police—then, I would just have to corrupt one man and the entire state of Florida would be my "oyster."

Not a Selfish Thing

Now you sheriffs are politicians, you know something about the interplay of high powered politics that batters the state enforcement agencies we already have. But the people of Florida may not know this and I urge you to let them know how foolhardy it would be to wrap all law enforcement up into one package and hand it to a superintendent of state police.

This is not a selfish thing I am asking you to do. It is not a matter of protecting your own political

future. I say it is your duty.

You have already done a great deal to defend local self-government. You have improved the efficiency of your departments, you have accepted the ever increasing responsibilities of your positions with imagination and intelligence, you have proved by the sheer weight of your accomplishments that the people of Florida can have the good law enforcement they deserve, without sacrificing their birthright—the right to elect their chief law enforcement officers.

Now You Must Speak Up

But I tell you, this is not enough.

You have done many things—a magnificent job —to "shape up" your departments, but now you must "speak up."

You owe this to the people of Florida. You are obligated to tell them the facts so that they will not be misled by the "State Police Myth" down the tragic road that leads to centralized government.

Don't let it happen.

We have been able to avert a state police because of what the sheriffs have done in the past decade. The efforts that were made to modernize your departments and to more adequately take care of the needs and demands of the public, and the creation of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau has made it unnecessary for the Legislature to consider a state police force, or to be "taken in" by this "State Police Myth."

Fighting is Not Enough

You cannot possibly expect to prevent the "State Police Myth" from becoming a reality if all your energies are expended in purely fighting the "State

Police Myth."

Simultaneously, you must also continue to strive to make your departments better and better—strive to keep up with technological advances and the latest techniques—and see to it that your budgets provide adequate funds for more men and equipment to do the job. Therefore, this is certainly a double-barrel action on your part - you fight the "State Police Myth" on the one hand, and at the same time, on the other hand, do the job expected of you in your counties.

In this way, we will always be able to say that the Sheriff is "The first line of defense in local

self-government."

Hon. Haydon Burns became Florida's 35th Governor on January 5, 1965, to mark the crowning achievement of a highly successful 15-year career in politics.

A public relations and business consultant for many years, Gov. Burns first entered politics in 1949 when he was elected overwhelmingly as Mayor of Jacksonville.

Re-elected four times as Mayor-Commissioner, he always achieved first primary victories and every time polled more votes than any other candidate on the entire ballot. He was the first Mayor of Jacksonville to be elected for five consecutive terms to that office.

During his administration the City of Jacksonville enjoyed the greatest period of progress in its history. The "Jacksonville Story" became known throughout the United States and many groups of community and political leaders visited the city to see its remarkable re-development program at first hand, and to learn how it had been accomplished.

Working closely with other public officials, chamber of commerce groups and private enterprise he provided drive and leadership for the community to bring about some \$250,000,000 in redevelopment and renewal—all accomplished without any federal funds.

At the same time he helped to modernize and streamline Jacksonville's city government in an effort to give taxpayers their full money's worth from 4,500 city employees, an annual budget of \$85,000,000 and a yearly profit of \$15,000,000 from the municipally-owned electric utility system.

Coordinating his efforts with the Committee of 100,

he aggressively sought and obtained many new payrolls for his city. The 22-story Prudential Insurance Building, the 17-story Atlantic Coast Line Building, the St. Regis Paper Plant and innumerable other businesses stand as visual evidence of this.

Gov. Burns' achievements have been widely recognized far beyond the limits of Jacksonville and he has received many honors as a result. He is a past president of the Florida League of Municipalities and a past president of the United States Conference of Mayors.

He was formerly a member of the Executive Committee of the American Municipal Association, and in 1961 that organization presented him with a Distinguished Service Award.

On nine occasions Gov. Burns has officially represented the United States abroad. In 1957 he was one of eight official delegates to the International Municipal Congress at the Hague. Earlier, he was one of 11 American Mayors selected by the Christian Palestine Committee to conduct a political and economic study tour of the Middle East Arab countries and Israel.

He served as official spokesman for the Crusade for Freedom when a large group of American Mayors and heads of national organizations visited Radio Free Europe installations several years ago.

In 1961 he headed a United States Mayors' mission to West Berlin, bringing encouragement and expressions of support to the people of West Berlin in their fight against communist aggression.

In 1962 Mayor Burns was one of only three of the nation's mayors named by President Kennedy to serve three-year terms on the National Civil Defense Advisory Council.

His many honors include the Good Government Service Award and appointment to the board of directors of innumerable civic and community groups.

A native of Louisville, Kentucky, Gov. Burns was born March 17, 1912, and became a resident of Jacksonville in his early childhood. He was educated in the Duval County Public Schools and later attended Babson College, at Babson Park, Massachusetts.

He is a member of the University of Florida Alumni Association; and an honorary member of the Florida chapters of Phi Sigma Kappa, Sigma Phi Epsilon and Alpha Kappa Psi. He has served as a steward in the Methodist Church for 28 years.

The "first family" includes the Governor's attractive. blonde wife, Mildred; his daughter Eleanor, who is the wife of Lloyd Watkins; his son, Bill, a teen-ager; and his small grandson, Clay Burns Watkins.

Mrs. Burns is a past president of Jacksonville's large Southside Woman's Club and a past president of the Jacksonville chapter of Lambda Tau Delta. She has also served as State Director, District 4, of the Florida Federation of Woman's Clubs but she is primarily a homemaker whose main interest is her family.

THE HON. DOYLE CONNER, Florida's 7th Commissioner of Agriculture, was born in Starke, Florida, December 17, 1928; was graduated from Bradford High School in 1947; received a B.S. degree in Agriculture from the University of Florida in 1952. While at the University he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives from Bradford County, at 21, and served five terms. In the 1957 session he was Speaker of the House, at 28, Florida's youngest. Honors include National President of Future Farmers of America, 1948-49; selection by the State of the 10 Cutte value of Venture Ventu

Jaycees in 1950 as one of the five outstanding men in Florida; and selection as "One of the 10 Outstanding Young Men in the Nation" by the U.S. Jaycees in 1961. At 23 he became Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the House, a post held for two terms. He was elected Commissioner of Agriculture in 1960 and reelected in 1964. During his first year as Commissioner he was elected to the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, representing the 13 Southern States. He is presently serving as President of the Southern Association of Commissioners of Agriculture, He is a member of the Baptist Church and the following organizations: Florida Farm Bureau, Florida Cattlemen's Association, Masons, Shrine, Elks, Jaycees and civic luncheon groups. He is married to the former Johnnie Bennett of Marianna, and they have three children.

THE HON. BROWARD WILLIAMS, 17th Treasurer of the State of Florida, was appointed by Gov. Haydon Burns on January 28, 1965, following the death of the late J. Edwin Larson. He also holds the titles of State Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal. He was born August, 25, 1911, at Graceville, Florida. He is married and has one daughter who is a student at Florida State University. His long association with the Treasurer's Office began when he established a business machine accounting system which is still in use. He was active in the

Treasurer's Office under W. V. Knott, and remained there after the late Mr. Larson was elected in 1940. During World War II he left his position to serve in the U.S. Navy. He returned to the Treasurer's Office after the war, resigned to become an insurance agent, and returned a second time to serve as Treasurer Larson's Administrative Assist-

ant. In 1963 he resigned to become Executive Director of the Florida Association of Insurance Companies, Inc., a trade association. the support they must have, or will get the respect and esteem they deserve, is to educate the people to do it.

May I say here that Don Genung in his Junior Deputy program is doing just this and doing it more effectively than I would have hoped could be done.

This program is the most exciting effort and development in educating the public and simultaneously promoting the prevention of crime that I have heard of in my lifetime. He deserves to be commended, and his example and his program deserves to be copied by every sheriff.

I will not dwell on the details of the program, because you know them; but I think the results of his efforts and this program are remarkable. Over a period of 6 years only 8 children out of some 21,000 in his program have been adjudicated delinquents. More significant, during this period nationwide the youth population increased 36% and juvenile delinquency increased 24%. But in Pinellas County, while the youth population was increasing 61%, juvenile delinquency decreased 14.4%.

In the criticism of the public for its lack of interest in and support of the needs of law enforcement, there is one fact that deserves examination to determine if all the condemnation of the public is justified.

As of now, it does not seem to me that the people of our counties, or our cities, have really been given the opportunity to express a clear choice, or to make a decision for or against stepping up, extending and improving law enforcement.

If it hasn't been given this opportunity to approve or reject, to support or not to support an improved law enforcement program, it may well be that you sheriffs may be somewhat to blame.

This is what I mean.

As I view it, you, as the chief law enforcement officer of your counties, each have a duty to present to your county commissioners, or budget commission, a request for funds in an amount which in your professional judgment is reasonably necessary to provide the personnel, the compensation, the equipment to effectively combat crime, by prevention as well as detection and apprehension.

It is not enough that you present a request for that amount which you feel will be approved by a tax-conscious Board of Commissioners, if the amount is in your judgment not adequate.

Equally essential it seems to me you ought not to rest your case with the board, if it does not give you adequate funds to carry out the program which the conditions in your county require.

I think you have a duty to yourselves and to the people you represent to go to them in every way possible, present to them a forthright, realistic statement of the condition of crime in your county; tell them what is wrong with your organization, detail the needs in manpower, equipment, and training, and measure the cost for them in dollars and possibly increased taxes. Tell the public what they can expect if they give you the funds requested and what to expect if they don't.

If the citizens elect not to support your request by voicing their views to their County Commissioners, and as a result your organization is inadequate to suppress and to reduce crime, then you have a sound basis for criticizing the public support.

Until you give the public this choice, you don't have a good cause to complain.

True, you might well argue that such a procedure might cost you the next election, but then the public complaint that you are not doing enough to prevent and control crime might also cost you the next election.

The public is not an originator or an innovator, but it is most generally a sound judge of policy and/or needs when the basis for policy or need is made to appear.

Those interested in improved education have demonstrated this. Time and time again they have taken their case to the people and the public has responded to the move, even when new taxes were needed to answer the call.

Law enforcement is still one of the fundamental reasons for and functions of organized government. It is at least equal in importance to education, and I believe that given the chance the people will treat it as well.

Properly presented it will attract support and spokesmen, as did the need for better educational facilities, teachers and better salaries.

It is said that "Democracy is a system of finding proximate solutions for insoluble problems."

Crime is an insoluble problem. We will never be without crime and criminals, and it will never be possible for our police to apprehend and convict all law breakers.

But we can achieve a better, more proximate solution to its control and prevention than we are now doing. We have all the resources, the abilities, the intelligence, the manpower, and the capacity to do it.

All we need is resolute, dogged determination to do it, and experienced, dedicated leadership to lead and educate us to do it.

YOU represent that leadership. I urge you to use it to the fullest. Not timidly, not apologetically, but proudly, with conviction that what you do is essential to the security, the freedom and the safety of America—which it is!

All of us who care are grateful for your service, and we will continue to be so.

The Eloquence of Emptiness

The tools of law enforcement are many.

Some of them are old — like pistols, handcuffs and badges.

Some of them are new — like helicopters or scuba diving gear.

Some are familiar --- like patrol cars or radio transmitters.

Some are unfamiliar — like spectrophotometers or gas chromatographs.

Some — like riot helmets and tear gas grenades are symbolic of the age of violence in which we live.

There are thousands of them, and we intentionally pictured only a few on our cover. The space was too limited, for one thing; and furthermore, the empty rectangles seemed more eloquent than the others.

They speak of the future — not of the present or the past — these windows that wait for tomorrow.

They speak of tools and techniques that have not yet been devised; and their very emptiness flings a challenge at the men of vision and courage who next year or next century will carry on the war against crime.

They say that law enforcement is never static, always dynamic — and for those who dwell upon the past they serve as a reminder that the greater glory lies ahead.
